

THE TIDY TOWNS COMPETITION

The primary focus of the competition is to encourage communities to improve age communities to improve their local environment and make their area a better place to live, work and visit. The Department of the Environment, Community and Local Government supported by SuperValu, sponsors for the past twenty seven years, organises the competition and emphasises the importance of participating rather than winning as the very act of taking part brings benefit to the community. The inaugural competition was in 1958, exactly sixty years ago, and exactly sixty years ago, and Glenties, County Donegal was the winner of the overall National Award. One mark is precious in the competition and this year it was that thin margin which separated win-ners Listowel, on three hundred and thirty nine marks, from Ballincollig and Glaslough Co. Monaghan. Each centre is adjudicated under eight criteria and a total of four hundred and fifty marks are on offer. There are eight population categories and Glounthaune was entered in Category "B" which relates to a population range of plus two hundred to one thousand. The unannounced adjudication took place on July 9th.and Glounthaune earned three hundred and ten marks which is an increase of fifteen on last year. This is a splendid achievement and the fact that additional marks were reflected in each of the eight <u>criteria</u> is notable.

criteria is notable.
The "Sustainability – Doing More with Less" was the problematic section once again even though there was a six per cent increase of marks on last year; thirty eight per cent was awarded this year. It is therefore an obvious category to target going forward as there are significant marks to be gained. The further overall increase of marks ther overall increase of marks is all the more admirable be-cause apart from the 2014 of six decimal four per cent on the previous year's figure; Glounthaune has obtained a percentage increase of marks each year since the 2008 competition. In the overall National Award; Glounthaune, along with nine other centres was placed one hundred and seventy seventh of the eight hundred and eighty three entrants. That is a whopping climb of one hundred positions on last year and an additional thirteen centres entered this year's competition. Ninety three centres from Cork County participated, five more than last year, with Glounthaune and Ballinadee in thirty first position having been awarded twenty eight marks fewer that first placed

Ballincollig. Three hundred and thirty two centres were entered nationwide in Cat-egory B" and Glounthaune, egory B" and Glounthaune, along with Broadford, Co. Kerry and Ballycumber, Co. Offaly, was placed fifty fourth with the winner Glaslough on three hundred and thirty eight marks. Forty Cork County centres participated in Catty centres participated in Category "B" and Glounthaune ty centres participated in Category "B" and Glounthaune with twenty two marks fewer than first placed Rosscarbery was placed thirteenth. Cork County is subdivided into three regions and Glounthaune, one of twelve Cork South entrants in Category "B", was second to Innishannon which is similar to last year but the gap has been last year but the gap has been reduced by seven marks; it is now fifteen. In conjunction with the Tidy Towns Competition; there is also a "Waters & Communities Award" which recognises communities who are taking positive steps in raising awareness and appreciation for their local water body; such as Cleanups, De-velopment of Amenity Areas, Bird Boxes, Habitat Surveys, Control of Evasive Species, etc. Fifty nine centres nationwide entered last year but only a total of twenty nine participated this year. There is an assessment under five criteria with a total of one hundred marks on offer and entrants compete in their relevant region. Glounthaune was one of four, which is two more than last year that participated in the South & Mid-West Region and with seventy six marks won the one enty six marks won the one thousand euro prizemoney. UL Kayak Club Riverpath Volunteers, an entry by Limerick City Tidy Towns, was second with five marks fewer and Abbey Tidy Towns, Galway was the overall winner with eighty marks. But back to the mario marks. But back to the main competition; the following is a synopsis of the adjudica-tor's report and a breakdown of marks awarded under the various sections.

Community Planning & Involvement 46/60: The adjudicator remarked; "there is a strong sense of heritage and the numerous ways it is honoured from the 1916 Gardan of Parameters at the 1916 Gardan of Parameters at the 1916 Remarks at the 1916 Remark den of Remembrance to the Tribute for all who worked on the railway in the area. The working relationship with the schools was admired and; "is invaluable and ensures a fu-ture for Tidy Towns in the vil-

lage".

Streetscape & Public
Places 40/50: The Church, its grounds and associated buildings, the Community Centre and Car Park were commended as was the painting of "The Rising Tide" and the presentation of premises including the Post Office, the Hair Salon, and the Beauty Salon. The Human Sundial Explanatory plague received Explanatory plaque received

"pride of place". Green Spaces & Landscap-ing" 42/50: The adjudicator remarked that the new seating at Craig's Field, together with well-maintained green areas, enhances the enjoyment of the beautiful natural amenity significantly, and the shrubs and flower bed to the roadside boundary railings of the railway line were admired. "Container planting through-out the village is colourful, profuse, numerous and stra-tegically placed to maximise regically placed to maximise visual amenity; hedgerow, flower beds and shrubberies are noteworthy". The entrances from approach roads were described as; "an excellent introduction to Glounthaune".

Nature & Biodiversity 38/50: The Harper's Island Wetland Centre was acknowledged as a wonderful amenity ben-efiting the local, national and enting the local, national and international community. Craig's Field and playground as well as the information panels on wildlife and wild birds in the estuary were illustrated as being; "excellent in design, maintenance and accessibility". The success on tackling the problem of invasive species and the emphasis on wild flower local to the area was praised. area was praised.

Sustainability – Doing More with Less 19/50: The partnership agreement with SEAI on an Energy Master Plan for the area was warmly embraced. Initiatives involving recycling and re-use area were noted.

Tidiness & Litter Control 59/90: The adjudicator offered congratulations on the Cork County Council litter challenge success and remarked; "participation in the Coast-watch Clean-up twice yearly is beneficial to the community and also the wild-life. Litter awareness signage life. Litter awareness signage coupled with regular patrols both within the village and approach roads is laudable".

Residential Streets & Housing Areas 34/50: The Highlands Residents Group was praised for organising the "Getting to Know You" initiative which was described as; "an excellent way of creating a more cohesive community Green areas within residential estates received favourable comment and the adjudica-tor remarked that; "the small riverside residential area is charming and the flower displays were quite stunning. The Highlands residential estate offers a very attractive presentation in a discreet manner from the main thoroughfare with its lovely gardon and reading bound. gardens and roadside bound-ary walls which were heav-ily planted in many instances. Improvements to the laneway from the estate to the school have been favourably noted".

Approach Roads, Streets & Lanes 32/50: The adjudicator considered the road and for Considered the road and footpath surfaces throughout the main thoroughfare to be; "quite good", and that road signage, including finger post signs were being well maintained. The condition of approach roads and grassed verges received favourable verges received favourable comment but the adjudicator was not impressed with the condition of the service pole and wirescape at "The Bridge"; remarking that it "looked particularly bad".

Comment: It is always prudent to keep an eye on happenings at the other side of the meandering border and penings at the other side of the meandering border and in this respect it is noted that Sallybrook was award-ed three hundred and four marks and that Glanmire / Riverstown was not entered? Knockraha, north of the New Line soft border, secured a commendable two hundred and eighty five marks while and eighty five marks while eastern neighbours Carrigt-wohill received two hundred and ninety marks. It is disappointing that Little Island was not entered this year eight ther moreover when one reflects on its strong first entry in 2013 when two hundred and twenty three marks were earned and there was an in-crease of eight in 2014.

FLOWERS FOR A LOST GENERATION

The common poppy (Papaver rhoeas) is seldom grown in the ornamental garden for there are far more substantial and delicate forms now available- for those who like old fashioned cottage flowers! And yet the common poppy has become a world-wide symbol of remembrance for those who fought and died in the First and Second World Wars. Perhaps they are not worn as freely in this country as in those of our nearest neighbours, but we should not forget that many Irish went to fight for both causes, never to return. Thankfully we remember then at this dead-end time of the year.

Worn on dark November mornings on coat and jacket lapels, red poppies may look incongruously bright and out of place, but they carry a weight of meaning. Their petals neither sway with the wind, nor exude a milky sap, for they're made of cheap silk and florist's wire. In the coming days we will watch on television, artificial wreaths being placed on war memorials across Europe. At the Annual Festival of Remembrance in London's Albert Hall many thousands of poppy petals will flutter down on the silent gathering as they remember and grieve the dead of two world

Among the millions of brave soldiers who died in the First World War, was a young medical doctor called John Mc Rea and it was this Canadian national who became responsible for the adoption of the Corn poppy as a symbol of remembrance for those who never came home. John Mc Rea had observed this vivid and bloodred poppy growing in profusion among the graves of the fallen who were buried immediately outside the field hospital at Ypres where he served, and he remembered the Greek legend of how the poppy was created by the God of Sleep. He wrote a poem called "In Flanders Fields", the closing lines of which end with; "If ye break faith with us who die, we shall not sleep, though poppies grow in Flanders fields".
This young doctor died of pneumonia in 1918 and one of his last wishes was that the wild Corn poppies of Flanders be strewn on his grave. His tombstone lies in France. Since his death, a wreath of poppies is placed on his grave every November. In nearby fields, the red Flanders poppy continues to bloom in great profusion every summer. Their buds bow their heads and their petals are short lived just like the lives of those who died. "Lest we forget" they seem to be saying in unison as they sway in the warm breezes, "lest we forget".



The common poppy is botanically known as Papaver rhoeas. On the Continent, it is sometimes called the Flanders poppy because it initially flourished and grew near Ypres, France, where the dead of the First World War fell. Today, the common poppy is an annual found on the roadside and in cultivated fields.

St. LUKE'S LITTLE SUMMER

Summer' for the weather can sometimes be as golden (as it was) during most of glorious autumn. However, in less favoured areas frost can be expected this month and preparations must be made for the protection of tender and semi-tender subjects, and certainly before month's end.

THE ARRIVAL OF FROST

As autumn turns more and more towards the end of the year, all that we await is the arrival of frost, a secret blessing for vegetable growers and ornamental gardeners. It adds a wonderful nutty flavour to parsnips and Brussels sprouts, whilst Swede turnips turn a more butter yellow and increase in texture. When it arrives, notice its elegant appearance, how it adorns and transforms the garden and copes with ripening and rotting, and the conversion of the debris and detritus of one year, to a medium which can be used the next. Nature never fails to impress us, even in times of storm, tempest, and increasing climate change.

SCENT

Soon it will be winter and already we are entering the season of compensation. Short days and terrifying weather may keep us confined for long periods at a time, but when benign days tempt you out to stretch your legs, there are compensations to be found just about everywhere. The pleasures of a drifting perfume such as Winter-Sweet (Chimonanthus praecox) and Sarcococoa (Christmas Box) are sublime in many ways and these will surely lift your spirits during When Daphne 'Jacqueline Postil' bursts forth in a pink and white froth during December, the experience of its perfume will remain with you until June when the Regale lilies once again take centre stage. This daphne is truly the most powerfully scented.

freezes. The change in its structure can affect ornamental containers in two ways. First, the moisture which has soaked into the porous material of terra-cotta (for example) expands to form ice and then it causes fragments to chip and break off thus weakening its structure. Secondly, the expanding moisture content in the compost can create powerful stress fractures in the walls of the pot, and if these have already been weakened, they split readily and become useless.

less likely to crack than waisted containers or those which are narrow at the top. When compost freezes in a tapered pot the whole bulk tends to slip upwards, easing the pressure on the container. This is why sloping sides are suggested for garden pools; the frozen poolwater simply rises up ever so slightly, easing in the process the pressure on the sides. In turn, this prevents cracking.

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THE GARDEN IN NOVEMBER

The Poinsettias are arriving! A real favourite at Christmas, Poinsettias offer a burst of red, white, or pink and green bracts (leaves) that can last to Easter given some minimal attention. Here are a few helpful guidelines;

- * The Poinsettia detests cold. Ideally, it should be kept at a room temperature of around 55F. Even when transporting it from the shop make sure it's wrapped and safe from chilling winds and cold rain. Never buy from shops who keep these outside on the pavement.
- *Avoid getting the leaves wet as they can develop unsightly pock marks later on in
- *Choosing correctly can mean the difference between a week of colour and four months of colour. When selecting your choice, check the tiny yellow flowers in the centre of the

plant for these indicate freshness. Make sure these are green/yellow and fresh looking. Do not purchase

specimens which have browned florets or where these have been removed.

* Never place a Poinsettia outdoors, for it will not survive sudden drops in temperature. As well, water from the bottom (stand the plant in a saucer of water) and only give moisture when the plant begins to droop a little. Too much water is as bad as none at all. Feed to prolong the coloured leaves using any brand of liquid food.

*Buy now whilst the best specimens are available in good numbers. It does not have to be Christmas in order to buy a Poinsettia. As outlined, they'll give up to four months of colour with a modicum of care!

With schools back and weather getting cooler it is likely that asthma symptoms are going to be more pronounced. Asthma is a condition in which your airways narrow and swell and produce extra mucus. This can make breathing difficult and trigger coughing, wheezing and short-ness of breath. For some people, asthma is a minor nuisance. For others, it can be a major problem that interferes with daily activities and may lead to a lifethreatening asthma attack. Asthma can't be cured, but its symptoms can be controlléd. About 1 in 8 children will have asthma but most peoples will resolve when they get older. Because asthma often changes over time, it's important doctor to track your signs and symptoms and adjust treatment as needed.

Asthma symptoms vary from person to person. You may have infrequent asthma attacks, have symptoms only at certain times such as when exercising, or have symptoms all the time.

Asthma signs and symptoms include shortness of breath, cough or chest tightness

whistling or wheezing sound when exhaling Coughing or wheezing attacks that are worsened by a respiratory virus, such as a cold or the flu.

Signs that your asthma is probably worsening include: Increasing difficulty breathing (measurable with a peak flow meter, a device used to check how well your lungs are working).

For some people, asthma signs and symptoms flare up in certain situations such as exercise, pollen, dust or flumes. Respiratory infections, such as the common cold can frequently trigger attacks.

Severe asthma attacks can be life-threatening. Patients or parents of children with asthma should know what to do when your signs and worsen and symptoms when you need emergency treatment.

Signs of an asthma emergency include: Rapid worsening of shortness of breath or wheezing, No improvement even after using a quick-relief inhaler, such as salbutamol (Vento-lin) and shortness of breath when you are doing minimal physical activity

Risk factors for asthma include; having another allergic condition, such as atopic dermatitis or allergic rhinitis (hay fever); Being overweight, smoking or exposure to second hand smokes.

Treatment of asthma includes reducing the risk factors or triggers for asthma. There are a variety of inhalers that can be used. The inhalers can generally be divided into two groups; Relievers and Preventers. The challenge is to realise that the most people need both but that you will get immediate relief from the preventer inhalrr but that both are equally important in the management of asthma. Proper treatment makes a big difference in preventing both short-term and long-term complications caused by asthma. Finally if is important to get vaccinated for influenza







Wills and Enduring Powers of Attorney. What are they and what do they do?

No one likes to think about the inevitable. Death however is an unavoidable consequence of life, and like taxes, it is one of the few certainties we face. Investing in good medical care and not taking too many needless risks generally helps prolong our time in this earth. While it is no use whatsoever in keeping you alive, a will can at least give effect to your wishes when you are gone. An enduring power of attorney won't assist in keeping you alive either, but will give you the knowledge that if cease to be able to make decisions in respect of your affairs someone you trust can make them for you.

What is a will?

Simply put a will is a document that complies with certain legal formalities. It sets out the wishes of a person as to what is to happen what they own when they die. Where no will exists the law provides for what happens your assets. In most instances this means that your spouse or civil partner is entitled to your entire estate if you do not have children. If you leave behind a spouse and children then two thirds goes to your significant other and the remaining third goes to your children. Beyond that the estate passes to your next of kin, and if after exhaustive efforts no next of kin can be located, it will go to the State.

Many people think that if they do not have a will the State will get a large proportion of your possessions. This is largely incorrect, except for the fact a will can allow a person to do a certain amount of tax planning. While gifts and inheritances made between spouses and civil partners are exempt from tax a cohabitant or partner is treated as a stranger for the purposes of tax. This can have dramatic


consequences. The recent budget provided that son/daughter can inherit up to €320,000 tax free, a parent, brother, sister, niece, nephew, grandchild and up to €32,500 tax free and anyone else only €16,250 tax free. Beyond these tax free thresholds, 33% of the value of the gift will be taxed. Ă will can allow you to distribute your estate in as efficient a manner as possible. There are also exemptions and reliefs available for some circumstances such as agricultural relief and business relief. You may also be able to reduce the tax burden by taking out an insurance policy.

The most difficult part in preparing a will can be deciding on who receives what. The law provides that where you have a spouse and no children then your spouse is entitled to half of your estate but where you have children then your spouse is entitled to one third. Children are not automatically entitled to anything, but a child may apply to court if one fails in their moral duty to provide for that child in some circumstances.

If you have young children it is important that your will contains directions for how you wish to have them cared for. This will normally mean appointing guardians and trustees to ensure your assets are be used to provide for the maintenance of your children. In every case you will need to appoint an executor who will see to it your wishes are given effect to.

Enduring Powers of Attorney

An Enduring Power of Attorney (EPA) is a legal document which allows you to to choose to appoint a specific individual (usually a close family member) to



look after your personal and financial affairs in the event that for any reason you lose your mental capacity in the future. It bears many similarities to a will in some ways; the chief one being that it must be prepared in a particular legal format by a person while they are sound mind. It differs in that it does not give anything away; it simply enables your appointed person ("ór attorney") to make decisions on your behalf. In preparing the EPA you must appoint two notice parties

Before the EPA can have any legal effect it must be registered in the offices of the High Court, and before it will be registered there are a number of checks and balances to protect the individual. The first one is that when preparing the EPA two people close to you were notified; they will be notified a second time. When preparing your EPA your Doctor and Solicitor confirmed you were in a position to execute such a document, they will be once more called upon to confirm you have now reached a stage where the EPA must be registered.

When the EPA is registered the Attorney will have the powers to act in accordance with the document you executed. As mentioned earlier this can include powers to make personal care decisions such as where and with whom you should live, and/or financial decisions in respect of your property.

Given its nature an EPA is a slightly more complex document to prepare that a will, but with the right advice it is a straightforward process. The benefit of having an EPA however is that you can choose a person who will look after your care and financial wellbeing. The alternative is often that the Courts will be left to make these decisions.



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Know Your Rights: Grants for Solar Panels - October 2018

Question: I heard that there is a new grant scheme for installing solar panels in your home. How does the scheme work and do I qualify?

Answer: The Solar PV scheme gives grants to install solar photovoltaic (PV) panels and a battery energy storage system at your home. This means you can generate and use renewable electricity in your home and reduce your electricity costs. The Solar PV scheme is a pilot scheme administered by the Sustainable Energy Authority of Ireland (SEAI).

To qualify for a grant you must:

- Be the owner of a home built and occupied before 2011 (or a home constructed after 2011 that was built to the 2008 Building Regula-
- Use new materials and products that were not already covered under another grant programme
- Use a registered contractor from the SEAI's Renewable Installers Register for Solar
- Have the electrical work completed by a Safe Electric Ireland electrician
- Apply to be connected to the electricity distribution system using the ESB Networks NC6 form.

- Have a Building Energy Rating (BER) carried out after the work is completed
- Agree to participate in SEAI research about the scheme The grant covers materials and labour, unless you are a contractor doing the work in your own home. In this case only the cost of the materials is covered. When the SEAI payment system opens (in October 2018) you can claim your grant online and it will be paid directly into your bank account.

Knockraha History and Heritage

Knockraha Celebrates 50 Year Since the Community Centre was Completed



The Knockraha Community Centre

The weekend of 18th November is a very important weekend in Knockraha marking the 50th anniversary since the completion of the Community Centre in 1968. There will be a number of events over the weekend to mark the occasion as this centre has played a huge part in the life of Knockraha and is now in constant use. To understand its importance we must go back to its inception.

After the end of the Second World

War, a new movement began to flourish, which Canon Haves of Bansha had started a few years previously. Muintir na Tire was now being firmly established in many parishes around the country. A very active guild was established in Knockraha which brought many improvements to the parish such as bus services, ESB, road repairs etc. Meetings were held in Knockraha School. Among other activities were lectures and card drives and it was felt that the parish needed a hall for these activities. In these days developments, such as the building of a hall, would have to get the consent of the parish priest, so the officers Moss O' Doherty, Master Daly, Jack Donovan and Con Dennehy went to Glounthaune to seek Canon O' Leary's permission. He listened attentively to the views of the delegation but his response was that, even though they may be building it for lectures, card drives etc., he believed that it would ultimately be used for dances, so therefore he would not give his permission, so that finished the building of the hall at that time. The school continued to be used as a Community Centre. However in 1957 the parish priest withdrew the school for use by organisations. All organisations were effectively put out on the street and only for local publican, Mick O' Donoghue, making his taproom available (which even had to be used by pioneers) many organisations could not keep going. The active organisations in the area started discussing looking for a permanent home for their meetings. Jon Hurley, who lived in the village and who was an active member of Muintir na Tire, knew that where he worked in the Brothers of Charity in Lota there was an old nissan hut. They were originally developed for military purposes; they were rounded galvanised structures with a timber floor. The one in Lota was 38 feet by 16. Even though it was rusty it could be bought for £25 and he felt it would do as a centre. So a hall committee consisting of representatives of all the organisations in Knockraha was set up on 9th February 1959.

The committee consisted of:

- Knockraha Hurling Club:Ned Howard, Tadgh Murphy
- NFA: James McAulliffe, Willie Hogan
- Pioneers: Robert McGrath, John Geary
- Macra na Feirme: Michael O' Doherty, Jim Fitzgerald
- Muintir na Tire: Patsy Higgins, Humphrey Collins

Officers were:

- Chairman: Ned Howard
- Secretary: Tadgh Murphy
- Treasurer: Jim Fitzgerald

The committee was to buy and erect the hut in Knockraha. The £25 purchase cost was made up by subscriptions of £10 NFA, £5 Hurling club, £10 Macra branch. The hut was demolished and brought down to Knockraha but it could never again be put together and it was eventually sold in pieces with a profit of £5. After that it was decided to build a proper hall; Mr E.P. McCarthy of Brookville donated the site free but there was an old building which had to be knocked. A fund-raising drive was set up. A card drive and carnival was held. A house-to-house collection was made which brought in around £300. It was hoped that the hall would be built by voluntary labour so the work of clearing the site began on 9th June 1958. The building was designed by Ned Fitzgerald, consulting engineer of Knockraha East. Voluntary labour took us to the top of the windows and no further; paid help had then to be got. The rate for tradesmen was 10 shillings an hour. Helpers were 3 shillings and 11 pence per hour. A cavity block was 7p, gravel 50p per ton, cement £8 per ton,, slates 8p each. An overdraft of £1200 had to be raised, guaranteed by trustees Con Cremin, Norman Fitzgerald and Jack O' Callaghan. The hall was opened on 11th December 1961 by local Muintir na Tire Chairman Con Cremin. It consisted of a wall, roof with no ceiling, cement floor with no offices or toilets. In 1964 the Macra club gave £100 for putting in a timber floor. The work was done by Cyril O' Donoghue. However even with their best efforts Muintir na Tire could not pay off the debt and the bank manager was being pressed by his head office to get it cleared. At this stage it was gone up to £2000.

In 1967 Muintir na Tire offered the hall to the Macra club for the amount of the debt. The Macra club did not want to buy it but if the hall went they would have nowhere to meet so they had not option but to take it over. Between 1967-1968, with voluntary labour, a ceiling was put in, toilets and offices erected, the meeting room was made comfortable and painted all over. It was opened as the Macra Centre by Joe Rea, National



Con Cremin of Meeleen. As chairman of Knockraha Muintir na Tire, he had the honour of officially opening the Knockraha Community Centre in the 1960s. Con was a great community activist and played a prominent role in the War of Independence being Lieutenant of the Knockraha Company. He was much involved in the operation of Sing-Sing and the making of hand grenades in Knockraha East

President on 30th October 1968. By hard work the Macra club paid off the debt. They set up a Hall Committee to run it which lasted over 20 years and the financial running of it fells back on the Macra club which now was not as strong as before. Some former members of the Macra club organised a 40th birthday party for the club in the Spring of 1997.

At these meetings the trustees of the hall came to the conclusion that Macra would not be able to run it any longer and as there was no suitable organisation to give it to, the only solution was to set up a new Community Council not based on any organisation but on the parish. Experts were called in and eventually Knockraha Community Council was formed and the hall was handed over to them, which guarantees its future for the parish.

The weekend of celebration will kick off on Friday 16th November with a huge ceili in the centre. Music will be supplied by the famous Donal Ring Ceili Band who has been a leader in the field for many years. Donal's daughter currently lives in our community. This is a night not to be missed. Prior to the event tickets can be bought from Michael Bowen or any committee member. The big event is Sunday morning which kicks off with 10am mass in Knockraha for the people who were involved in building the hall with a function in the Community Centre afterwards. Descendants of those who built the hall will be extremely welcome. There will be light refreshments for all with a historical display of the construction of the centre. There will also be an historical display on the Saturday by local organisations. During the lifetime of the hall many important and significant events were held within its 4 walls. In 1963 the meeting to form Erins Own Hurling Club was held in the hall. That club has since blazed a trail of gory winning 3 County Senior Hurling titles and titles in many other grades. Many of its members have worn the red jersey of Cork and represented their county with pride. Names such as Brian Corcoran, Timmy Kelleher, Kieran Murphy and many more became household names. In 1976 a very historical function was held when medals were presented to the surviving members of the Knockraha Volunteers 1916-1921 being given commemoration medals. 25 old IRA members were present to hear their Captain Martin Corry give a rousing address. The hall has been the centre of the Parish during the last century with many different organisations using it for their own events. Every Tuesday night for the Winter and Spring a progressive 45 drive is held, averaging 10 tables. The Community Centre is an integral part of life in Knockraha and we invite the Parish to come and join us in the celebration from 16-18th of November.

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
