HOUSING



Former Lord Mayor of Cork, and Glounthaune native, John Kelleher

President Michael D. Higgins recently labelled the housing policy in Ireland as a "great, great failure". He said that the housing situation "isn't a crisis anymore, it is a disaster". Glounthaune Youth Club published a monthly magazine "Community Way" back in the seventies and almost fifty years ago, the September 1972 issue included a letter relative to housing in our parish. This was submitted by John Kelleher who then resided at Dunkettle and hails from Annmount. John was Lord Mayor of Cork in 2002/'03. QUOTE: To the casual observer Glounthaune parish appears to be experiencing a housing boom. Magnificent mansions and exclusive detached houses seem to spring up overnight. It would therefore be natural to assume that no one in the parish is without a proper house. However, a closer look reveals a striking paradox; very few of the natives of this parish live in these exclusive houses and not one of the houses is inhabited by an ordinary working-class family. Where have all "the men of no property", as Wolfe Tone would have called them, gone? Have those who cannot afford the expensive mansions been provided with proper houses by Cork County Council? Have those at present living in sub-standard houses been alleviated of their distress? The fact is that the County Council has dismally failed to provide housing for those who need it most; the ordinary people of this parish. While the land agents, speculators and builders reap their profits and the local have-nots must

be satisfied with what they have. The people living in old houses, sometimes in squalid conditions, must not complain. The newly-married couples must move to the city, live in flats and be exploited by landlords, and produce enough children to qualify for a Corporation house. Cork County Council and local T.D's have failed to provide one of the basic civil rights for "the men of no property" who form the majority of the population of this parish. The powers that be have failed to cherish all the children of the State equally. It is time the situation was changed and it can only be changed by the people themselves. I appeal to anyone who is being denied one of their civil rights and who would like to help form a Housing Action Committee, to contact me. The aim of this committee would be to bring pressure to bear on Council and local T.D's to make them fulfil their obligations to those whom they represent. Remember this; the great are only great because we are on our knees—let us arise!"

"COMMUNITY WAY":

The Letters to the Editor Section was very popular read and the late Liam Murphy of "Woodview" Little Island contributed on a regular basis. The following was published on the aforementioned September 1972 issue; QUOTE: I must congratulate you on the last issue of your magazine. I enjoyed reading it very much. I wonder do the people of the community realise how much vandalism is going on every night around the roads. I am talking now about Little Island roads in particular. I have had numerous complaints about stone throwing, knocking at doors, and standing in front of cars turning at Little Island Cross. Indeed I have seen one incident there where a lady motorist would not be allowed pass by these so called skin heads or Devils Angels, or in my opinion bloody rowdy boys. As you are aware by now a sewerage scheme commenced in Little Island and the damage that has been

done by these hooligans is I believe well over two hundred pounds. As a ratepayer I think that when these hooligans are caught, and they will be, a fine is not enough. They should be put away for a period of time and have their eyes opened for them. What is wrong today is that these hooligans only get a fine and they can come away scot-free after paying a few pounds. Who pays for the damaged property? It is the ratepayer of course. Now Mr. Editor, if these hooligans think or even imagine that I as a ratepayer, and many more like me, are going to pay for their damage, they are making a big mistake. I am asking all you ratepayers; if you know or see these hooligans doing damage to property, in your own interest, report them without hesitation. What is wrong today is that many people know who is doing the damage but they are afraid to do anything about it. How can the Gardaí help if they don't know what is happening in our area? The Gardaí need your assistance in bringing these hooligans to justice. Of course then again many people will tell you that there is no justice there. Allow me to tell you Mr. Editor, there is justice there and a good job there is. I know there are times when all of us curse the law but what would happen in our locality without the law? These hooligans, or whatever you like to call these boys, know the people to torment and annoy; old people living alone and some even blind. You will hear many saying what kind of parents or a home do they come from. All of these hooligans come from respectable homes and can anyone tell me how these parents can be held responsible for their son's behavior at night when they are unaware of anything happening. Now Mr. Editor, allow me to tell you that these hooligans are not thirteen or fourteen year olds, they are from eighteen years to twenty two years and one would think butter would not melt in their mouth when you see them on a Sunday morning coming

down from the altar. So ratepayers wake up and help to cut out all this vandalism and hooliganism before our rates go sky high. You can help stop your rates increasing by assisting the Gardaí to bring these hooligans to justice. Separately, I must agree with you as regards Glounthaune church looking different and I hear a lot of gossip about the Altar Rails being taken away. In my opinion the altar doesn't look much without these Rails. It looks very bare. It was no harm to take away the fridges, as you called them. The heating was very badly wanted in the church; also work on the kneelers and painting. I suppose we will hear the money side of it later on! Now Mr. Editor, as I am talking about the church and as everybody in the parish knows there are three masses every Sunday; eight, ten and eleven thirty. I have been at the eight am mass on numerous occasions and am astonished to see only a few dozen present. We were long enough looking for three masses and having got the additional one; very few attend and the eleven thirty mass is packed to the door. There would of course be seating for many of those people who have to stand for forty five minutes if everybody moved into their seats properly. Why not, just like they arrange in some churches, have at least four men appointed to ensure that all the seats are full? You will often see only four people in a seat where there is room for five or six. Some people bring missals, prayer books and their Sunday papers and it is these items that take-up a seat or so. I am not condemning those who bring missals and prayer books but I do condemn those who bring their Sunday papers and place them on the seats. So all you good citizens; please collect your Sunday papers after mass in order to make room for somebody else to sit down during the celebration. UNQUOTE.

Gardening with Charlie Wilkins

A SNEAKY WEED

I know a weed that lurks in the half-light under shrubs and near to choice perennials, and after it's deceptively pretty lemon saucers are over, it does something very sneaky! It uses camouflage, slimming itself expertly in appearance so that you find it hard to spot as you ramble. It looks inoffensive, charming even, but miss one seed-head and you can be sure of yet another crop of seedlings sinking their extremely deep taproots into your best perennials and through ornamental grasses! I refer now to the Welsh poppy botanically named *Papaver Cambrica* (see illustration).

The only workable (and sensible) approach to controlling its spread is to remove the blooms and seed heads as they come into bud or flower. Dead-heading really pays dividends. Chemical control is another option but the aforementioned is safer.

Like its highly sought-after cousins, the Welsh poppy prefers a humus-rich, acid-type soil which is kept moist in summer. On the other hand, it refuses point blank to grow in waterlogged soil or where the drainage is slow and sluggish.

The blooms of all poppies (Papaver family) are ephemeral and unfortunately, so are the plants themselves. Stock has been regularly replenished from seed or seedlings and whilst the Welsh poppy does this without as much as a hint or suggestion, other more desirable forms need coaxing and more than a modicum of knowledge on reproduction using its dust-like seed.

In the back garden of Villa Marie, this sneaky operator alternates between being my joy (when it blooms!) and my greatest torment when I find yet more seedlings among the treasures. It succeeds so well in the fast-draining acid

soil that it put in an appearance just about anywhere. When in bloom, it boasts a profusion of bright yellow flowers on thin slender stalks above bright lime-green leaves. Left where it can be grow unmolested, it is a real pleasure, but a deadly charmer.

JAMAICA PRIMROSE

We continue to live in dangerous times. There seems to be no let-up or easing in the misery effecting the entire globe. But no matter where we live, summer brings a freedom from care that is unlike any other time of the year. The season is full of playfulness, wild flowers, light and relaxation. There are dog daisies and red poppies now growing along the wayside and they brighten our environment irrespective of the disappointing weather.

Those daisies are composites, flowers with an amalgamation or blend of smaller flowers which make a larger image. I like daisy-flowered plants in the garden and there are many good forms which bloom without pause until autumn. There are varieties of *Anthemis tinctoria* in various shades of lemon, but the lemon-yellow form sold as E.C.Buxton is particularly handsome especially when the light falls from directly overhead as it does in July. Compared to some daisies, the flowers of *anthemis* are small but they are carried in great profusion, and supplemented by magnificent ferny foliage.

If I could grow but one daisy plant, then it would have to be 'Jamaica Primrose'. I have it this year having lost it for half a decade. It makes a solid, floriferous bush (eventually) of about three feet covered in blooms of clear yellow petals with rich golden centers. Ideal for pots and ornamental containers it will flower to December given a warm sheltered

spot. Kept dry over winter, the plant will spring into life the following year. If you add copious amounts of grit to the compost or planting hole then drainage is vastly increased and will ensure that Jamaica Primrose will overwinter safely. Cuttings, which root with vulgarity, may be taken at any time during summer and these can be safely over-wintered (under cover if possible) if you live in a cold area.

If you would like a rooted cutting, get in touch and I will try to get one to you during August or a little later.

GOT A DIFFICULT SLOPE OR SITE?

Cistus (Rock roses but they are not true roses as we know them) are ideal for clothing banks, steep inclines which cannot be grassed, or hungry dry sites. Best purchased in bloom for then their colours will be evident. Be warned however that they resent being transplanted or pruning. Once you decide on a sunny, well-drained position and planting has taken place leave well alone.

Their 'tissue paper' flowers are charming, especially those which are white with carmine red centres. These may be as large as three inches across and although they last but for a day at a time, the shrub produces them in vast numbers for up to two months in summer.

WE CAN'T GROW EVERYTHING

We cannot grow everything we would like, yet many of us are still willing to try! Most gardens today are small and there's a natural tendency to want everything that takes one's eye in garden centres, nurseries and other people's gardens. It's easy therefore to divide up a garden into too many compartments, making it seem smaller than it actually is. Easing up on over-heavy planting, and increasing the number of stopping points (places of interest where you can sit and gaze for a while) will give a much better end result. Instead of trying to fit in yet more plants, look for a new timber seat or pair of ornamental chairs that can be moved in and out of the garden as the seasons dictate. You'll never regret the expenditure.

Saolaíodh John C. Bowen-Colthurst in 1880. Bhí tailte ag a mhuintir i Múscraí, Contae Chorcaí, i gCill an Ard-Dorais agus eastát Chaisleán na Druipsí, a fuarthas mar oidhreacht trína mháthair. Fuair sé oideachas sa Ghearmáin agus i Sasana idir 1894 agus 1898 i gColáiste Haileybury in Hertfordshire. Idir 1898 agus 1899, d'fhreastail sé ar an gColáiste Míleata Ríoga ag Sandhurst. D'éirigh go maith leis ann agus fuair sé an dara háit ina rang. An bhliain chéanna fuair sé Coimisiún san 1st Irish Rifles.



An Captaen JC. Bowen-Colthurst

Ba é seo an ré ina raibh Impireacht na Breataine faoi bhláth agus forleathan ar fud na cruinne. Bhí India mar sheoid na ríochta ag an am seo. Cuireadh Bowen-Colthurst, a bhí ina Dhara Leifteanant ag an am go Fort William, Calcutta. Is cosúil go raibh eispéireas reiligiúnach aige ann agus, bhí sé an-tógtha leis an gceideamh feasta. D'eagraigh sé ranganna creidimh do chuid de na saighdiúirí a bhí faoina chúram.

Ansin ordáíodh dó 150 fear a thógaint leis go dtí an Afraic Theas mar a raibh Cogadh na mBórach tosnaíthe. I gceann de na cathanna in aghaidh na mBórach, fuair na Bóraighe an lámh in uachtar agus chaith JC agus a chuid fear tamall mar phríosúnaigh chogaidh. Tugadh ardú céime dó, Dara-Leifteanant go Leifteanant iomlán. Tar éis dó saoire a chaitheamh i gCorcaigh ag deireadh 1900, d'fhill sé ar an India. Sna blianta seo, d'fhoghlaim sé teangacha mar Urdu, Peirsis agus Pashto. In 1907, tugadh ardú céime dó. Bhí céim an Chaptain bainte amach aige. Chaith sé féin agus a chomplacht tamall in Tibet, chomh maith. Ansin, nuair a d'fhill sé ó India, chaith sé trí bliana ar dualgas i nDún Phádraig, Contae an Dúin. In 1910, phós sé Rosalinda, duine de mhuintir De Buitleir, Tiarnaí Dhún Búinne i gContae na Mí. In 1911, aistríodh é go Kent i Sasana mar a raibh an 2nd Irish Rifles ar dualgas.

Bhí an ghéarchéim faoi Rialtas Dúchais in Éirinn ag bagairt in 1914. I gCampa an Churraigh, bhí géarchéim san arm. Aontachtaithe láidre ba ea an chuid is mó de na hoifigigh. Nuair a cuireadh in iúl dóibh go mb'fhéidir go mbeadh orthu gníomhú in

aghaidh na nAontachtaithe chun Rialtas Dúchais a chur i bhfeidhm, níor aontaigh Colthurst. Nuair a d'ordaigh ceannaire an chathlái slógadh, dhiúltaigh sé d'orduithe an cheannaire. Rinne sé ionsaí pearsanta ar an Leifteanant-Choirnéal Bird, ceannaire an chathlái. Bhí an t-ádh leis nár cuireadh faoi thriail armchúirt é ag an bpointe seo.

Tháinig an Chéad Chogadh Domhanda agus cuireadh géarchéim an Rialtais Dúchais i leataobh. Cuireadh an 2nd Irish Rifles go dtí an Fhrainc mar chuid den 7ú Briogáid. Ní raibh mórán muiníne ag Bird as Colthurst agus cuireadh ar fionraí é ar feadh tamaill. Ach toisc nach raibh dóthain ceannairí ar fáil, cuireadh ar ais ina phost é. Ansin, i gceann de na heachtraí a léirigh an cineál duine a bhí ann, rinne sé féin agus a chuid saighdiúirí ionsaí ar ghrúpa Gearmánach, cé gur ordáíodh dó gan a leithéid a dhéanamh. Maraíodh roinnt dá chuid fear. Cé go raibh sé féin gortaithe, theastaigh uaidh eolas a fháil agus cheistigh sé saighdiúirí Gearmánacha. Bhí an Ghearmáinis ar cheann de na teangacha a labhair sé mar bhí sé ar scoil ann ina óige. Bhí sé ar tí cuid de na príosúnaigh Gearmánacha a lámhach go dtí gur stopadh é. Tugadh saoire dó ansin go dtí go mbeadh sé ar fónamh arís. Dheimhneadh dochtúir go raibh na néaróga ag cur as dó. Ach i Márta 1915, fuair sé ordú fillleadh ar an bhFrainc. Dúirt Bord Leighis, áfach, nach raibh sé oiriúnach le haghaidh seirbhíse. Chaith sé tamall i Sasana mar mhaor briogáide agus i mí Iúil, 1915, bhí sé réidh chun fillleadh ar an bhFrainc.

Ach idir an dá linn, rinne an Leifteanant-Choirnéal Bird tuairisc mar gheall ar iompar Colthurst nuair a chuaigh sé in aghaidh orduithe. Cuireadh é go Dún Portobello i mBaile Átha Cliath. Rinne sé gearán oifigiúil faoi bhreith Bird ar a iompar agus cé go raibh daoine mór le rá ar a thaobh, níorbh fhéidir leis an bhreith a chur ar ceal.

Bhí sé mar dhualgas ar Colthurst i mBaile Átha Cliath earcaigh nua a thraenáil agus labhairt ag cruinnithe mar ghníomhaire earcaíochta. Sa tsli seo, chuir sé aithne ar Francis Sheehy Skeffington, a bhí ag iarraidh earcaíocht a stopadh.

Bhí Eirí Amach na Cásca amach i mí Aibreáin 1916. Cé nach raibh aon údarás ag Colthurst páirt ghníomhach a ghlacadh, thóg sé grúpa saighdiúirí leis amach ar na sráideanna. Bhí tuinneoga siopaí briste agus bhain daoine leas as chun earraí luchmhara a ghoid. Bhí Francis Sheehy Skeffington ar na sráideanna ag iarraidh creachadóireacht a stopadh. Bhí bileoga á dtabhairt amach aige ag iarraidh ar dhaoine gan creachadóireacht a dhéanamh. D'ordaigh an Leifteanant Morris Skeffington a thógaint go dtí an bheairic chun é a cheistiú.

Bhí Colthurst curtha amach le 40 fear chun tuairisc go raibh reibiliúnaithe i dteach an tSeanóra Kelly a iniúchadh. Ar an slí, bhuaileadar le triúr ógfhear a bhí ag fillleadh ó chruinniú cuallachta. Lámhach Colthurst duine díobh gan chúis. Nuair a shroicheadar siopa Kelly, d'ordaigh Colthurst dá chuid fear granáid a chaitheamh isteach sa siopa. Ghabhadar beirt fear, Mc Intyre agus Dickson agus tógadh go dtí an bheairic iad. Cuireadh an bheirt acu i seomra coinneála agus bhí Sheehy Skeffington i gciil.

An oíche sin ní raibh Colthurst in ann neál codlata a fháil. D'fhan sé ina shuí ag léamh an Bhíobla. Tháinig sé ar shliocht i Soiscéal Naomh Lúcas i gcaibidil 19, véarsa 27 a dúirt:

"Ach mo naimhde úd agam nárbh áil leo mé bheith i mo rí orthu, seolaigí i leith iad agus déanaigí iad a choscairt i mo láthair."

Cé go raibh go leor fianaise ann nach raibh an triúr, Skeffington, Mc Intyre agus Dickson dainséarach, bhí aigne Colthurst dírithe ar chúrsa a rinne scríos

ar a shaol féin agus a chuir deireadh le beatha na ndaoine seo.

Ar maidin dúirt Colthurst leis an Oifigeach a bhí ar dualgas, Dara Leifteanant Dobbin go raibh sé chun an triúr príosúnach a lámhach. Mheas Dobbin, a bhí ocht mbliana déag d'aois nach raibh dóthain údarais aige chun é a stopadh. Tógadh an triúr, Dickson, Mc Intyre agus Sheehy Skeffington go dtí an clós. D'ordaigh sé do na saighdiúirí lódáil, airm a thairiscint agus scaoileadh. Thit an triúr acu. Ina thuairisc faoin eachtra, mhaigh Colthurst gur cheap sé go n-éalódh na príosúnaigh agus go ngabhadh na reibiliúnaithe iad.

Ina dhiaidh sin, cuireadh Colthurst le trúpaí go Sráid Camden. Ghabh Colthurst an Comhairleoir Richard O' Carroll, ball de Chomhairle Cathrach Átha Cliath. Máirseáladh é go dtí clós ar chúl agus lámhach Colthurst é gan chúis. Fuair O' Carroll bas deich lá ina dhiaidh sin. An lá céanna ghabh Colthurst buachaill ar mheas sé eolas a bheith aige faoi Shinn Féin. Lorg sé eolas uaidh. Dhiúltaigh an buachaill aon eolas a thabhairt. Chuir sé iallach air dul ar a ghlúine agus lámhach sé é i gcúl a chinn.

I dtosach báire, ghlac ceannairí Arm na Breataine le tuairiscí Colthurst faoi na básuithe, an triúr a lámhachadh sa bheairic agus beirt eile, ar a laghad. Ach d'imigh oifigeach eile, an Maor Vane go Londain mar ar bhuail sé leis an Rúnaí Stáit le haghaidh cogaidh, Lord Kitchener. Nuair a fuair Kitchener an t-eolas chuir sé teileagram go Baile Átha Cliath ag ordú go ngabfaí Colthurst. Dúirt na húdaráis i mBaile Átha Cliath nach bhfuair eadar an teileagram. Idir an dá linn, bhí Colthurst curtha le grúpa saighdiúirí go dtí an lúir, Contae an Dúin. Ina dhiaidh sin, ar an 5 Bealtaine 1916, gabhadh Colthurst. Tionóladh Cúirt Fiosrúcháin i mBéal Feirste ar an 10 Bealtaine. Chuir Colthurst ráiteas nua ar fáil a chosain a iompar féin. I ndiaidh an fhiosraithe, cuireadh Colthurst faoi choinneáil go dtí go dtionólfai armchúirt. Dhiúltaigh Colthurst geallacht a phléadail.

Our Lady Crowned Church 'Celebrating 60 Years and looking forward to the next 60 Years'

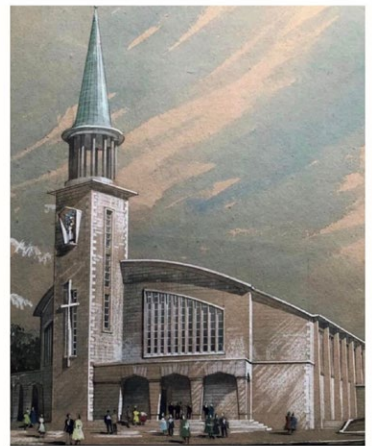
