An Treimhse Sásta Agus Bronach



The happy and sad period of the year is here and the most disagreeable month; November, has eventually passed by. However it is that special month when we remember our loved ones who have departed from us and this was exemplified by the large numbers who participated at the blessing of graves ceremonies which were held at the various parish burial grounds during the month. It is a sorrowful occasion but it brings great comfort to many at such a mournful time.

All burial grounds in the parish are presented in excellent condition and this is courtesy of those who attend to their upkeep on a voluntary basis, and the encouragement and support they receive from Cork County Council staff is also acknowledged. It should be noted that approved gravediggers' are employed by undertakers' and therefore are not County Council employees. Their work descriptive is self-explanatory; accordingly they do not attend to the upkeep of burial grounds. However during the celebration of Mass at St. Joseph's Cemetery in July; the "council workers", with the added advice that "they are not here tonight", received plaudits for maintenance and prayers were also offered for them. Let's face it; "even" the good Lord would have known who the rightful beneficiaries should have been so no doubt

He duly took stock of the situation! This matter is brought to attention for the sake of clarification for those who raised the issue subsequently either in a sincere or mischievous fashion. Incidentally, it is wholeheartedly agreed that the gravediggers' in question are extremely courteous and are ever so obliging. Grave digging and back-filling are much different from past times as the mini digger has replaced the barrow, pick and shovel and the back-filling is not actioned now until mourners have left. The previous practice was upsetting

and the sound of stones and earth falling on the coffin of loved ones showed a lack of consideration. Death is a sensitive subject and should be treated in a delicate, caring and supportive manner with utmost respect shown at all times. The common disrespectful practice observed, especially when interments are taking place, is that of walking on graves and with a little thought this could be so easily avoided. It should also be noted that dogs, except guide dogs accompanying persons with visual impairment, are not permitted in burial grounds.

And so December has arrived and Christmastime is nigh but the November sadness continues for many, especially for those who lost a loved one within the past vear. It is the time when the sense of loss through death is intensified to a greater degree and we remember with a heavy heart those who are not with us now to share the festive season. It is difficult, very difficult and it highlights the importance of cherishing and enjoying the company of thosé still in our lives, and that's what keeps us going. Those unique and wonderful happy memories which we experienced help us along the way and it does get a little easier over time, however there is always the grief that lives with us forever.

Memories are wonderful, they will last for eternity and we never know what tomorrow will bring. There was only one Christmas, the rest are anniversaries, and all are occasions when a person can endure the heartbreak of homesickness even when at home. Christmas is also a joyous period when many may be overcome with emótionál feelings of love and affection for those they cherish. People are so considerate, kind and helpful but of course such outpouring should not be confined to the festive period. It is a magical time for children whose innocence and radiant smiles display a sense of wonder and enormous happiness, and they are full of excitement and anticipation. They should enjoy now while being sheltered from; heartache, grief and the countless other difficulties of life which lie ahead. It is customary to exchange presents at Christmastime and twentieth century nov-

elist Oren Arnold suggested the following; to your enemy: Forgiveness, to an opponent: Tolerance, to a friend: Your Heart, to a customer: Service, to all: Charity, to every child: Good Example, and to your-self: Respect. A meaningful custom around here and beyond was to give the Postman, the Milkman and the Breadman a "Christmas Box" and while the latter two traditional services are sadly now surplus to requirements we still have the postal service so let's not forget this timehonoured practice. The term "Christmas Box" is derived from a custom in past times whereby the gentry gave presents to their servants at Christmas in small boxes. Incidentally, St. Stephen's Day, which commemorates first Christian martyr, is called Boxing Day in some countries and the reason here is that in bygone day's Donation Boxes were left in churches and the money therein was divided among the poor when opened on December 26th.

There are many Christmas symbols; the red berry holly is one and the Christian meaning is that it sprung from the footsteps of Christ as He walked the earth. The prickly pointed leaves is said to represent the crown of thorns He wore while on the cross with the red berries symbolising the blood He shed. Ivy is another and it's Christian meaning is that it has to cling to something in order to sup-port itself as it grows and this acts as a reminder that one must cling to God for sup-port in life. There is also the Christmas candle. In bygone days, and to an extent nowadays, it was positioned on the interior sill of a front window of the home and was first lit, usually by the youngest child, on 'Christmas' Eve. The candle was not extinguished before midnight and if there was a "Mary" in the home; she was the person to do so, otherwise another person was nominated. The Christian meaning is that it is a symbol of welcome to Mary & Joseph as they travelled looking for shelter on that night long ago, and the lighted candle served as a beacon for the lonely and homeless wayfarers as well.

It also indicated a safe place for priests to celebrate mass because this was prohibited during penal times. The candle remained in place until January 6th.as did the home decorations and in fact it was considered bad luck if they were removed before then. In bygone times there was a hive of activity in Glounthaune church on the days leading up to Christmas Day. The "Bean an Tí" of many homes in close proximity to the church brushed, dusted, washed and polished the interior and then beautified the altars with an impressive floral arrangement. The crib was erected in less than twenty minutes because it only entailed carrying the figures from storage at "The Loft" as it was known, the room above the sacristy, and placing them on the one-stepped marble floor at the right-hand side altar. Two nuns from Carrigtwohill Convent made an annual visit to the crib on foot because they were attracted by its simplicity. There was no vigil mass in those days and the first on Christmas Day was at eight am and the second mass was at eleven thirty am.

The Canon was the celebrant of the first and in the sacristy prior to mass he gave each of the altar boys a present of one shilling. A timber rail extended from pillar to pillar in the church back then and this prevented aisle to nave access. Also, the aisle on the right was dedicated to women and that on the left to men, while the pews in the nave were unisex! The 1917 Code of Canon Law stipulated that it was obligatory for women to cover their heads in church and in this respect there were curious contrasting styles evident at the Christmas day masses! Modest new headscarves were on display at the aisle on the right whereas stylish new hats and, if you dón't mind, black mantilla veils were exhibited, by the women that is, at the prestigious nave! A collection for the parish clergy was held at each mass and the names of those who contributed, as well as the amount of their donation was announced from the altar the following Sunday. Who would win the gold and who would end up at the bottom of the list? The speculation and suspense over the Christmas period was intense – simple times!

THE HIPPEASTRUM

Every corner of the garden is in retreat! The glare is feeble, and the colour has drained from everything apart from some frosted hydrangea blooms and chrome phormiums; pale beacons among the expanding brown and green. They remind me of streetlamps in fog. A watery light, shines through the small, measured window panes of the garden studio illuminating a jug with a single Rinjsvelds 'Early Sensation' daffodil-a reminder more than decoration that spring will soon be on the way even though the winter solstice is still a fortnight and more away. This variety blooms in early December and a huge number can be seen at Blarney Castle from about this week through to early spring.

I peep out and watch for signs of movement through each pane in turn. Nothing moves in the persistent drizzle, nothing stirs anywhere!

In desperation I reflect on the only urgency over the coming days; the removal of fallen and decaying leaves from gutters, drains and pond along with potting a pair of Hippeastrum bulbs (Amaryllis) sourced from Aldi across the road. Why do so many fail to bring these into bloom the year after purchase? All succeed following purchase, few repeat the spectacle. These oversized bulbs are usually found in garden outlets in the run-up to Christmas; huge fattened things, some as large as swede turnips (and weighing almost as much) either stuffed into ridiculously small pots containing just a fist-full of compost, or displayed heaped together, one on top of another in spacious brown wicker baskets.

Much of the failure rate has to do with heat (the lack of it) for it they are to be flowered during early January and later adequate

temperatures and perfect light must be provided from the outset. However, if you are prepared to wait until April for those mighty trumpet-shaped blooms, (three, four and even five to a stem), then they can be stood on a bright windowsill and allowed to perform in their own good time.

Hippeastrums, unlike the majority of bulbs, begin their cycle of growth by flowering. A stout naked stem (or stems) rises from the neck of the bulb to two feet and more, terminating eventually in a group of buds which open to reveal several trumpet-shaped blooms of massive proportions. The whole spectacle is wonderfully impressive. Later, the long strappy leaves arrive, and it is then that watering and feeding must commence and be diligently maintained right through to late summer. Towards July, watering can be restricted so that the leaves yellow and die away naturally and the bulb goes into a state of rest for all of September and October.

As soon as mid-November arrives, the tips of fresh young foliage will once again be noticed emerging from the neck of the half-buried bulb, and the cycle of growth and flowering can begin all over again. However, some re-potting will be needed for the compost (now in its second season) will contain very little by way of nutrients.

If the old compost is gently teased away from around the base of the bulb using an old biro or pencil as a scraper, the exercise will only take minutes. Top up with fresh "Seed and Potting" compost (allow the top one third of the bulb to remain uncovered) water to settle, and replace into its bright, warm position. Don't water again until active growth commences for the main danger to successful blooming

will be from overwatering. Too much too soon would end in a sorry mush. Success will surely follów.

THE DECEMBER GARDEN

WONDERS OF FROST The first severe frosts have arrived in the far south. Due to extreme wetness it froze the ground instantly rupturing weed and plant roots in the process, and those that were not killed by its dramatic arrival, will now suffer a slow death from fungal disorders which normally follow. Of stealth-like nature, frost neither rises from the ground nor falls from the air yet its presence and formation can be detected in the stillness of the evening air and by the intense cold which precedes it. Like steam on a cold kitchen mirror, frost condenses and distils during the hours of darkness, to disappear like a bad odour once the morning sun rises. It burns with the intensity of lightening, yet it moves about in the darkness like a meandering stream pooling at times to form vast lakes which can chill down into the subsoil. At other times, its shallow tendrils reach out to strike in one area leaving an adjoining plot unscathed! Predicting where it is likely to strike hardest is impossible so

newcomers to gardening should note that it will sometimes lurk in shady corners long after sunrise, and low-lying areas will always be worst hit.

HELLEBORES Between now and early spring is the ideal time to buy container-grown hellebores! Because they start flowering as early as the beginning of January you can choose plants in full bloom especially those with attractive colours. Double flowered hybrids are rather special (even in monetary terms) and worth seeking out as are varieties of H. 'Blackthorn Group'. Provided the ground is neither frozen nor waterlogged planting can take place after some enriching of the proposed site. Hellebores grow particularly well in partial shade and are good on limestone and chalk provided they're kept well mulched

with organic materials. Good specimens can be found at 'Hillside Nurseries'

Nuair a labhraítear faoin Nollaig le blianta beaga anuas, is é a ritheann le formhór an phobail ná ceiliúradh ina gcaitear an t-uafás airgid, ina mbíonn bia, deoch, ceiliúradh riachtanach.

Cé go bhfuil an ghné spioradálta fós ann, tá sé éirithe níos deacra aon spás a fháil chun breith Chríost a cheiliúradh. Má fhéachann duine timpeall sna siopaí, feictear dó go mbíonn na hearraí Nollag ar na seilfeanna roimh Oíche Shamhna. Tá na hearraí ag éirí níos soifisticiúla agus níos daoire agus de dheasca na bhfógraí mealltacha a thaispeántar ar an teilifís agus arlíne, cruthaítear éileamh a chuireann in iúl don saol go gcaithfear na hearraí seo a cheannach

más mian le duine tairbhe cheart a bhaint as an gceiliúradh. Tá an saol ag éirí níos éadoimhne, mar is eol dúinn, cé go bhfuil daoine agus grúpaí ann a dhéanann a ndícheall teacht i gcabhair ar dhaoine atá ar an ngannchuid. Bíonn grúpaí carthanachta gníomhach ag bailiú airgid ar na sráideanna chun teacht i gcabhair ar na daoine is boichte sa séasúr beannaithe. Inniu, ceannaíonn daoine maisiúcháin de gach cineál chun na tithe a mhaisiú agus is geall le comórtas idir comharsaña na sóilse aibhléise a lastar laistigh agus lasmuigh de na tithe.

Is mór idir saol an lae inniu agus an saol in Éirinn faoi mar a fheictear é i litríocht na Gaeilge. Thart ar chéad bliain ó shin, scríobh Peig Sayers scéal a beatha. Déanann sí cursíos ar an Nollaig sa Daingean ina hóige. Bhí sí in aimsir i dtigh Uí Chorráin agus í ag obair timpeall an tí agus ag tabhairt aire do na páistí óga sa tigh. Déanann sí cursíos ar thuras go dtí an Séipéal leis na páistí Séamaisín agus Eibhlín:

'Rugas ar láimh orthu. Bhuaileamar siar. Bhí an oíche dorcha, ach má bhí féin, chífeá fríd ar an sráid ag lóchrann na gcoinnle go léir sna fuinneoga. Nuair a chuamar don séipéal, moladh le Rí na Naomh! b'álainn an radharc é, lampaí solais ar lasadh agus an altóir déanta suas fé bhrat coinnle ar dearglasadh.

Bhí an Crib ag taobh den altóir, agus chuirfeadh sé Flaitheas Dé i gcuimhne don té is daille dár mhair riamh. Bhí na Mná Rialta ag seinnt duanta binne diaga. Is ar mo chroí a bhí an gliondar agus an t-aoibhneas bheith ag éisteacht leis an gceol sin, mar nár chuala riamh roimhe a leithéid.

Nuair a bhí na páistí imithe a chodladh, bhí Peig i dteannta mhuintir an tí, Neil agus Séamas agus d'aithris sí "Fáilte an Linbh Íosa" dóibh:

"Seacht gcéad déag fáilte Naoi n-uaire is fiche Roimh Mac Dé na Glóire Is na Maighdine Muire,
A thuirling 'na broinn ghlórmhar
'Na Dhia is 'na Dhuine,

and feel out of sorts or irritable. Others have worse symptoms that interfere with relationships work.

Because the lack of enough daylight during wintertime is related to SAD, it's less often found in countries where there's plenty of sunshine year-round.

It's also possible that some people are more vulnerable to SAD as a result of their genes, as some cases appear to run in families.

Symptoms of SAD can include: a persistent low mood, a loss of pleasure or interest in normal everyday activities; irritability; féeling lethargic (lacking in energy) and sleepy during the day. Sleeping for longer than normal and finding it hard to get up in the morning, and gaining weight are other symptoms. For some people, these symptoms can be severe and have a significant impact on their day-to-day activities. Tréatments for SAD

SIL

A range of treatments are available for SAD. Your GP will recommend the most suitable treatment programme for you.

The main treatments are: lifestyle measures - including getting as much natural sunlight as possible, exercising regularly and managing your stress levels. Talking therapies – such as cognitive behavioural therapy (CBT) or counselling are uséful.

antidepressant medication such as selective seroto-nin reuptake inhibitors (SS-

Natural or "full spectrum" light can have an antidepressant effect.

A full-spectrum bright light shines indirectly into your eyes. You sit about 2 feet away from a bright light -- about 20 times brighter than normal room lighting. The therapy starts with one 10- to 15-minute session per day. Then the times increase to 30 to 45 minutes a day, depending on your response.

Some people with SAD re-

cover within days of using light therapy. Others take much longer.

People who respond to light therapy are encouraged to continue it until they can be out in the sunshine again in the springtime. While side effects are minimal, be cautious if you have sensitive skin or á history of bipolar disorder. Spend some time outside every day, even when it's cloudy. The effects of daylight still help.

Many doctors recommend that people with SAD get outside early in the morn-ing to get more natural light. If this is impossible because of the dark winter months, antidepressant medications or light ther-(phototherapy) may heĺp.

Don't brush off that yearly feeling as simply a case of the "winter blues" or of the "winter blues" or a seasonal funk that you have to tough out on your own. Take steps to keep your mood and motivation steady throughout the year.







Know Your Rights: Grants for Solar Panels - Novem-

Question

We're way behind with our mortgage and can't pay our other bills either. We're afraid that the bank will take our home - they keep sending us letters. What can we do?

Answer

You can contact MABS, the Money Advice and Budgeting Service, to get help under the scheme of aid and advice for borrowers in home mortgage arrears. Contact the MABS Helpline: 0761 07 2000 (9am - 8pm, Mon - Fri) or your local MABS office.

This scheme is part of Abhaile, the national Mortgage Arrears Resolution Service. It provides a range of services to help you to deal with your situation, including financial advice, legal advice and insolvency advice.

Abhaile is coordinated by the Departments of Justice and Equality, and Employment Affairs and Social Protection. It is operated by MABS along with the Insolvency Service of Ireland (ISI), the Legal Aid Board and the Citizens Information Board. Panels of qualified and regulated professionals provide services under Abhaile.

You will qualify for advice and assistance under Abhaile if:

- · You are insolvent this means that you are unable to pay your debts in full as they fall due and
- You are in mortgage arrears on your home and
- You are at risk of losing your

home (for example, if your mortgage lender has initiated repossession proceedings or indicated that they plan to do so; if they have said that they consider you to be noncooperating; or if they have asked you to consider selling or surrendering your home)

 The costs of staying in your home are proportionate to your reasonable accommodation needs

You can contact MABS to check if you are eligible for Abhaile (as eligibility is decided case by case). Read more about Abhaile on mabs.ie.




