### "NÍL AON GLEANNTÁN MAR <u>do gleanntán féin" glounthaune news</u> BY "THE FOREIGN CORRESPONDENT"

#### **ON YER BIKE**

An Tostal was inaugurated in 1953 as a celebration of Irish culture with an emphasis on attracting tourists to visit the country during the off-season. It was marked by a series of regional parades, arts and sporting events. The Festival of Kerry and Rose of Tralee grew out of An Tostal and many towns began a clean-up plan which subsequently inspired the creation of the National Tidy Towns Competition. Locally the late Sean Murray created an enclosed timber log seat utilising an existing water tank as its base. This "Tostal Seat", which was embellished with rambling roses, was located between the "Small Steps" and "The Arch". An Tostal continued until 1958 and Drumshambo, Co. Leitrim has the distinction of being the only place that still organises it on an annual basis. An Tostal promoted sport extensively, cycling in particular, and it sponsored the then four day Tour of Ireland cycle race. It was known as the "Tostal Tour" and the event continued until 1957. When the race was revived in 1965 it was named "The Raleigh Dunlop Tour of Ireland" and it became the "Nissan Classic" from 1985 to 1992 which of course was the golden age of Irish cycling when Sean Kelly and Stephen Roche were at the height of their success in the European circuit. Kelly dominated; winning four of those eight races whereas surprisingly Roche was never victorious. They popularised cycling in Ireland to the extent that it is today; let it be competitive or as a leisure activity. However let's not forget the significant contribution of Charlie Haughey who in July 1987 promoted the sport on the Tour De France podium in Paris albeit with a little help from Stephen Roche. Perhaps that great-hearted gesture ignited new-found boxing enthusiast Lord Stepaside Ross to act like a star-struck teenage boy in the presence of a supermodel at Dublin airport recently? However to his credit he was bashful enough to allow Katie the honour of carrying the belts. But, back on yer bike. Cork City Council and Cork County Council commissioned Aecom to prepare a cycling network plan for the Cork City Metropolitan Area and surrounding towns. The objective of the project was to provide a clear plan for the future development of the cycling network within the metropolitan area in order to encourage greater use of cycling for trips to

work, school, recreation and leisure. Development of the plan was driven by a need to respond to national targets for sustainable transport. A steering group was established to oversee development of the Cycle Network Plan with presentation from Transport Infrastructure and the planning departments of Cork City and Cork County Councils. This steering group collaborated closely with Aecom in developing the network proposals. The Plan was updated in January 2017 to incorporate comments and suggestions received during the public consultation process that was undertaken in 2016. The Inter Urban Cycle Network is one of three categorised in the plan which links the towns and city across rural areas and it also includes elements of the National Cycle Network. A segregated cycle path from Dunkettle to Carrigtwohill utilising the old N25 is one of the key Inter-Urban routes. This is also part of a more long term and wider cycle network which in time may link Cork City to Midleton and possibly beyond to Youghal. Cork County Council is presently processing the design and the plans are subject to National Transport Authority approval. The draft plan will be advertised when finalised and site notices will be erected outlining the consultation process which will give stakeholders an opportunity to offer their views on the proposals. There are many "pinch points" along the route; most notably at "The Island Gate", Little Island Junction, and adjacent to the Church, "Fitzpatrick's Shop", and "The Elm Tree". The authority is indicating that in the main it will run at the northern side of the carriageway and that the "Old Road" (Ashbourne Walkway) will be utilised. Would it not be more practicable at the southern side, at least from "The Island Gate", thus availing of the wide shoulder as far as "Dorgan's Cottage" and onwards to the "Old Road" at its east? It is difficult to envisage the layout adjacent to Little Island Junction and also at Glounthaune Church but with a planned reduction carriageway to six metres further on from the Church; it would not be necessary to route the cycle path so close to "Fitzpatrick's Shop" but rather across at the southern side. This would also mean that the "Old Road" (Ashbourne Walkway) would not be utilised thus allowing it continue to act as a safe and pleasant walkway. There is a wide shoulder at the southern side to accommodate the cycle path from Fitzpatrick's Shop to the Station and this would link with that already planned from the Harper's Creek Development at Killahora to the Station, which is one of the planning conditions and significantly the southern side of the carriageway is specified. The second of the three categorised in the Cycle Network Plan is the "Urban Cycle Network" which consists of "Primary", "Secondary" and "Feeder" routes. "Primary" are main cycle arteries that cross the urban area and carry most cycle traffic. There is one planned within Glounthaune which is to run from Glounthaune School, along the "Back Road" and onwards to the Station connecting with the aforementioned "Inter Urban" route. "Ballynaroon Grove" is the name applied to the road and its width of approx. five decimal five metres is too narrow to provide dedicated cycle lanes. Accordingly a mixed street environment with associated traffic calming measures and reduced speed limits is planned. Such a layout is suitable in low traffic environments where cyclists share the road space with motorists. "Secondary" link principal cycle routes and zones and there are two planned for Glounthaune; one from the "Forge Cross" to "Johnstown Close" via the "Back Road" and called the "Glounthaune Road". This roadway is also too narrow to provide dedicated cycle lanes so that as described above would be provided. The second, called "The Highlands Road", is planned from "Ballynaroon Grove" to link up with the "Inter Urban Route" at Glounthaune Church, Again, as above, a mixed street approach is proposed because of the restricted road width. "Feeder Routes", there are none planned for Glounthaune, are those within local zones and / or connections from zones to network levels above "Primary" and "Secondary". The "Green Network" is the third category in the Cycle Plan and this is developed predominantly for tourist, recreational and leisure purposes but it may also carry elements of the Utility Cycle Network. Employment areas are the priority in terms of access accordingly the first phase of the project is expected to be the Dunkettle to Little Island stretch. So, the foregoing is the plan and those utilising a bicycle for commuting and / or leisure purposes will be pleased. However, only limited facilities exist in our area for those on the shank's mare mode. It is rather ironic that there are no footpaths on

the two roads where the "Secondary" cycle routes are planned. And there is no footpath from the Bus Stop at Glounthaune westwards to Dunkettle on the proposed Inter-Urban Route except the inadequate section at Little Island Junction!

#### POSTERGATE

Well the elections are over for another while. There were some local issues but the positioning of a poster was the big one! The background to this is that Glounthaune Community Association signed-up to a Poster Free Zone and the various political parties respected this. However one poster of three images was erected west of "Dorgan's Cottage" and the GCA was outraged. Social media rather that direct contact with the candidates was initiated and this caused a furor. Local councilor Padraig O' Sullivan, who was portrayed with John Paul Reilly and Billy Kelleher on the poster, also made this point and furthermore advised that the poster was compliant relative to location as it was outside the 60 km speed limit zone. GCA maintained that the defined poster free area was between the Dry Bridge replicas at the east and west. In actual fact the poster was positioned just a stone's throw from the replica at the western side. The local reaction was intense with GCA declaring; "Wow - we got some reaction to this post in a few hours". It is fair to say that apart from a couple of posts all were extremely negative towards the GCA, or to put it bluntly; the Association was ridiculed. Padraig removed the poster as a gesture of goodwill really and the GCA posted an acknowledgement and expressed appreciation, advising; "we have also been in contact with Padraig directly". But despite numerous posts of demands for a public apology to him; none was issued. The foregoing shenanigans could be classified as "a storm in a teacup", or perhaps to borrow a phrase from past times; the Community Association simply "got its knickers in a twist"!

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#### JUST VEGETATING

The satisfaction of a well-ordered vegetable garden, for me, outweighs the pleasures of a decorative one. I like formality, so the sight of disciplined rows appeals to me, so too, the solidity of a single crop. But then, I have always held a deep admiration for people who grow their own food. It's more pleasurable I think and certainly more admirable. Best of all about the growth of the GIY movement (grow it Yousef) is the implied appeal of taste. A head of fresh green 'Susan' lettuce has a mouth-full and more of crunchiness and when you add a glowing vine of 'Gardener's Delight' or 'Sweet 100' tomatoes sliced physically into a dish with basil you have the basics for a wonderful meal. Mix these with 'White Lisbon' scallions (onions) and a few slices of sweetened beetroot and vou'll have a tea-time June salad to remember. In Glanmire we add celery, hard-boiled egg, cucumber, slices of ham, fresh peas from the pod, and herb dressing, but even if these were never added, those rudimentary ingredients are a pleasure in themselves

From this you will gather that those of us who have merely flower gardens are well and truly outshone by those gardeners who grow fruit and vegetables. When our roses, Princess Alstromerias, and bearded iris have finished their dance in the spotlight, kitchen gardeners will still be harvesting salad crops and new potatoes for supper and putting warm stewed gooseberries '(or blackcurrants!) into bowls for a memorable pudding!

And yet, the move to vegetable growing is slow enough (but increasing) aided and abetted I should add, by a writer whose accolades include the Garden Writer of the Year (three times);

## **THE JULY GARDEN**

WISHFUL THINKING: If summers were consistently longer and hotter (and winters milder) we would be able to grow gigantic pelargoniums and 'ice plants' like the sheets you see outside gardens in Jersey and Guernsey. Or if, as looks more likely, more rain comes with increased warmth but little sunshine, we should invest in some extra tree ferns and Canary Island palms! It might also be possible to pot up oleander, hibiscus, bananas and Gloriosa superba Rothschildiana' in sunny borders! Even now, believe it or not, there is a gentle demand for these. the Lifetime Achievement Award of the Garden Writer's Guild; and the Royal Horticultural Society's Veitch Mémorial Medal for horticulture.

I refer to none other than vegetable expert Joy Larcom. Her book 'Just Vegetating'- a Memoir, is a must for beginner and enthusiast. The fact that it has been 'on the shelves' for six years now detracts nothing from its wonder. From unusual cabbages to Chinese ways of growing garlic, truffle orchards to herb conferences, and tomato breeders to 'slugduggery', Joy's writings reflect her wideranging interests and enthusiasm. And whatever the subject they're always engaging. 'Just Vegetating' opens a window on the world she has inhabited all her life. She may be one obsessed with vegetables, but she possesses the gift of being able to impart her enthusiasm on others and that has distinguished her life's work.

The book is worth sourcing for it contains a wealth of valuable tips and ideas for you and your way of life in the vegetable garden. For example, do you really know how to make the most of polytunnels, how to store root crops, apply green manures and correct soil compaction? Read why 'oldies' garden, how to discover the

This excellent white hydrangea with its fresh, pale green leaves and enormous heads of bloom (so becoming near to blue flowers) has been tossed about so savagely in recent heavy downpours that I feel she will never be the same again. Having radiated a mood of expansive prodigality for her opening weeks she now hangs limply her dinner-plate sized blooms. Most of her slim stems, bent over by the sheer weight of water held in the individual florets which make up the super-sized heads, have been her downfall, and even with support she will never look

vagaries of seed sowing, and even how to pickle.

#### **DELIGHTFUL DAHLIAS**

The feeding of dahlias should be careful especially when using granular fertilisers. Keep it away from the plant's stems. If using a liquid feed based on seaweed, put it on at every watering but only at half strength. This gives great results. Dahlias are gross feeders and when it comes to drink, only hydrangeas have more of a lip! Water copiously during dry spells and follow with a mulch (of lawn clippings or garden compost) laid loosely beneath their leaf spread. The mulch will help to conserve ground reserves but don't overdo the application. Two to three inches of loosely applied clippings at a time will give best results. Watch for slugs and snails in misty damp weather especially as darkness approaches.

WHITETHORN MAGNIFICENCE Whitethorn and Blackthorn were magnificent this year and only never better seen than when you fly into Knock International Airport, Shannon or Cork Airports. You certainly won't see the patchwork of green fields embroidered with white margins when you arrive through Dublin. Whitethorn and Blackthorn are sometimes difficult to identify, both flowering at around the same time. But what a cruel tree the Blackthorn! This was traditionally used to create the 'Crown of Thorns' during the trial of Jesus. And even today, when laying Blackthorn the strongest of gloves will not save you from vicious wounds as the thorns strike through.

skywards again. My hard pruning (this hydrangea is cut back to a foot or so during early spring) does little to alleviate the problem, but it does encourage larger blooms on shorter stems. To leave it un-pruned would mean that Annabel would soar to eight or nine feet. Sheep wire used as a crutch made a big difference in the past, always arranged around the plant before rain. This stiff, heavy duty, four-inch mesh wire, supported at each corner by stout bamboo, means the plant can grow through thus giving welcome support, In the past, this method has been ideal for containing my loose-framed lady. How could I have neglected her!

# William Dargan, Tógálaí Iarnród

Le blianta beaga anuas, cloistear go leor faoi scéimeanna móra tógála in Éirinn, mar shampla, Ospidéal na Leanaí agus Leathanbhanda don Tuath. Dealraíonn sé go bhfuil sé do-dhéanta, geall leis, scéim ar bith a thosnú go pointiúil nó a chur i gcrích don phraghas a bhí leagtha síos sa chonradh. Bhí fear in Éirinn, áfach, nach mór dhá chéad bliain ó shin a bhí in ann scéim ollmhór tógála, thart ar mhíle míle d'iarnróid a leagadh síos ar fud na tíre ar fad agus é a dhéanamh laistigh den am agus den airgead a bhí luaite sa chonradh. Ba é sin William Dargan, tógálaí, a rinne a chion féin ar son na tíre.



#### William Dargan

William Saolaíodh Dargan gCeatharlach sa bhliain 1799. Tionóntaí feirme ba ea a mhuintir ar eastát Iarla Chúl an tSúdaire. Dealraíonn sé gur fhreastail sé ar scoil scairte agus go raibh bua ar leith aige sna matamaitic agus sa chuntasaíocht. Tar éis dó an scoil a fhágáil, chaith sé tamall ag cabhrú ar fheirm a athar agus ansin, thosaigh sé ag obair in oifig suirbhéara i gCeatharlach. De dheasca na cabhrach a fuair sé ó phátrúin, John Alexander, muilleoir agus Sir Henry Parnell, Teachta Parlaiminte, fuair sé post leis an innealltóir cáiliúil, Thomas Telford, ar an mbóthar a bhí á thógáil idir Holyhead agus Londain. Chaith Dargan cúig bliana ag obair ann. Bhí Telford chomh sásta leis an obair a rinne Dargan dó gur iarr sé air suirbhé a dhéanamh ar bhóthar nua a bhí le tógáil idir Ráth Éanaigh agus Cill Fhionntain i mBaile Átha Cliath agus a bheith i gceannas ar an tógáil. Fuair Dargan an-mholadh as feabhas na tógála. I rith na 1820idí, fuair sé conarthaí chun scéimeanna tógála a dhéanamh\_ar fud na tíre. Choinnigh sé nasc le Telford, chomh maith, nuair a rinne sé obair ar an gcanáil idir Learpholl agus Birmingham agus mar thógálaí ar chanáil Middlewich.

Thóg Dargan céim mhór chun tosaigh ina ghairm in 1831, nuair a roghnaíodh é chun iarnród idir Baile Átha Cliath agus Dún Laoghaire a thógáil. Toisc go

raibh roinnt de na húinéirí talún glan in aghaidh cuid dá n-eastáit a chur ar fáil don iarnród, bhí ar Dargan tolláin, túir, céanna agus droichid a thógáil. Thug sé seo deis dó a scileanna tógála a léiriú. Bhí foireann oibre mór aige agus nuair a bhí aighneas faoi chúrsaí airgid, réitigh Dargan é nuair a d'íoc sé an fhoireann de réir an méid oibre a rinne gach duine. Bhí dúshláin mhóra ag baint le tógáil an iarnróid toisc go raibh sé in aice na farraige. Ach críochnaíodh é in 1834. Bhí cáil ar Dargan i ndiaidh na hoibre seo agus iarradh air roinnt línte iarnród a thógáil i dtuaisceart na tíre. Bhí sé lonnaithe i mBéal Feirste go ceann deich mbliana agus thóg sé roinnt iarnród ann.

Bhí baint aige le formhór na bpríomhlínte iarnród a tógadh in Eirinn, ina measc Baile Átha Čliath go Ceatharlach agus Cill Chainnigh, Baile Átha Cliath go Cill Mhantáin agus Inis Córthaidh agus Durlas go Coraigh. Rinne sé tarbhealach deich n-áirse ar an Abhainn Dhubh lasmuigh de Mhala ach phléasc na poblachtaigh é i rith Chogadh na gCarad. Chomh maith leis sin, thóg sé tarbhealach ocht n-áirse ag Coill Chnap lasmuigh de Chorcaigh atá fód in úsáid. Rinne sé tarbhealaigh níos mó, mar shampla, ceann le 11 áirse ag Baile Brigín agus 18 n-áirse thar Abhainn Chamlocha i gContae Ard Mhacha.

Is féidir gaiscí Dargan a mheas sa saol ainnis a bhí ann de dheasca an Ghorta Mhóir idir 1845-1850. Sna blianta seo bhí staid airgeadais mórán de na comhlachtaí iarnróid go hainnis. In ainneoin na ndeacrachtaí a chruthaigh sé seo do Dargan, bhí run daingean aige leanúint ar aghaidh toisc gur thuig sé go raibh na hiarnróid riachtanach chun bia a chuir carthanachtaí ar fáil a sheoladh timpeall na tíre. Fear flaithiúil ba ea é agus tá fianaise ann gur íoc sé pá seachtaine roimh ré d'oibrithe nuair a thosaigh siad ag obair dó.

Faoin am seo, bhí ainm in airde ar Dargan go bhféadfadh sé conarthaí a chur i gcrích in am. Sampla is ea an líne idir An Muileann gCearr agus Gaillimh a tógadh idir 1849 agus 1851. D'fhostaigh sé 9,000 oibrí agus críochnaíodh an líne in Iúil 1851 cúig mhí roimh am. Le cinntiú go ndéanfaí an obair go pointiúil, bhí oifig so-ghluaiste ag Dargan agus chodail sé ann.

Faoi thosach na 1850idí, fear saibhir ba ea Dargan. Theastaigh uaidh an t-airgead a úsáid chun acmhainní na tíre a fhorbairt. Nuair a bhí sé lonnaithe i dtuaisceart na hEireann, thug sé faoi deara chomh tábhachtach is a bhí an líon mar bhunábhar do líon éadaigh. Cheannaigh sé feirm 2,000 acra gar do Ráth Chormaic i gCorcaigh. Thóg

Atrial fibrillation (AF) is an abnormal fast irregular heartbeat. A normal heart rate is between 60 and 100 beats a minute (bpm). In AF the heart rate can sometimes be very fast (often between 140 and 180 beats per minute) as well as being irregular.

Many people with AF have no symptoms, especially if their heart rate is not very fast. Possible symptoms include breathlessness, chest pains, dizziness or palpitations.

It is important to diagnose AF because it can cause blood clots to form in the heart that may then travel to your brain and cause a stróke.

In about 1 in 10 cases there is no apparent cause for AF. Conditions that may cause it include high blood pressure (because it puts a strain on heart muscle), angina, heart valve problems, overactive thyroid gland, pneumonia, obesity, lung cancer and AF is common, mainly in older people and about 2 in every 100 people develop it.

If your doctor suspects you may have AF because you pulse rate feels irregular or your symptoms suggest it, a heart tracing (ECG) can confirm the diagnosis of AF. Other tests including blood tests and possibly an ultrasound scan of the heart are done to check for underlying causes.

The treatment for AF either controls the heart rate or changes the rhythm back to normal. In addition, because of the risk of blood clots causing stroke, the treatment almost always includes medication to prevent blood clots.

It is important to diagnose and treat AF in order to re-duce complications of AF including strokes, heart failure and angina.

Rate control medication usually aims to bring heart rate back to normal (ide-

ally to less that 90 beats per minute) when resting. Betablockers (such as atenolol and propranolol), calciumchannel blocker medicine (such as diltiazem and verapamil) and digoxin can be used for this purpose.

Rhythm control treatment means bringing the irregular heartbeat back to a normal regular rhythm. This is called cardioversion. One method of cardioversion is to give your heart an electric shock. Another method is to use a medicine such as amiodarone, to convert the heart rhythm back to a reqular beat. Both these methods fail in many cases.

The main complication of AF is the increased risk of having a stroke. This is because AF can interfere with blood flow in the heart, causing a blood clot to form, which can then travel in the blood vessels until it becomes stuck in a smaller blood vessel in the brain. Part of the blood supply to the brain may then be cut off, which causes a stroke. Your doctor can calculate the risk of stroke by using a set of specific questions. This will help decide what treatments are required. All people except those at the lowest risk will be offered medication to help prevent clots forming. Your risk is calculated with consideration of factors such as presence of heart failure, hypertension, diabetes, previous history of stroke, age and sex of patient. The higher the total points scored the greater the risk. In addition vour risk of bleeding needs to be taken into account.

Aspirin is very effective at reducing the risk of a second stroke if you have had a stroke that was not due to AF. However where AF related stroke is concerned, aspirin is much less effective that other treatments. Instead your doctor is likely to recommend an anticoagulant-either warfarin (the traditional option) or one of the newer agents such as dabigatrin, apixiban, rivaroxaban or edoxaban. Rarely, surgery is recommended for people who are at high risk of stroke and who cannot take anticoagulants.
