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

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Talk, listen and move forward with mediation

It is quite normal for parties to see things differently, and as a result disagree. But it's how they deal with their differing opinions which will decides if the outcome is positive or negative. Sometimes disputes are due to a breakdown in communication. On other occasions it can be the tone used which creates the negative effect.

Difference of opinion, breakdown in communication and conflict are not confined to individuals and can also occur in groups or organisations. And this is where mediation comes in – one of its fundamental tools, as a method of resolving disputes, is to assist people communicate with each other.

However, mediation is applicable in many areas – disputes between neighbours, in the area of marital breakdown, contractual disputes, and work place, to name but a few. Mediation focuses on the way forward, not on establishing fault. And it's not necessarily a standalone process but very often works in tandem with other areas of conflict resolution, such as the legal process.

Talk and be heard

In addressing conflict, mediation seeks to provide an environment where those involved can talk to the mediator and each other in a way that allows them to be heard. One of the objectives of a mediator is to encourage people who are in disagreement, to find a way to resolve their differences by developing an appreciation for each other's perspective, thereby allowing them to apply a solution(s) that proves to be more accommodating for all concerned.

The growth of mediation as a viable alternative to resolving conflict, is in part due to the fact that the process can be engaged in quickly. This can offset a lot of the frustration that often arises when people find themselves engaged in a long drawn out procedure, an experience which frequently leaves them feeling somewhat detached from the affair.

Less expensive than court

Mediation is generally a much less expensive alternative than court proceedings for example, particularly as the parties share the cost. Another advantage of mediation is that, although the parties attend on a voluntarv basis, it is nonetheless a confidential process, where they are obliged to keep matters confidential. This tends to encourage people to participate more fully.

Only in the most serious of cases may the contents of mediation be disclosed to a Court. For example, that could include a situation where material pertaining to the safety of children arises, or where actual or threatened criminal acts become known.

Otherwise the confidentiality of mediation is absolute and cannot be used by either party in litigation.

However, if any person has a concern about the confidentiality of mediation, they should make them known to the mediator, and/or seek legal advice on the matter.



"NÍL AON GLEANNTÁN MAR DO GLEANNTÁN FÉIN" GLOUNTHAUNE NEWS BY "THE FOREIGN CORRESPONDENT"

HOUSING DEVELOPMENT AT GLOUNTHAUNE



Grant of permission for the construction of one hundred and seventy four residential units on a site at Johnstown / Killahora townlands was detailed in the July issue. Planning permission for another scheme of forty dwellings at Lackenroe townland was lodged by Bluescape Limited on July 4th.last year and this development constitutes the first phase of a two hundred and forty house residential estate. The land is east of the Glounthaune to Knockraha road on a stretch between Annmount Estate and the Forge Cross and access to the development is via a signalised junction at the Cois Chuain housing estate entrance. The provision of a pedestrian access to the Killahora Road at Upper Annmount and an upgrade of a section of the Knockraha Road adjacent to the development access are also incorporated.

Cork County Council granted conditional planning on October 17th. 2017 and this resulted in nine third party appeals to An Bord Pleanāla. Ten observations were also submitted which included that from the Johnstown Residents Association, Lackenroe Residents Group and Glounthaune Tidy Towns. Appellants and observers submissions included the following summarised issues; overdevelopment, connectivity, planning activities on the site itself and others in Glounthaune, traffic / access, impact on residential amenity, sensitive landscape, water infrastructure, scenic routes, an eis / nis requirement, design, ecological issues, lack of infrastructure supporting the development and protected structures not referenced in the application. The applicant's response included the following summarised remarks; the signalised junction and various traffic calming measures, including the provision of raised surfaces, will provide a safe pedestrian environment and enhance pedestrian and cycle connections between the northern side of Glounthaune village and the village centre: the site is ideally located to allow school children to safely cross the Knockraha Road at the traffic signal controlled junction and access the local school via the Cois Chuain housing estate; the development provides for a pedestrian access to the northern Killahora Road at Upper Annmount which will provide a convenient pedestrian / cycle route between the existing dwellings on that road and the existing local primary school and village centre: under potential future phases of the development to the east and south east additional pedestrian / cycle links between subject lands and the village centre will be provided which will promote sustainable travel patterns in the future; the conditions and contributions imposed in the grant of permission will result in necessary upgrades and maintenance of the surrounding road network and this will improve the road network for all current and future residents in Glounthaune; the development will result in an upgrade of the existing storm water network which will be beneficial to existing and future residents in Glounthaune; the development has been carefully designed to ensure that it will not have a negative impact on the residential amenities of adjacent properties; a comprehensive Landscape Masterplan details the landscaping measures and boundary treatments to be adopted.

The submissions and inspector's report were considered at a Bord Pleanála meeting held on May 17th. 2018 and permission was granted for thirty one dwellings subject to twenty five conditions. In the interest of protecting the residential amenities of adjoining properties, having regard to the significant height differences involved; permission was refused for dwellings numbered thirty two to forty. This portion of the site shall be utilised for the provision of single storey dwellings and with no attic accommodation and maximum ridge heights of five decimal five metres. Bluescape subsequently lodged a planning application to Cork County Council for the construction of seven single storey dwellings on July 23rd. 2018. The Bord agreed that the development was in accordance with the proper planning and sustainable development of the area having regard to zoning of lands, the provisions of the 2017 Cobh Municipal District Local Area Plan, the nature, layout and scale of the development and the pattern of existing development in the vicinity.


The Bord considered that subject to compliance with conditions the development would not seriously injure the amenities in the area or of property in the vicinity, and it would not be prejudicial to public health or lead to a risk of flooding, and would conform to the provisions of the Local Area Plan. The conditions applied include the following: details of the materials, colours and textures of all the external finishes to the dwellings shall be submitted to, and agreed in writing with, the Planning Authority prior to commencement of development. All roofs shall be blue black or slate grey in colour, including ridge tiles. The area of public open spaces shall be reserved for such use and shall be levelled, contoured, soiled, seeded and landscaped. The work shall be completed before any of the dwellings are made available for occupation and shall be maintained as public open spaces by the developer until taken in charge by the local authority. When the estate is taken in charge; the open spaces shall be vested in the planning authority as public open spaces.

Proposals for an estate / street name, house numbering scheme and associated signage shall be submitted to, and agreed with the Planning Authority before the development commences. The proposed name(s) shall be based on local historical or topographical features or other alternatives acceptable to the planning authority. Site development and building works shall be carried out only between the hours of eight am and seven pm Mondavs' to Fridays', nine am to two pm on Saturdays' and not at all on Sundays' and public holidays. All service cables associated with the development shall be located underground. Ducting shall be provided by the developer to facilitate provision of broadband infrastructure within the development. Public lighting shall be provided in accordance with a scheme and shall include lighting along the pedestrian walkway from the Estate road to the local Killahora road at Upper Annmount. Such lighting shall be provided prior to the making available of any house for occupation. The boundary on both sides of the walkway shall consist of a one decimal eight metre high solid block wall, capped and rendered on both sides.

The developer shall pay a financial contribution to the Planning Authority in respect of public infrastructure and facilities benefiting development that is provided, or intended to be provided in the area of the Planning Authority. The developer shall pay to the Planning Authority a financial contribution in respect of the Cobh / Midleton – Blarney suburban rail project. Prior to the commencement of development; the developer shall lodge with the Planning Authority a cash deposit, an insurance bond or other security to secure the provision and satisfactory completion of roads, footpaths, water mains, drains, open spaces and other services required in connection with the development. The developer shall pay the sum of eighty thousand euro to the Local Authority in respect of works proposed to be carried out for the provision of traffic calming north and south of the development access. The developer shall pay the sum of twenty thousand euro to the Planning Authority for the provision of the upgrading of the Storm Sewer that crosses under the rail line.

Incidentally, it is interesting to observe that the speed limit on the section of road between the Church and the Forge Cross has been recently reduced to fifty km. It is also noteworthy that a condition on both this development and that at Johnstown / Killahora stipulates that proposals for an estate / street name(s) shall be submitted to the Planning Authority for approval and that same shall be based on local historical or topographical features, or other alternatives acceptable to the Planning Authority - should not the local community have an input in this regard?

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


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A LATE SUMMER ACHE

Sometimes, I think that summer is simply an aberration, a divergence, a distraction from the norm, a rarity even. In recent years it has disappointed in many respects, and we lived out our gardening lives in low light levels and unseasonal temperatures. Winter seemed habitual, a fact of life. That is, until this year when nature put on a supreme effort and changed the dismal monochrome of winter weather to fancy dress hue. And so it remained up to very recent days.

Now the garden may be showing the earliest signs of the cooler, subtler days of autumn, but there's still much to admire in the line of hot colours and gentle movement. The Orb spider is once again busy criss-crossing shrubs and plants with inescapable webs, whilst the scented phlox, potted lilies, and roses continue to release their perfume along with honeysuckle, which now has berries as well as flowers. All these, individually and collectively, define a time and shape life-long memories. And yet, all is not as it seems.

Last month, in a walled garden in Glanmire, the scented blooms of a large lime tree were at their most floriferous

but around its base lay bees in the dozens, some intoxicated it would seem, many already dead and withering in the high humidity. More were being taken by birds and marauding wasps, and whilst the bumble bee outnumbered honey bees by ten to one, the sight was one of great sadness.

All lime trees (Tillia species) are extremely attractive to bees when they come into flower, but for bumble bees the lime tree known as Tilia petiolaris, can be a fatal attraction. Lime tree flower nectar consists of a mixture of sugars, but in the case of 'petiolaris' a significant quantity of a sugar called mannose is also present. The bees are unable to metabolise this sugar fully and it becomes irreversibly bound to the digestive enzymes in their gut. The available enzymes soon become used up, making the digestion of other sugars impossible and so the bee dies of sugar starvation, even though its stomach may be full.

Fortunately, T. petiolaris flowers in late July and early August, when bumble bee colonies are at peak strength and so the colonies are better able to survive the loss of those foraging among the branches. Humans can digest mannose so there is no danger from eating honey produced from lime nectar. The pendent silver lime tree blossoms may still be hanging heavy due to the weighty crawling of foraging bumble bees, but the sooner flowering ceases, the better for all these important, furry pollinators. Varroa mite has decimated honey-bee stocks in recent years so every single bee, honey or bumble, is valued for their ability in pollinating crops of every kind.

stem of a spent flower beck to some definite point, as any bare stalks you leave behind will disfigure the whole plant. This point will be where a new shoot or a fresh flower arises or is likely to arise.

PHLOX; It is not generally appreciated that phlox have a second season of flower, shorter stemmed may I add, but still very welcome towards the dewy month of September. Simply pinch out their first heads of bloom as they fade or cut the stems to a lower pair of leaves then give two liquid feeds at fortnightly intervals. The pale blues and lavender blues look best during this second flowering for they give the impression that smoke is in the air along with the first of the autumnal mists. When cut for indoors, the scent of phlox can be slightly rank, though it will still be found ideal for flower arranging.

GET ESTABLISHED; Always plant shrubs and perennials in autumn (October or even late . September) for the soil will still be warm and they will get well established before the arrival of hard frosts. The weather in spring can be dry above all else, and absolutely freezing which means constant watering if you plant then. Autumn planting is truly best.



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THE SEPTEMBER GARDEN

AUTUMN; The mood of autumn is evident already in the foliage of trees shrubs and all plant life. The shortening hours of daylight have crept in unannounced, marking yet again the ebb and flow of the seasons and of life itself. But while the dance of surrender may be obvious to those who observe these subtle changes, there are still two good months of gardening activity to be enjoyed. The garden can once again become 'a cabinet of curiosities' for shadows will increasingly deceive the eye and light play funny tricks even during a high September noontime.

Now's the season in which to have an eye for detail, a love of the unusual, a collector's mentality for weird shapes, odd movements, and unexpected and sudden bursts of shortlived golden colour. If you garden with grasses and late perennials (rudbeckia, heleniums, aconitum, etc) you'll have these golden treasures I speak of and be able to rely heavily on shape and pattern for all of autumn through to November.

wasps and ants can be a common problem as they search for food and work to enlarge their nests. If you can see an entrance to a wasp or ant nest, dust

WASPS; In these dog-days,

around the entrance with a powder sold as Kill-Ant or Ant Stop! The pests will get this on their legs and distribute it through the colony, killing all in the process. Indoors, especially in the kitchen, use either powder for best results. Puff the contents around doors, window frames and into cracks and crevasses to give longer-term control of foraging ants.

DEADHEADING; Gardens can easily slide into premature decay and regular dead-heading is essential to prevent this. For certain plants, such as the non-repeat flowering roses, the aim is purely cosmetic. But many plants, including dahlias, cosmos, penstemons, and many species of later flowering salvias can be induced to flower indefinitely if none of their spent blooms are allowed ripen seed.

There are rare instances where it is acceptable simply to snap off spent flowers with finger and thumb and this is the case with day-lilies. But, in general, secateurs or a stout pair of scissors are needed. It is essential to trace the

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St. Stephen's Pitch and Putt Club Ladies and Gents Captain Prize





Loneliness is the public health crisis of this generation. It describes a person's lack of personal connections and contact that they want and need.

The importance of personal contact and interaction with others cannot be underestimated. It can affect all ages, it doesn't discriminate between young, old, rich or poor. Groups at risk of loneliness include, the elderly as well as people with cognitive impairment and illnesses such as Dementia. people with mobility issues and physical disabilities, carers, members of the LGBT community and ethnic minorities.

While we live in a world dominated by social media platforms people are now lonelier more than ever. Many young people are now who are well connected online are experiencing profound loneliness, due to the lack of real human contact. According to Childline, loneliness is now one of the main reasons they are contacted Saying that you are lonely can be very difficult for someone to admit to, but it is far more common than people realise. Much of the discussion about loneliness can focus on our elderly members of society and people living in rural areas with a lack of services and amenities, but, people living in urban areas and cities are just as susceptible to suffering the effects of social isolation. With an ageing population loneliness is becoming an increasing problem today. Our population is growing by 20,000 additional older people every year. By 2036 it's estimated that 20% of the population will be aged 65 and older. 1 in 3 over 65s are living alone and that number is only going to rise. In the UK, research has shown that 49% of all older people say that watching the television or pets are their main form of company.

Isolation and Ioneliness can be particularly catastrophic for ageing citizens, but some are more vulnerable due to frailty, those who may be mentally alert but physically not capable of moving around without help. Older women frequently report higher levels of loneliness compared to men. Sometimes a person's only contact in the day could be a simple interaction with the postman, GP or a neighbour saying "Hello." For someone living alone these simple interactions can be an extremely important part of their day the negative impacts of loneliness on day to day life is well documented. It can occur from time to time or it can be a persistent and long-term problem for people, as well as affecting people at different times in their life. It is important that loneliness is recognised as being emotionally damaging as well as having negative effects on peoples' health. It has long been associated with a broad range of adverse mental conditions such as anxiety, depression and substance abuse.

There is a lack of public awareness of what being lonely is and how common it really is. I also wish to encourage people to check in on elderly and vulnerable neighbours to ensure they feel a sense of place in the community.

Studies have shown that participation in formal activities, such as volunteering and attending social clubs, are associated with reduced loneliness in later life. Loneliness in Ireland is increasingly prioritised as a public health issue and interventions are being developed to prevent isolation. Funding is available to local community groups to create facilities to improve the lot of the elderly, including many designed to increase social participation.

Friendly Call is one such service that provide excellent support in contacting the elderly and keeping them engaged in society. Friendly Call Cork is a free service providing phone calls 5 days a week and is available to older people or individuals who may feel lonely, isolated and vulnerable. The Friendly Caller will chat to clients about their day and check on how they are feeling, providing friendship, security and helping clients feel safer at home.

White's Cross - County Hurling Champions

Junior Hurling County Championship Review Friday the 27th of July last proved to be a historic night for White's Cross GAA as victory over 0'Donovan Rossa ensured that the club landed its very first county championship at any grade. It was a fitting reward for this group of players. Even prior to this victory, this group has been responsible for the club's most successful ever period playing the small ball game. Having only won two divisional championships in sixty years, in 1982 and 1991, 2016 and 2017 saw them win back to back hurling championship titles. Add in consecutive Craobh Rua cup titles and the 2017 city division league meant that this was a golden era for hurling in the club. The one dark spot in this time was a county final defeat at the hands of Killavullen in 2017. Hence, the primary aim

at the start of the year was to get back to the final and atone for that defeat. The path to the final did not get off to the best start. Being a small club, the panel of players available was never huge to begin with so when players leave the squad, it puts pressure on an already stretched resource. For one reason or another approximately eight of last year's panel were unavailable when the season began. Their opening game saw a very narrow one-point defeat at the hands of Brian Dillons which ended the possibility of retaining the Craobh Rua title. Their next league game was a tetchy affair against St Finbarrs which ended in more substantial defeat and all of a sudden there was a certain air of doom of gloom over the squad. However, this is a tight bunch of battled-hardened players and they wear the green and white with pride every time they go out. After the St Finbarrs defeat, the players stayed behind in the dressing room for over an hour for a clearthe-air meeting of sorts. Results and performances were well below the standard that the players had set for themselves and it needed to be addressed if fortunes were to be reversed.

The immediate effect of the meeting, in terms of headline results, saw little change in fortune. A heavy defeat to Doneraile in a challenge game and an opening round championship defeat to Rathpeacon were further setbacks. However, on a positive note, the panel was being Edwin Buckley went back to hurling after a long break; Fiachra O'Connell graduated from the minor ranks and was playing very well at wing back. Fergal Reid (first cousin of Kilkenny's TJ) and Robert McEl-hinney (nephew of form Cork intermediate players Mark and Declan of Delaney's fame) were also a revelation. It is hard to identify an exact turning point

in the team's quest for glory but a challenge game against Mayfield, a junior A side, on a fine spring evening in Mayfield may have been it. Played ten days before their make or break county championship game against Gabriel Rangers, it was the first time in 2018 where the game didn't end in defeat. This was followed by a ferocious battle with Brian Dillons in the first

round of the city division championship; a tie which ended in a monster Kevin Buckley point in 7th minute of injury time to seal a one-point win. This was huge demonstration of heart and courage to pull through and it provided some confidence and momentum ahead of their crucial clash against Gabriel Rangers in Clonakilty on May 26th.

In this game, everything clicked for the White's Cross men. As soon Ruairí Murnane hit over a belter from 60 yards, the writing was on wall for the Ballydehob/ Schull outfit. The hurling played that day was as good as it has been for years. Every

player from one to fifteen won their personal battles and moved the ball slickly and confidently around the field. The effects of Seamus Kennefick's work with the team and individuals shone through on the day. This was the complete performance by the team as they ran out comprehensive winners on a score of 2-17 to 0-05. Impressive league victories over St Vincents and Rathpeacon followed and suddenly there was string of games without defeat and confidence was high. Familiar foes Lough Rovers were beaten in the next round which set up a crunch guarter final tie with one of the championship favourites; Belgooly.

This was a cracking game from start to finish with a standard of hurling that would not be out of place a couple of grades higher. White's Cross dominated long periods and picked of some fantastic scores. Murt Kelleher played a blinder at half back nullifying Belgooly's main threat in the form Cork intermediate player Ruairí O'Dwyer. When the expected second half comeback from Belgooly emerged, the team showed composure and belief to rattle three unanswered points from Conor Buckley and Eoin Murnane to kill off the Belgooly comeback. The same traits were very much evident in the semi-final against Rathpeacon in Blarney. The same two players as well as Cormac O'Flynn popped up with scores at the end of the game. This time it was to salvage a draw after a fairly poor performance. The replay saw the team eek out a victory in a second consecutive underwhelming performance. Local rivalries as in such exists between White's Cross and Rathpeacon will often lead to cagey, tense encounters which the three battles in this championship most certainly were.

However, semi finals are for winning and it was back to Pairc Ui Rinn for the second consecutive year in a county final. This

time, however, the result was different. Following a similar pattern to games against Belgooly, Rathpeacon and Lough Rovers, it took some late scores to eventually decide the outcome. However, White's Cross were the better team throughout and deserved their victory. It was a proud

occasion to see a club stalwart like Kevin Buckley lift the trophy over his head. Kevin, along with people like Padraig Murnane, John O'Connell and Derek O'Connor (who formed a formidable and ever present full back like in every game this year), have given decades of service to the club and this was a just reward for their efforts.

It was privilege to brink the cup to the Stirrup, Boothouse and Blackman bars over the following days to celebrate with supporters. Such victories deserve to be celebrated and this was done in style and no little class. However, the victory is not the end. Rather, we hope it is a platform that will drive the club to further success in 2018. There are city division leagues and championships in both codes, a Munster competition and many underage competitions that the club will compete and do their utmost to win. 

Proceeds from the night will go towards the cost of replacing the club's All Weather pitch and perimeter fencing,





The Tullamore Show & FBD National Livestock marked Ireland's largest one day agricultural exhibition. Every year, it attracts the best breeders of cattle, sheep, and equine from all over the country. From a Macra na Feirme point of view, The Tullamore showcases the best young farmers as they contest the coveted FBD Farm Skills Title. Glanmire trio Kevin Smiddy and brothers Declan and Ciaran O Hara quest for the Two in a Row as clubmates Cathal Cashman, Donal O Callaghan and Tomas Cuffe are the reigning title holders.
