Q. How often do we meet?

A. Directors meet on second Monday of every month

Public meetings are held-5/6 times a year or as required. All public meetings are advertised on Community News, and Facebook. We will also use other established sites in the future

Q. How do we operate?

A. The association is the umbrella body for 13 sub-committees which include for example- senior citizens, indoor bowling, heritage, community games, community pitches, etc.

We have insurance cover that includes the build-ings, and all the activities

of the various sub-committees.

Q. Who owns the Community Centre, in Riverstown.

A. It is owned by the Trustees of the Catholic Diocese of Cork. It was formerly the old school house.

We are in possession on a long lease.

Q. Who were the last 3 chairpersons of the Community Association?

Q. Two major projects in recent years.

A. (1) Procurement of land and development of pitches in Brooklodge for the use of all the clubs and schools. (2) Getting planning permission and building the childrens playground. At present grant applications are being finalised to help pay for the completion work of the community pitches and dressing rooms. Much more needs to be done.

TIMES PAST

It is difficult to grasp that almost nine years has slipped by since the mother of all parish events was held at the Radisson Hotel, Little Island on Monday May 21st.2010. The occasion was the launch of Paddy Twomey's splendid publication; "The Way We Were" which is a history of Little Island & District. The event attracted an attendance of plus four hundred and fifty and it was probably the most important happening in parish life since the foundation stone of the iconic Sacred Heart Church was laid some one hundred and fourteen years previous; July 26th.1896.

There was another large gathering at the hotel four years later; on Thursday July 3rd.2014 for the launch of Paddy's second book; "From an Acorn to an Oak" which covers the history of the Erins Own club for the twenty five year period 1988 to 2013. The author in guestion is of course the very same Paddy who "brought the house down" with his Luciana Pavarotti performance, handkerchief and all, at the Erins Own "Strictly Lip Sync" function held at the Radisson Hotel on Saturday November 4th.2017. Who will ever forget the gusto rendering of "Nessun Dorma", the apt translation being; "Nobody Shall Sleep", or when eventually leaving the stage; that audience scream of "Ole Patrizio" and his heartfelt pleading retort; "Per favore chia-mami Pavarotti". Well the versatile Paddy is about to hit "centre stage" again with the publication of another book with a self-explanatory title; "Times Past".

This relates to the Little Island and Glounthaune areas and it includes a dedicated chapter relative to Glounthaune Village, formerly New Glanmire which celebrates its bicentenary this year. The chapter includes detailed historical background to; dwelling houses, the church at the quay; the first school in the village; the 1901 new school; the teacher's houses; the Parochial House and walkway; the constabulary barracks; the dispensary; the licensed premises; the quay walls and the changes that materialised in the village with the arrival of the railway. The aforementioned gives a flavour but there are numerous other interesting and informative aspects of the village in "Times Past". For example: Paddy draws attention to the fact that there was a blacksmith in nearly every village and town in Ireland and that Glounthaune was no different. Patrick Colbert was the blacksmith in the village in 1853 and a member of the Long family, Daniel, was the blacksmith in 1901. His son John (Jack) was an apprentice blacksmith and the Long family had several forges in the parish, including one at the Forge Cross, north of the "Dry Bridge", which probably replaced that in the village with the arrival of the railway. Jack later became proprietor of the present-day "Great O' Neill Pub"; in "times past" called "The Rising Tide" and his vegetable garden / orchard where the Waterside Apartment Block now stands was his pride and joy. The "Long" family link to the area continues because Jack's granddaughter Mary (Moloney) is a Johnstown Park resident. The community is eagerly looking forward to the book which will be published; well, it won't be "long" now!

JOHNSTOWN CAR & CAMPERVAN PARK

The popularity of the commuter rail link, known as "The Metro" in leafy Glounthaune albeit a misnomer is reflected in the observation of a daily full car park at Glounthaune station and the overflow parked on the shoulder of the roadway outside. The latter creates a traffic hazard as vehicles which stop and maneuver into position interfere with the main flow of traffic, and the visibility when exiting the car park is also very much restricted. One of the many issues referenced in the Local Area Plan pertaining to Glounthaune is the recognition that additional car parking spaces are required close to the station. The recent announcement that the two lots of council-owned land opposite

the station are to be developed as a public car park, with the added facility to accommodate campervans. is to be welcomed. This land was previously owned by C.I.E. and was purchased by Cork County Council in the late fifties for road alignment purposes. The former N25, the L3004 since 1997 when the East Cork Parkway opened, followed a winding route the course of which may still be identified as a total of eight tracts between Burys Bridge and the Elm Tree are clearly visible.

The road alignment which was carried out in the early sixties resulted in the formation of the land in guestion and now more than fifty years later it will be put into practical use. Cork County Council has unveiled plans for the much needed car park facility; the extreme eastern section of the larger parcel of land is to be dedicated for campervan use. It will have a green coloured perimeter security fencing consisting of close mesh three metre panel widths which multi-lift to a height of four metres. Pressed V beams are featured and for additional strength and rigidity are reinforced by a four millimetre vertical and a six metre horizontal diameter wire across the full panel width. Point lighting set into the ground will surround the parking bays and floodlighting will illuminate the surroundings. Fresh water refilling points and connections to the main sewer will also be provided.

An eighteen hundred square foot building will be constructed between the council-owned land and the open green space area fronting the Johnstown Park housing estate. The planting of Japanese Knotweed, which is a traditional plant in the area, will part-screen the structure. The building will contain cooking facilities, a library, a games room, shower and toilet facilities and a laundry. A curfew on socialising and plaving of loud music will apply after two a.m. The remainder of the land, including the parcel at the western end, will be exclusively utilised as a car park and a manned kiosk and barrier will be positioned at both entrances on the northern side. An automated car wash facility as well as charging points to accommodate electric vehicles will also be provided. Tariffs have not yet been finalised but will be applicable on an occupancy per vehicle basis and should any passengers alight vehicles prior to entering the car park; it will be captured on CCTV. It is expected that children under two years of age will be free of charge and that students will have a reduced rate, but an increased adult rate will be levied on those with a free travel pass. The park operators will contribute one euro per every ten thousand vehicles utilising the facility to the local Tidy Towns committee.

Residents in the immediate vicinity say that they are not at all happy with "the monster" being imposed on their doorstep. Nimby Carr, who bemoans the reality that she is not "a local" as she is only residing in the area for just over forty five years now, is one such resident and is particularly concerned with the volume of traffic that the park will attract. She ridicules the fact that a building will be constructed opposite "elegant homes" and that Japanese Knotweed is to be planted despite recent local efforts of eradicating it. She has uneasiness about the late-hour socialising aspect in the campervan area and also the obtrusive floodlighting.

She berates the park operators for their meagre contribution to the Tidy Towns and classifies it as an insult. She asserts that from her observation those that park on the public roadway are mainly residents from the Greater Glounthaune Area; estates such as "Thornberry", "Corryfield", "Cois Cuain" and remarks; "they should display civic duty by walking to the Metro and there would then be no necessity for an additional car park". However her big gripe is that heretofore it appeared by its presentation that the land in question was part of the Johnstown Park housing estate and savs: "local residents carried out significant work in 2010 which included felling of mature boundary trees and demolishing a nearby old rustic boundary wall to purposely create that landscape; and this work is all in vain now". Well, this is the April 1st. issue of Area News and it is pleasing to report on such a much-needed facility. Beep! Beep!

MEMORIES AMID THE RAINS

There has always been an amazing variety of rain here in the far south. Fat rain splashes easily and heavily as it lands on soft foliage and drenching needles through drizzĭe cracks not alone in paving and hard landscaping, but through cracked panes in the greenhouse and tiny fissures in the corrugated plastic roof of the car port. Then there's unduly curious rain that gets into everything including your underwear, and churlish rain which wants to soak everything in sight before moving off in search of yet more devilment. Of course it eventually stops, the sun returns, and the circle of life returns to its slow grinding momentum.

As we enter April forgotten memories come flooding back and we begin to observe once more the endless succession of delights that gardens provide. We look forward with anticipation to meeting old friends. Memory will probably allow us to remember their names, but will we still be familiar with how silky smooth their petals are to the touch, how intense their hues when back-lit by strong sunlight,

how wonderfully intricate their construction and how appealing their perfume? I hardly think so, for the gradual metamorphosis of one year into another, play funny tricks on the mind and the memory. Whether or not this is true is arguable, but whatever lies in the depths of our spirit, we do like to be constantly reminded as to how things were.

Take for example the most reliable and hardy of all the summer flowering shrubs-Potentilla-the shrubby Potentilla-the shrubby kind may I add, for there are herbaceous types also available. These flower nonavailable. These flower non-stop from May to October, reaching a peak during July and August. To get the best results plant them in a group of three (if you have the room) and they will quickly form a solid mass giving a much better effect than plants dotted about here and there and there

You should be able to find a variety to suit any colour scheme you choose for Potentillas come in hot reds, oranges, golden yellows, cool whites, creams and pinks. Their heights vary too, so pay attention to the labeling and you won't

go wrong. A striking, low growing growing creamy-white variety is sold as 'Tilford Cream, whilst the similarly sized 'Beesii' and 'Dart's Gold' arrive in brightest yellow. If orange is your choice look for 'Sunset' and if it's pink you should look for 'Pretty Polly', 'Princess' or 'Royal Flush'. Red varieties inclúde 'Marian', 'Red Robin' and 'Red Ace', the latter being the most difficult to grow well.

Well grown Potentillas are a joy in any summer garden, but what a pity so few are superbly grown! If they are superbly grown! If they are not pruned on a yearly basis, they soon become leggy, full of woody, aged middles which only encourages poor flowering. However, they'll regain their vigor and bloom profusely if you trim them back by about a third with a shears each spring.

CONTROL IVY

After a long dark winter, ivy growing up house walls and fences can look a little the foliage can be encouraged by trimming off the old leaves with a shears. Don't be afraid to cut back hard if the need arises. Once trimmed, the exposed

shoots can be swept with a stiff brush to remove spiders and creepy-crawlies of every kind, along with old leaves and debris. Although the walls will look rather bare for a few weeks, new growth will soon develop with a freshness and colour that only new foliage can provide. At the same time, check that the ivy is not beginning to invade gutters or down pipes, or even into the roof tiles! Check also

(before starting) for bird nests which may be hidden in the tangled growths. If these are evident, delay the cutting for a month or two.

THE GARDEN IN APRIL

Wind is our greatest enemy this month. It tears blossom from the cherry trees and new green leaves from beech, piling them up in corners like sodden heaps of confetti. Herbaceous plants, in their quest for height will flop and sprawl in high winds especially those vain and pompous delphiniums and pompous delphiniums. Stake these now but be 'tasty' in doing so or you will take away its looks, if not its soul.

If I could prompt readers just one horticultura on purchase this month it would have to be 'a tomato plant' from Dooley's garden centre! Of all the tomato plants I had last year, none could compare with the amount of sweet, delicious cherry sized produce I had from the basket variety that came from this outlet. I simply hung it up (in the green-

sunny spot outside will also suffice) Cherry tomatoes by the dozen arrived in late June and continued to the very end of October (which was a super sunny month if you remember) The only maintenance was regular watering, and irregular feeding with liquid tomato food. No pruning, no stopping or removal of wayward shoots, no insect attack, no fungal disorder. Put in an order this weekend.

PREVENT LOSSES

For an organic deterrent to whitefly, plant a few aromatic Tagates (a type of marigold which is widely available) which is widely available) among your tomatoes, using two per plant. Stick a few into pots around the green-house even if you don't grow 'love fruits', for they'll keep fuchsias, geraniums and other susceptible plants almost whitefly-free.

Irritable bowel syndrome (IBS) is a common disorder that affects the large intestine. Signs and symptoms include cramping, abdominal pain, bloating, gas, diarrhoea or constipation. IBS is a chronic condition that you need to manage long term. IBS digestive symptoms can vary widely, including stomach pain, bloating, reflux, flatulence and bowel urgency.

Only a small number of people with IBS have severe signs and symptoms. Some people can control their symptoms by managing diet, lifestyle and stress. Stomach pain is a hallmark of the condition, and bloating has been found to affect more than 80% of people with IBS

More-severe symptoms can be treated with medication, dietary control and self-management of symptoms

IBS doesn't cause changes in bowel tissue or increase your risk of colorectal cancer.

The signs and symptoms of IBS vary. The most com-

mon include abdominal pain, cramping or bloating that is typically relieved or partially relieved by passing a bowel movement; excess gas, mucus in the stool and diarrhoea or constipation. Sometimes bouts of diarrhoea and constipation alternate.

Most people with IBS experience times when the signs and symptoms are worse and times when they improve or even disappear completely.

See your doctor if you have a persistent change in bowel habits or other signs or symptoms of IBS. More-serious signs and symptoms include; Weight loss, Rectal bleeding, Iron deficiency anemia, Unexplained vomiting, and difficulty swallowing.

The precise cause of IBS isn't known. Factors that appear to play a role include:

Muscle contractions in the intestine. . Contractions that are stronger and last longer than normal can cause gas, bloating and diarrhea. Inflammation in the intestines; Some people with IBS have an increased number of immune-system

cells in their intestines. IBS can develop after a severe bout of diarrhoea (gastroenteritis) caused by bacteria or a virus. IBS might also be associated with a surplus of bacteria in the intestines (bacterial overgrowth). Mi-croflora are the "good" bac-teria that reside in the intestines and play a key role in health.

IRRITABLE BOWELSYNDROME (IBS

The role of food allergy or intolerance in IBS isn't fully understood. A true food allergy rarely causes IBS. But many people have worse IBS symptoms when they eat or drink certain foods beverages, including or wheat, dairy products, cit-rus fruits, beans, cabbage, milk and carbonated drinks. Stress and hormonal changes can trigger symptoms of IBS.

There are not tests for IBS and the diagnosis is based more on the clinical history. You may need tests to rule out other possible causes of your symptoms such as coeliac disease or inflammatory bowel disease. Many people have occasional signs and symptoms of IBS. But you're more likely to have the syndrome if

you: young, female, family history of IBS.

Finding ways to deal with stress may help prevent or ease symptoms of IBS. FOD-MAP diets may help reduce attacks of IBS.

FODMAP DIET stands for fermentable oligo-, di-, anɗ mono-saccharides polvols.T hese are the scientific terms used to classify groups of carbs that are notorious for triggering digestive symptoms likebloating, gas and stomach pain. FODMAPs are found in a wide range of foods in varying amounts. Some foods contain just one type, while others contain several. The main dietary sources of the four groups of FODMAPs include: Milk, yogurt and soft cheese, Wheat, rye, and various fruits and vegetables, such as garlic and onions.

A low FODMAP diet may help reduce some of the symptoms and signs of IBS. A low-FODMAP diet restricts high-FODMAP foods. Fortunately, both stomach pain and bloating have been shown to significantly decrease with a low-FOD-MAP diet.
