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Knockraha History & Heritage

When Martin Corry T.D. Fell Foul of the Catholic Church

In any discussion of the War of Independence in Cork the name of Martin Corry will invariably come up. But unfortunately many revisionist historians have a slanted view of his activities during the War of Independence, arising from the fact that none of them properly researched his activities, some even suggesting he was a psychopath. During the War of Independence Martin Corry was an uncompromising Irish Republican believing that military force was the only way to establish an Irish Republic. But once the War was over and Freedom had been attained he severed all his links with militarism and from being elected to the Dail in 1927 he got in in every election until he retired in 1969, topping the poll on many occasions. As a politician he devoted his life to bettering the lot of his constituents in North East Cork where he was a fearless fighter on their behalf. He was an extensive farmer and was a major beet grower. For many years he was chairmen of the Irish Sugar Beet Growers Association. He was

much involved in the development of the Irish Sugar Industry and he was chairman for many years of Erin Foods in Midleton. When he died in 1979, even though there was a strict rule that only parishioners could be buried in Midleton cemetery, the PP Canon Rea waved the rule because Martin did so much for East Cork. So he was buried near the church in Midleton.

Martin was born in 1889. His family came from West Clare. His father was one of 13 who, to get employment joined the Royal Irish Constabulary and by 1903 had risen to the rank of District Inspector based in Tuckey Street in Cork City. Martin claimed that his Nationalism came from being with his grandfather in West Clare, a great Nationalist area. In 1903 King Edward VII came to view the Cork Exhibition in the Mardyke.

It was Martin's father who was overseeing the security of the King but in spite of that Martin, as a pupil of PBC Western Road, with a few of his friends, organised a protest against the King, much to the annoyance of his father who after that took him out of the City to Martin's mother's area in Mourne Abbey. But there he made the acquaintance of the future-to-be murdered Lord Mayor of Cork Tomas McCurtin. So his father again moved him down to Glounthaune where he said things were quieter.

When he came to Glounthaune he immediately set about forming a Company of the Volunteers and he called a meeting in an unused labourers house in Ballinbrittig. A Company was set up and Martin was elected Captain, a post he held up to the Truce in July 1921. That cottage in which the Company was formed became known as Liberty Hall, which is still intact. He started with 7 Volunteers but by 1919 it had grown to over 90 with 18 girls in Cumann na mBan. It became known as E Company in the 4th batallion and was part of the Cork No. 1 Brigade. During the War the branch did normal Company activities such as assisting the Capturing of RIC Barracks in Carrigtwohill Cloyne, the felling of trees to stop British re-enforcements, drilling mining roads, knocking bridges and was active as security for brigade officers when they were in the Knockraha area. But by orders of Sean Hegarty, O.C. of the Cork No. 1 Brigade, they ran 2 underground factories for the making of hand grenades in Knockraha.

All in all they made over 3,000 grenades which were distributednationally. The grenades were an important arsenal for the IRA and proved very effective. The molds for making the grenades were manufactured in the Ford Motor Company foundry in the Marina by IRA Volunteers. These were shown on TV this summer as National Treasurers with John Creedon and were on display in the Museum of Country Life in Castlebar. In Kilquane graveyard in Knockraha is an ancient vault which was used as a prison by the Cork No. 1 Brigade and it became known as Sing Sing where up to 100 prisoners were held and up to 25 Black n'Tans auxiliaries and spies were executed out of.

<u>"NÍL AON GLEANNTÁN MAR DO GLEANNTÁN FÉIN" GLOUNTHAUNE NEWS</u> BY "THE FOREIGN CORRESPONDENT"

THE BICENTENARY



It is 2019 and what a significant year for our picturesque Village; Glounthaune.

When built in 1819 it was known as New Glanmire, which is engraved on the wall of the second house on the right, and Glounthaune became its official name circa 1878. In November 2011 local historian Paddy Twomey gave an excellent presentation at a function held at the Rising Tide to commemorate the bicentenary of the "Dry Bridge" and he also referenced the Village in his talk. Paddy provided an in-depth historical account and this is an opportune time to revisit and include much of his well-researched material.

Fr. Murrough Keane was appointed by Bishop Moylan to Caherlag Parish - Kilguane / Caherlag in 1791 and he was responsible for the building of a church at the Quay. The church was built in 1803, predating the Village by sixteen years and this was twenty six years prior to Catholic Emancipation. The cost involved was five to six hundred pounds and in 1853, valuation wise, it was the largest building in the village at twelve pounds.

The final mass at the Quay church was celebrated on Sunday April 24th.1898. The 1811 Grand Jury map of the area, surveyed circa 1798, shows that there was a bridge at Dunkettle townland that commenced at the Rectory and passed east of Dunkettle House, emerged at Kilcoolishal and continued on in front of Rockgrove House. The roadway from Rockgrove proceeded along adjacent to the inlet which opened up the Quay area and fronted the church.

The subsequent opening of a drawbridge over the Glashaboy River at Dunkettle greatly facilitated the new road arrangement, particularly the connection at the southern frontage of Dunkettle House to join up with the exit at Kilcoolishal, and a bypass at Glanmire for those destined east. Prior to this all eastbound traffic from the city travelled over Glanmire Bridge via the Old Youghal Road and this would have resulted in a great deal more traffic, including the twice daily Cork-Waterford mail coach, passing through the Village.

The population of the Village in 1841 was reputed to be two hundred whereas in 1851 it was down to one hundred and sixty seven. The quality of the houses was considered to be superior and the valuation of even the smaller houses in the Village averaged about three pounds and ten shillings because most were two stories and slated. This means that the quality of those houses was on par with good farm-houses or town houses and had from five to nine rooms. Several of the larger houses averaged seven pounds valuation and those were obviously of the superior type and required the patronage of a benevolent landlord.

Fr. Keane died on February 23rd.1823 and Fr. Samuel Lucey was appointed his successor. He built a school adjoining the Quay Church in the Village two years later at a cost of one hundred and fifty pounds and in 1837 there were two hundred and fifty children attending. In 1853 the building had a three pounds valuation which pertaining to schools at the time suggests that it was a fairly substantial building. Fr. Lucey, who served here for thirty nine years, died in 1862 at the age of seventy six and he is the longest serving parish priest at Glounthaune. In accordance with his last wishes he is interred in the churchyard at Knockraha which in fact is the only grave there.

Interesting that the surname inscribed on his gravestone facing the church is "Lucy" whereas it is "Lucey" facing the roadside and the Diocesan records show "Lucey" as well. He was responsible for the building of the school at Knockraha and he was also involved in the reconstruction of the church.

In 1853, in addition to the church, school and houses in New Glanmire Village; there was also a small Mill, a butcher's shop and the following buildings of note: an RIC barracks, office, yard and small garden with a valuation of seven pounds and ten shillings. There was a dispensary with a valuation of two pounds which was in the occupancy of Bridget Daly. There was also a forge and in 1853 the blacksmith was Patrick Colbert and in 1901 it was Daniel Long. In fact the Long family had several forges in the parish over the years including one adjacent to the crossroads north of the Dry Bridge; hence its local name "Forge Cross".

A licensed premises, known as "The Rising Tide" at time of writing! – an appropriate name would be; "The 1819", "The New Glanmire" or "The Bicentenary" - was located in the Village and the first licensee was Michael Aherne. It was originally a tied house of Beamish & Crawford and in circa 1885 the Donnelly family became licensees' and continued the business for plus one hundred years. The building incorporated a shop until the seventies and for a period during the early part of the twentieth century an upstairs room was utilised as a courtroom. This was also accessed from the exterior by a stone stairway which was located at the western end.

The stone wall in the immediate area of the Village is Redstone and that on the southern side is Limestone, which was almost certainly transported from Little Island, and the lands eastward plus the reclamation wall adjacent to the Parochial House is built of Redstone.

There were further major changes following a decision circa 1854 to construct the Cork - Youghal -Queenstown rail line. The railway company acquired land adjoining the Village and this necessitated the redesign of the New Glanmire Village roadway. Consequently the Village became a cul-de-sac therefore a bridge was constructed over the rail line for ingress and egress and how striking it is today one hundred and sixty years later. Incidentally the Dunkettle to Midleton section of the line opened on November 10th. 1859.

A road was built south of the bridge downwards to the Village, as is today, and the railway company also constructed two stone pedestrian step-ways which are still in place and are known as the "Back Steps", which is adjacent to "The Bridge", and the "Small Steps" which is further down. Additional ground became available in the Village following this re-alignment and in 1883 it was acquired from a member of the Falkiner family as a site for a Parochial House. The railway company

granted a small parcel of its land to the parish in order to facilitate a pedestrian walkway from the Parochial House to the "Back Steps". This was circa 1898 and the walkway still exists today.

A site for a new school, where the Quay Church and the Old School were located, was accepted by Cork County Council per letter dated July 20th.1898. The new school, the present day Community Centre, was opened in 1901 and in time the church authorities built two dwellings in the Village which are in private ownership today. One was designated to the Principal and the other to the teacher whose duties also included that of organist at the church. The school closed in June 1981 and was replaced by the present-day Scoil An Chroí Naofa. The foregoing gives a flavour of the Village in bygone days and bear in mind that it predates the Great Famine by some twenty six years.

It is important to acknowledge the 2019 milestone and there are various ways of commemorating this remarkable occasion. For example; the flying of a bicentenary welcoming banner at the Village entrance; enhancing the Village with bunting and flags; fitting commemorative name plaques where the above referenced structures are, or were located; applying a bicentenary theme to the St. Patrick's Day Parade; arrange a celebration of an open-air mass at the "Small Field" as a remembrance of past residents who have gone to their eternal reward, and the mass would also act as a reminder that the Village was built around the Quay Church; Glounthaune N.S. pupils should have an input in the celebrations as a recognition of the one hundred and fifty six years of education provided at the two schools in the Village; have a bicentenary themed fancy dress BBQ; arrange a Family Fun Day to include the planting of a commemorative tree and also engage in children games of the period. These are some suggestions but it is the Village residents, with support from the wider community, who should decide what is fitting. Let the celebrations begin!



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A DELIGHTFUL NEW YEAR SCENT

Winter can be very bleak and for many there's little in the garden to tempt them outside when it's cold and wet. Most have been sated by summer's generosity, so they allow themselves and their gardens a winter break while concentrating on other seasonal pleasures. And yet, anyone who abandons the garden altogether during winter can hardly be called a winter can hardly be called a keen gardener. I'm not for a moment advocating a mad rush outdoors every time it stops raining and the biting winds moderate, but a half hour today, perhaps, and another during the week ahead would certainly work wonders for the gardener's constitution if not the general appearance of the garden.

garden. In saying that, I look back in these blanched and pinched days to winters past. Then, fully active and in my 20's I was an all-weather gardener and nothing (but total darkness) drove me indoors. In my 30's I stopped gardening in the rain and in my late 40's drew the line at gardening in biting east winds. In my 50's I put off till the morrow what should have been done on the day, and now that I have reached an indeterminable age, the only gardening jobs I do in winter are the vital kind; keeping the driveway clear of leaves, ice and debris, covering tender plants, feeding the birds, putting out bait for possible vermin, and watching for the arrival of the first bulbs of the new season.

And yet this month and next And yet this month and next are the very best for distributing fragrance around the garden! In summer, there is always too much competition from barbecues, suntan lotion, and new-mown grass, but the scents of winter-flowering shrubs so freely distilled and dispensed, seem to hang forever in the cold air. With these, there is little need to bury your nose in the need to bury your nose in the flower.

Sarcococca, the Christmas box, is one of these, the most wonderful of the evergreen,

THE JANUARY GARDEN

Behind the church spire across the road, and above the roar of traffic and smell of burning clutches I can hear the tearing sound of a chain saw in a distant garden. How the noise suits the hurt being imposed upon a living wonder! Is some ornamental tree being reduced to firewood and sawdust following those recent gales? Perhaps it is just a limb at the winter-flowering fragrant shrubs. Flowering in the dead of winter the blooms can be white or pink-tinged, yet tiny enough to go unnoticed among its three-inch long dark-green leaves. However, they work overtime producing vast quantities of perfume that will, on a calm day, catch your olfactory senses from 20 feet and more. It's a determined olfactory senses from 20 feet and more. It's a determined little plant, flourishing in sun or shade and in any kind of soil. Gradually it will attain a height of about two feet and in the process make a kind of thicket from which bits may be prised for propagation. It also suckers freely, and these may be dug and replanted at virtually any time of the year. The blooms are sometimes followed by red or black berries, another reason why this plant is another reason why this plant is gaining popularity with flower ărrangers.

The variety most often offered for sale (also the most suited to small gardens) is the variety humilis-sometimes variety húmilis-sometimes sold under its common name of Christmas Box. It is the smallest in the entire family. When planting, try to follow on with an under-planting of snowdrops in February. Then, the white of the snowdrops will not alone look handsome (set against the dark evergreen leaves of the Sarcococca) but when you draw pear to inspect when you draw near to inspect the snowdrop bulbs you'll get zapped with the delicious scent! Its only drawback? The shrub is nothing handsome to

very worst, but the noise goes on and on and I fear for yet another arboreal

treasure. My trees, I hope, will never be cut down even though the advice of experts is to remove them whilst still manageable. A large Cherry to the front of the bungalow had to be removed some years ago and we have never quite recovered from the shock of seeing it go! A fine specimen of silver birch in the back garden alongside a tiered

look at and its best hidden (yes hidden!) behind other shrubs. For all that, keep it within range of the dwelling for you won't be disappointed.

SNIPPETS

SNIPPETS Nothing is more heartening in the cold months that to bring in snippets of flowering plants from the garden! Sprigs of Sarcococca (see article above) will perfume a whole room four up to a week, and a well-established daphne can easily spare a few stems, mixed perhaps with winter honeysuckle-though this will only last a couple of days. Prize picking must be the fabulous iris unguicularis-pick them while still tightly rolled and witness the amazing striped blossoms unfurl in a glass vase in your sitting room!

CHRISTMAS AZALEAS

The big secret with these beautiful potted wonders is țo put them into a cool place (such as a spare room, cold greenhouse or shady porch) until needed as decoration during the Christmas festivities. But remember to water them But remember to water them regularly otherwise they will up and die. They must never dry out, even for a single day! If you live in a hard-water area, be sure to use rainwater. Once late January arrives, they can be put outside to grow and enlarge during summer. Remove them from their pots before planting out and again, keep a constant out and again, keep a constant check on their watering needs.

Cornus controversa variegata remain, filling not alone a deep bed with their searching roots, but airspace the size of two bedrooms and a kitchen! These are going to outlast the both of us and part of our kinship with them is the knowledge that they will do just that. May we always have them and value the sound of their leaves as they fill and live full lives in the high canopy.

Ba é Art Ó Gríofa, an bunaitheoir, a dúirt go mbeadh caoi againn rudaí a dhéanamh dúinn féin, nach mbeimis ag brath ar fhórsaí seachtracha chun rudaí a dhéanamh dúinn. Cé nár éirigh le polaiteoirí na linne sin gach rud a bhí ar intinn acu a bhaint amach, is féidir a rá go rabhadar dearfach agus sásta aghaidh a thabhairt ar na dúshláin mhóra a bhí rompu. Thógadar cinneadh agus sheasadar leis. Bhí coimisiúin agus comhairleoirí gann na laethanta úd.

Bhí Cliseadh Wall Street ann ag deireadh na bhfichidí agus thosaigh Cogadh eacnamaíochta idir Éire agus An Bhreatain ag tús na 1930idí. Chruthaigh an dá rud san deacrachtaí móra don tír. Ach ba iad san na blianta in ar thóg na Comhairlí Áitiúla na mílte tithe i gcathracha na hÉireann, a thug deis do dhaoine a bhí ag maireachtaint i slumaí agus i dtionóntáin éalú ó na drochchoinníollacha san. As we enter the New Year, many of us start to think about our health, and what kind of positive changes we can make to our lifestyle. Of course, for a large proportion of us (myself included!), one of the most important changes we can make is to try and achieve a healthy weight.

As we all know, it is very easy to eat too much at Christmas time - all the mince pies, mulled wine and tins of Roses come back to haunt us. Unfortunately, this increase in food is rarely matched by exercise, and so, as the days get darker, the pounds have a worrying tendency to pile on.

According to the World Health Organisation, more than a quarter of Irish adults are now obese, and the proportion is only expected to rise.

This is obviously something of great concern, as obesity is associated with a higher risk for many diseases - in fact, obesity is now the largest preventable cause of death in the world and on average reduces life expectancy by about six years.

Clearly then, it's important for us to make changes. But what's the best way to do this? Something we should acknowledge is that it cannot be a temporary diet that we abandon once we reach our goal - this will just allow us to undo all of work as soon as we've com-

pleted it.

Rather, we should make permanent lifestyle changes - start something that you can maintain.

It is very tempting to get lost in all of the "fad" diets, especially in the New Year – no carbs, fast two days out of seven, only eat one meal per day, cut out gluten and so on.

What really matters is just reducing your net calories in a way that you can keep up. Slow and steady progress re weight loss is the goal.

A good guide is that every chocolate biscuit takes approx. 1 km of jogging to burn off! It's a lot easier not to eat too much. Weight loss groups where individu-

als attend, such has Slimming World, Weight Watchers etc have being shown to be of benefit. Operation Transformation also can act as a spur to get people motivated.

The challenge re exercise is to do approx 45 mins of exercise 5 times a week. It can be brisk walking, jogging, cycling or swimming.

You do not need to do huge amounts of exercise but the challenge is that a lot of people do very little or no exercise at all.

The best nutritional advice hasn't changed in decades - less alcohol, red meat and processed foods, and more vegetables and exercise.
