A book entitled; "Times Past: Around Little Island and Glounthaune (New Glanmire)" was launched at the Radisson Little Island Hotel. on Wednesday November 27th. Paddy Twomey is the author and he published his first book "The Way We Were" back in May 2010 and both titles give a self-explanatory foretaste of the contents. It was of course a proud occasion for Paddy and his family and it was also a very nostálgic one as it was at this very same venue that he performed his never to be forgotten role of Pavarotti! The occasion was the Erins Own Strictly Lip Sync fund-raising event held in November 2017 and the standing emotional ovation which he received for his gusto rendering of "Nessun Dorma" is still spoken of in the parish and beyond, and as expected it went viral on You Tube! Paddy launched into song during his address at this function also but it was from the rave. rtoire but rather a not repertoire Michael Devane remanence relating to Johnny Flynn's shop in Clash Road. This was sung many years ago by a few young locals at a concert held at the Ballyverry YMS Hall; "There is a man down in Clash by the name of John Flynn, if you go to his door he will welcome you in, he sells cigs and matches and eggs by the score but if you ask him for Eileen; he will show you the door. Toodle ooh, toodle ay with my toodle I oodle, I oodle, I ay". The Reception for the event was sponsored by Fitzpatrick's Shop and Kerri performed the book launch in splendid style. She said the family was so pleased to be involved as it was also their recognise the wish to significant milestone year for Glounthaune Village as it

celebrates its Bicentenary. Indeed the first chapter of the book is dedicated to the village and surrounding area and principally contains coverage of the nineteenth and early twentieth century period. Kerri also spoke of the period special Glounthaune – Little Island links which her family treasures and she proudly referenced the fact that it was her grandfather William (Bill) Fitzpatrick who composed the cleverly written poem of the "Dry Bridge" which is reproduced on the very first page of Chapter . Kerri 1. congratulated Paddy on the

work he created and said that parishioners the will forevermore be indebted to him for presenting the historical account of the area in such a skillful and detailed fashion. Paddy received a warm welcome when he spoke at the well-supported event and he commenced by thanking the O'Neill family for their "Fitzpatrick's Shop" sponsored reception at the launch of the book which he said was excellently executed by Kerri. He also commiserated with the family on the recent ill-timed passing of their beloved Martin. He thanked all those who generously helped and said that without such it would not have been possible to publish the book. He said; "I am particularly indebted to the members of the Little Island Community Association and many more who were prepared to share with me their photographs, and comments, stories knowledge on the affairs of the locality". He expressed gratitude to Little Island Industrial Development Company; "the publication of the book would not be possible without their generous sponsorship". Paddy continued in his usual relaxed and informed style and he had special words of praise for the elderly men and women of the locality who were prepared to share memories and recollections of their young days. "Their important contributions, which are recorded in Chapter 1V, help us in the present to get some sense of what the past was like". He said that readers of the book may use their own imagination to contemplate what it must be like for the interviewees to live through a period where they went from going to school in bare feet, bringing turf or sticks to light the school fire, trying to master the internet and

mobile phones: and now to the present time where very few of their grandchildren even walk to school. He added; "I am very conscious that some people may not like looking back as most of them lived through difficult times. I have to say that all the people whose memories are recorded were cooperative, courteous and friendly towards me, and I hope I have done them justice". There fourteen were such contributors for Paddy's first book and these are reproduced in his latest publication, and there are latest now another fourteen which makes Chapter 1V of "Times Past" the gem it is. The input of those interviewed relating their experiences, reminiscences and memories are enormous and their names are now forever enshrined in parish history. Colman Dillon, Windsor Hill and of Erins Own Club fame, related vivid recollections of "Times Past" and like many others he gave a crystal clear account of schooldays back then. He said that he commenced school, barefoot in the Summer time, in Glounthaune Village when he was about four and a half vears old and there was no short cut so he went down to the Forge Cross, then past Sheehan's Shop, where Nora Roche lives now, under the Dry Bridge and down to the village. Colman said that there were several characters in the school which resulted in many unusual incidents, such as the following; "One day Ned Hayes, who lived at Windsor Hill Cross, was asked a question by Mr. Dinan and for some reason he threw the inkwell at the teacher and ran but he was caught before he reached the door. He got a fair hiding from the teacher but there was no problem with corporal punishment in those days. The next morning Ned's mother was waiting out of sight around the corner of the school with a big ash plant and when Mr. Dinan came up to the door she attacked him with the plant. She belted him the whole way down the village until he reached the safety of his house. All the older boys watched the event from the school wall and could not resist cheering every blow she struck. Ned never came back to school again". As mentioned, most contributors include experiences of schooldays which regrettably are portrayed as best forgotten which times. Paddy references this;

"School, far from being the happiest days of our live, was far from it for several of the men chatted to and just about tolerable for several of the ladies, and certainly it was no bed of roses. Hopefully the more recent school-going generations will be able to look back in time to their experiences with much happier memories". Coleman related humorous also "There was a man by the name of Daw Barry living in the village and in those days we all went to devotions in church on the Sunday evenings. However, Daw was inclined to tell yarns at the bottom of the church if there was any lull in the service. A favourite story related to the fact that he often tilled a piece of Craig's Field and grew carrots, parsnips and turnips. One of the lads asked him how were the carrots doing and Daw said; "they are doing marvelous and do you know that I got a letter from the Great Southern Railway Company asking me to cut back the carrot leaves because they were rubbing off the trains as they passed?"! Coleman's neighbours included the Lombard family and they were very fond of animals; "the crows would actually fly into the kitchen table where Babe Lombard would feed them with bits of bread on the table. In those davs Thompsons would deliver the bread but the van only stopped at the Cross Roads and we waited on the ditch near a whitethorn tree until the van came along, and once it left we could see the crows heading into Babe's house for the crusts of bread". Times Past" is an excellent publication and reading Chapter 1V is an experience in itself and clearly demonstrates the art of conversation and the benefit of recording it for posterity. So simple, and so beneficial. The book also Paddy's depicts determination, dedication, knowledge, attention to detail, patience and his love for the area. His wife Mary, his son Paul, his daughters Fiona and Clodagh, his grandchildren Oisin, Simon and Mark must be so proud. Where would you get four hundred and fifty seven pages of local history for Eur 20.00? At Glounthaune Post Office, at Fitzpatrick's Shop and at little Island Post Office. Brostaígí agus ceannaigh é!

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A SILVER SPARKLER

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The New Year dawns, and perhaps I ought to be writing about seeds and catalogues, but I would rather go back to summer and try to revive some of its warmest pleasures! We endure during January the windiest, wettest and gloomiest period of the year but all through this disagreeable span, one garden plant will persist in giving unexpected pleasure, and I would like to record my gratitude today. Planted since early May, Senecio cineraria 'Silverdust' continues today as gloriously silver-leaved as it did all through our late lamented summer and autumn. In fact, it is probably better, bearing in mind that most grey or silver plants look especially fine (and at their most luminous) when decked with heavy dews, mist, or soft rain. Moreover, they can contrast strikingly with neighbouring plants especially those that remain unsullied and free of tattiness over winter.

This undervalued 'summer bedding plant', which is an indispensable part of all planting schemes becomes available in early May and I recommend its use this year to all who would long for something silvery bright and cheerful come the dark days of winter. For all that, not everyone fancies silver and many indeed have a blind spots for certain colours. Orange for instance, will quite often be anathema to them, regardless of the quality of the orange, the shape of the flower wearing it, or the setting in which it is seen. I like all colours of course especially if they are what I should call clean of their kind. The quality of cleanliness in this context is not easy to define but I think most readers will know what I am driving at.

Use 'Silverdust' as a neat edging plant or in clumps or lines to enrich the colour of salvias, petunias begonias and pelargoniums (in summer) but be sure to keep it 'pinched' so that it becomes bushy and short-jointed for the approaching winter. This magnificent addition to the summer garden may boast foliage which looks like snowflakes, but it will produce small yellow flowers which must be discouraged by occasional pinching. 'Pinching' entails removing the shoot tips at the stage when they are still tiny. The plant makes a shrubby perennial which will survive most winters in this country but it is

usually treated as a half-hardy annual. An easy plant to manage it will withstand salt-laden air, thunderstorms and cats but may rot in cold, sodden ground. However, if you live in the general Glanmire area and you add copious amounts of grit or small gravel during planting, this happening will hardly arise.

All grey foliage plants tend to develop their best, that is, the palest, colouring on poor soils and some gardeners even assist them in this be growing them in pots. Try these next summer and delight in silver foliage though to winter.

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THE JANUARY GARDEN

WINTER FLOWERS; One bloom in January is worth ten in June but make no mistake about it, it is a constant battle. My love for winter flowers has its origin in my undue adherence to an unrealistic dream; I want the garden to go on month after month without interruption for I cannot bear to think of it as a place that is nurtured, tended and tenanted only in the easy months. simply refuse to have it draped with Nature's dust sheets! HELLEBORES; Established helle-bores attract few pests but unfortu-

nately diseases are no respecter of maturity and the hellebore leaf spot fungus will attack plants from time to time. Any systemic fungicide will prevent the spread of this debili-tating condition. Removing any suspect leaves is a good idea so too the removal of the old leaves during early autumn. This removal will also allow you watch the developing blooms, many of which are already

showing in bud. INCREASE; Over time, herbaceous plants become crowded and tired.

When they reach this stage, they flower less and with much smaller blooms. This month (January and any occasion up to early March) would be an ideal time to lift those that need rejuvenation. Carefully dig the clump then chop around the crown with a spade so that only the healthier outer pieces are selected for replanting. Discard the old woody centres to the compost heap. If you have grasses (or plants with silvery foliage) leave until

early spring WOOD ASH; Soft white plumes of smoke slowly rise into the damp and chilly air from a distant garden fire and once again I'm reminded that while bonfires are illegal their ash is valuable and always best when added to the compost heap. Left uncovered, its soluble nutrients are easily washed away and even when added directly to over-wet soil. Mix it with other ingredients whenever possible or add it as you turn the compost. Try to put some form of covering over the heap so that the contents do not become sodden in the wet months ahead. An old carpet would be ideal. Wetness

the wood ash away. HERONS are moving back nearer to town and city because their food supply in the countryside is getting rather thin. During winter, all fish move into deeper water for warmth and protection. Their movements become more sluggish, and they settle in near rocks and river ledges for added safety. In garden pools, the water depth remains constant and hiding places are few and far between. As well as this, the natural cover and protection provided by water-lily leaves, floating plants, and oxygenators are now greatly reduced leaving the fish more exposed than ever. Because of this, it would be advisable to not alone over the people with potting or wire cover the pool with netting or wire but provide some form of shelter in which the goldfish can hide. 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Jerome J Collins agus Tragóid an Jeannette- Cuid 1 Micheál Ó Súilleabháin

Saolaíodh Jerome J. Collins ar Sheanbhóthar na Carraige Duibhe i gCorcaigh ar an 17 Deireadh Fómhair 1841. Cháiligh sé mar innealltóir sibhialta agus rinne sé maoirseacht ar thógáil Dhroichead an Gheata Thuaidh, a tógadh le hiarrann teilgthe. Osclaíodh an droichead seo in 1864. Ina dhiaidh sin, bhog Collins go Sasana agus bhí sé gníomhach i ngluaiseacht na bhFíníní ann. Bhí post aige le comhlacht tógála mar innealltóir agus bhí an comhlacht ag déanamh obair dheisiúcháin ar Phríosún Pentonville in 1866.

Chuir Collins eolas ar leagan amach an phríosúin agus ar na cealla ina raibh na príosúnaigh Fhíníneacha a bhí istigh ann. Ach fuarthas amach faoin chomhcheilg sula raibh an deis ar fáil é a chur i bhfeidhm. Dá dheasca, theith Collins go Meiriceá. Lean Collins ag obair ar son saoirse na hÉireann i Nua Eabhrac. Ar an 20 Meitheamh 1867, tháinig sé féin agus náisiúnaithe Éireannacha eile le chéile ag teach cónaithe ar an Lower East Side de Nua Eabhrac. CROUP & INFLUENZA: Two common illnesses in winter. Croup: This is a common viral infection, involving the voice box and windpipe. Young children are most commonly affected, especially those aged from 6months to 3-4y old. Croup is much lose common after 6u age less common after 6y age

Symptoms of croup: This often starts with a mild runny nose, sore throat, high temperature aches and pains, and reduced appetite.

The harsh barking cough of croup is due to swelling of the airway. The child may have noisy breathing and a barking cough. The cough is usually worse overnight, especially in the early hours of the morning. The child often improves by breakfast time, is well during the day, only for the whole process to get worse the following night. The symptoms often get worse for the first 2-4 nights, and then starts to improve.

When to see your doctor with croup? Croup is common, and the majority of children manage well at home. A small number of children are admitted to hospital. Trust your parental intuition: if you are worried about your child, bring them to see a doctor. If your child is breathing too fast, cannot sleep with croup, drooling, looks unwell or is restless, agitated or confused. This may require visiting your Southdoc/A&E in the middle of the

sweats, hot & cold, aches and pains, headache. Influenza is a nasty illness, and you'll probably spend a few miserable days in bed. Young children and babies can get the flu, and stop feeding, drinking and be 'thrown down' and letharing. Most people are much lethargic. Most people are much better within a week.

The flu virus: The flu is passed from person to person by coughing, sneezing or by touching a surface (door handle etc) where the flu virus has lodged. Flu spreads rapidly, especially within a house or residential facility-nursing home.

Serious illness masquerading as influenza: Some really nasty illness influenza: Some really nasty illness can mimic influenza, especially in the early stages. Meningitis, pneumonia or sepsis can all mimic influenza. Follow your intuition-if the person seems really sick and getting sicker, don't delay. See a doctor urgently. Sinister features include confusion, rash that doesn't fade with the 'tumbler test', repeated yomiting or stiff neck. repeated vomiting or stiff neck. A person who has become confused is always a cause of concern and needs urgent assessment.

Treatment of flu: Do's and Don'ts... Do: Stay at home to avoid spreading the flu! Paracetamol or ibuprofen are great to help any fever, and ease headaches, aching muscles and joints. Drink lots of fluids, water, tea, coffee, minerals-whatawer you like whatever you like.

Most healthy adults don't need to visit the GP. For people at risk of influenza complicatYour GP may prescribe an anti-viral medicine (this is not an antibiotic), especially in people at high risk of influenza complications. Antiviral medicines work best if given in the first 1-2 davs.

Don't: Don't go to work-nobody will thank you for giving them the flu! Influenza is caused by a virus, so antibiotics don't work. Cough bottles are generally not helpful in suppressing the cough in influenza.

Serious complications of influenza: Serious complications are uncommon, and most healthy adults and children recover fully. "People at risk of severe influenza" People at risk of flu complications include pregnant women, people aged 65y and older, nursing home residents and obese people. People with long term heart, lung, kidney disease or cancer are an 'at risk' group. People taking certain medicines which suppress the immune system are at increased risk. If you, or someone you love, is in these high risk groups, encourage them to have the flu vaccine. It's never too late to get the flu vaccine.
