Know Your Rights January 2020: PAYE Income Tax Rates 2020

Question

I'm a PAYE worker. What income tax will I pay in 2020?

Answer

The amount of tax that you have to pay depends on your personal circumstances. Tax is charged as a percentage of your income. The amount that you actually pay depends on your income and on the tax credits and reliefs that you are eligible for.

The first part of your income, up to a certain amount, is taxed at 20%. This is known as the standard rate of tax and the amount that it applies to is the standard rate tax band.

If you have income above the standard rate tax band, it is taxed at the higher rate of tax, which is 40% (also called the marginal rate). The amount that you can earn before you start to pay the higher rate of tax is your standard rate cut-off point.

There were no changes to tax rates and bands in 2020. The standard rate of tax is 20% and the higher rate is 40%.

Single person	€35,300 @ 20% Balance @40%
Married couple/civil partners, one income	€44,300@ 20% Balance @ 40%
Married couple/civil partners, two incomes	Up to €70,600@ 20% Balance @ 40%
One-parent family	€39,300 @ 20%

You may also be eligible for other income tax reliefs, credits or exemptions, which can reduce the amount of tax that you have to pay. Visit revenue.ie to find out more.



PEDESTRIAN & CYCLE ROUTE



The proposed development of a pedestrian and cycle route from Bury's Bridge to Carrigtwohill by Cork County Council was referenced in the July 2019 issue of Area News. This included advice that the draft plan would be advertised when finalised, and that site notices would be erected outlining the consultation process thus giving stakeholders an opportunity to offer their views on the proposals. Well the plans and particulars were published on January 10th. and are available for inspection for a period of four weeks from that date at; Floor Eleven County Hall; County Council Engineer's Office at Ballinglanna; the Town Hall Cobh and Cork County Council's website. Submissions and observations may be made to the Council's Traffic & Transportation Department on or before Monday February 24th. The scheme involves the construction of a dedicated seven decimal seven km, three metre wide, shared pedestrian and cycle path, with a one metre landscaped separation between the path and the public road, where possible and it will run on the northern side of the L 3004, the former N 25. But would not the route be more practical at the southern side of the roadway; from the Rockgrove Industrial Estate access adjacent to Spillane Trailers as far as Glounthaune Train Station? The wide shoulder extending to "Dorgan's Cottage" would be availed of and the "Crompaun Walkway" would also be incorporated. The planned reductions of the carriageway to six metres from the bus stop eastwards would accommodate the scheme further on thereby avoiding a potential unsafé environment as per the present route proposal at the vicinity of Fitzpatrick's Shop. The wide shoulder onwards to the station, with public lighting already in place, would complete the section. The scheme provides; pedestrian crossings, locations of which include The Island Gate, Fitzpatrick's Shop, Glounthaune Train Station and The Elm Tree; ten

bus stop upgrades; traffic calming dmurs gateways; continuous pedestrian / cycle facility across minor accesses; ramped facility provided across more substantial accesses and junctions; public lighting and cctv; potential for landscaping a wild flower corridor; extended car parking Glounthaune Train Station. A route option assessment and preliminary design was prepared by Aecom (Ireland) Ltd. on behalf of Cork County Council. J.B. Barry & Partners Ltd. performed the Road Safety Audit which was carried out between Monday October 14th. and Tuesday October 22nd.2019. The examination and subsequent report were made with the sole purpose of identifying any features of the scheme that could be removed or modified in order to improve the safety of the proposals. The report listed a number of problems identified from the preliminary design submitted and it recommends that associated improvement the suggestions should be studied for implementation. It advises that traffic volumes were average at the time of the site visit on Monday October 14th.and that pedestrian activity was generally low but pedestrians were observed crossing the carriageway near shops / restaurants, and that groups gathered at bus stops. It states that there was significant unregulated parking associated with the retail / public areas such as at; The Island Gate, Fitzpatrick's Shop, the Glounthaune Train Station and it was noted that many HGV's park at the Island Gate and opposite the Amber filling station. The issues listed on the report pertaining to the Glounthaune area include the following; HGV Parking - The Island Gate Restaurant: "Many HGV's were observed parking along the roadside at both sides of the road next to the Island Gate Restaurant neighbouring including along a section of road where parking is currently prohibited by way of signage. It is proposed to regularise this parking by providing formal parking bays which may result in HGV's and other vehicles mounting the footpath and parking for periods up to an hour. This parking practice would create obstructions for pedestrians and cyclists using the shared surface thus increasing the risk of conflict. Also, the spaces provided do not appear to be wide

enough for HGV parking, particularly if drivers are opening doors and stepping onto the carriageway". Recommendation: "Provide sufficient parking at retail areas or install a physical barrier, such as vertical bollards, to prohibit this unsafe behaviour. Ensure that all proposed parallel roadside spaces are sufficiently wide to cater for a two decimal four metre wide HGV to park allowing enough room for the drivers to safely exit the vehicle without the need to step out onto the carriageway". Vehicles Overhanging Shared Surface - The Island Gate: "The proposed perpendicular parking at the back of the shared surface will result in cars overhanging thus reducing the available footpath space and creating an unsafe environment for both cyclists and pedestrians". Recommendation: Provide a buffer to prevent cars from encroaching over the shared surface; such as rubber blocks fixed to the surface or vertical bollards aligned along the back of the path". Parking at Fitzpatrick's Shop: "Many vehicles, cars and LGV's generally, were observed parking within the unregulated parking area in front of Fitzpatrick's Shop, neighbouring premises and along the public road. Currently, parking is ad hoc with many different vehicle manoeuvres occurring simultaneously and this increases the risk of conflict. It is proposed to regularise the parking at this location to increase safety, however some vehicles may continue to park at the roadside which could subsequently result in vehicles mounting and parking on the shared surface or footpath. This could obstruct pedestrians and cyclists on the shared surface". **Recommendation**: "Consider using vertical bollards along the road kerb and back of path (each side of the shared surface) to prevent vehicles from mounting the footpath to park. This would create a safe unambiguous route cyclists and pedestrians travelling through the area". Cycle Environment – Fitzpatrick's **Shop**: "The proposed layout will encourage cyclists to use the car park to access the "greenway" section of the Old Road to the east. There is an increased risk of a conflict between a passing cyclist and a vehicle reversing out of a parking space". Recommendation: "Revise the layout so that the shared surface is streamlined more towards

encouraging cyclists to remain on

the shared surface and easier to

access the "greenway" from the surface". **Parking** shared "Parking **Encroachment:** proposed adjacent to the bus stop at Glounthaune. There is no physical barrier between the parking area and bus stop. Given the parking practices observed during the site visit; there is an increased risk of parking encroaching into the bus stop area and this would force the bus to stop in the carriageway. Given that the opposite bus stop is an inline stop; there would be an increased risk of head on collisions from traffic passing stationery buses". **Recommendation**: "Provide a physical separation (buildout) between the parking and bus stop". Bus Stop Facilities -**General**: "It is not clear from the drawings how it is proposed to segregate groups waiting at the bus stop from passing cyclists. Groups of people waiting at the bus stop will reduce the available space and may result in collisions, especially as a bus approaches or result in cyclist using the carriageway to bypass the bus stop, increasing the risk of being struck by a passing vehicle". **Recommendation**: "Follow the National Transport Authority guideline for bus bays and consider using tram-line paving where appropriate and where possible, widen the footpath locally at each bus stop". Priority at Entrances: "It is unclear from the drawings whether vehicles or cyclists pedestrians have priority at the entrances. Ambiguity at entrances could cause confusion for drivers and cyclists / pedestrians, increasing the risk of collisions". Recommendation: "Given that the scheme is for a shared route, which will promote walking / cycling, consideration should be given to grant priority to cyclists / pedestrians at all entrances, providing a direct and consistent route. This could be achieved by maintaining the level and surface material of the shared surface through the entrances". Lack of **Public Lighting**: "It is unclear from the drawing if appropriate public lighting will be provided as part of the scheme. Text provided with the drawings outlines public lighting will be included but the drawings do not show proposed lighting". public **Recommendation**: "The design team should provide appropriate public lighting along the length of

PLANT PURGATORY

Down towards the end of what I affectionately call 'the back garden' where a puddle of snowdrops in February gives way to scented lilies in June and the view from the boundary fence runs out towards the depths of Kerry, you will find my plant purgatory! All keen gardeners have such places, most tucked away in camouflaged, unseen corners. Here, my eclectic collection of plants and cuttings continue to languish in the many stages of neglect, starvation, even death. Struggling for life in restricting plastic pots, yogurt containers and butter tubs, their frugal existence is extended by the minimal nutrients remaining in a horrible mix of soil and old potting compost. The inmates of this shameful corner hold the seeds of all my good intentions, but I kid myself time and time again that I will deal with them next week or the week after that.

"Where do all these plants come from" you might well ask? Well, over the months (and years in some cases) many were sourced at club sales tables, more again arrived through impulse purchases. The same kind of activity goes on at open garden events, fundraising evenings, even car booth sales, so that eventually, one will have collected (and paid for), more plants than can ever be brought to successful maturity. Unwanted gifts and excess propagation are also responsible but wherever and however they originated, they now form a colony of survivors waiting to be committed to a place in the garden proper.

For all that, one could just as easily get a genuine treasure, a true bargain, the kind of plant one would search for in vain for but seldom expect to find. I have often found such a plant, one meticulously labelled, expertly propagated, and in the kind of vigour one would expect from a nursery or specialised outlet. It does indeed happen but unfortunately, not too often. Meantime, I avert my eyes as I pass, and the roots of my ragged collection continue to circle and scream in their plastic penitentiaries.

This shameful admission has brought me to today's ramblingneatness in the garden! I cannot lay too great an emphasis on the neatness in which all gardens

should be kept. This goes for ladies along with gentlemen, but with the ladies, it is important to remember that if their creation is not beautifully neat (just like themselves) it is nothing. In saying all this, I now ask that areas (like my plant purgatory) and any remaining weeds, leaves, dying frosted foliage, and wind-blown rubbish which, at this pinched time of winter is still littering the garden be removed. These, and the plants in plastic containers still lying around only harbour slugs, snails, and vine-weevil grubs which will eventually spread adding more and more misery for you.

THE FEBRUARY GARDEN

WINTER; In the depth of winter the average gardener hardly stirs. If he goes out into the garden, it is only for the sake of light exercise Bored of indoors, many will pull on whatever coat comes to hand then mooch up and down the muddy paths barely aware of the black empty beds or the emergence and progress of the earliest bulbs. Perhaps they should pay more attention for signs of spring are already evident. Through thin slippers the noses of emerging bulbs and other such treasures are not hard to detect!

READING; Days are short and in no time the available light begins to fade. The anaemic sun that earlier in the afternoon gleamed on a wet birch trunk is now setting in a cold rim of bilious light. From where I am writing, I can also see chasing clouds riding up from the west suggesting that it is going to be yet another night of wind and rain. Just as well then that I am surrounded by books and magazines, catalogues and event brochures! Reflection on the year ahead is one of the most luvurious ahead is one of the most luxurious horticultural moments that in can think of just now so if the weather

be bad, take it easy! When the rain is lashing down and the wind is blowing stay indoors and get able. There's nothing

comfortable. worse than getting cold and wet in

mid-January.
RAIN. Late January days remain short, but the low sunlight concentrates the mind on shape and form. Gardens look larger, every line and contour stand proud and line and contour stand proud and your gaze can now stretch to the boundaries unhindered by the soft gauze of summer. I can see all my creation now and more besides. My neighbour's plot comes into crystal clarity and once more his plants, layout, and style reappear having been hidden since summer. I need to remind him (yet again!) to cover the top of his compost heap with an old carpet or similar so that the contents do not become over-wet and sodden. It would then lose heat and delay the ongoing rotting process. Much in the line of rain will (despite storm Brendan's downpour) fall before St. Patrick's

HOSTA DIVISION. Division is the only way to ensure that hostas come true to type. This can be done now or in early spring. In cold areas late February will be found better. The easiest approach is to dig up the clump and to wash off the excess soil. This will give a clearer view of the dormant buds. Cut through the crown between the buds making small plants in the process. I use a carpenter's saw. Replant with some manure or compost mixed into the backfill soil. Many hostas produce seed but this does not produce hostas true to type and it is rare to

find an outstanding seedling. CHRISTMAS CACTI. (Schlumbergera) are still in full flower but do not be tempted to water them too often. Being succulent plants, they require careful watering. Give them no more than will keep the fleshy discs from wrinkling. The compost for these should never be more than slightly damp; any more would cause the blooms to drop like pine needles. A light spraying with tepid water now and again will remind them of their steamy forest origins and make them give of their best. Most often sold in pots that seem far too small, never be tempted to give them more room in a larger pot. They love being pot bound! Another of their dislikes is constant handling. Once the right place has been found for them, they should be left there undisturbed until flowering has finished.



Collins agus corp a mháthar abhaile go Corcaigh le haghaidh sochraide.



JJ Collins -Plaic

Rinne an Cabhlach an chéad fhiosrú faoin tubaiste go luath ina dhiaidh sin. Ansin, thosaigh Teach na Comhdhála fiosrú eile. Ba iad beirt dheartháireacha Jerome Collins a rinne stocaireacht ar pholaiteoirí chun an fiosrú seo a fháil. Chuala siad faoin droch-íde a thug de Long do Jerome agus theastaigh uatha go nglanfaí a ainm as liamhaintí go ndearna sé rudaí míchearta ar an aistear. Ar an drochuair, glacadh go hoifigiúil le leagan de Long.

Bhain an t-aistear rud amháin amach, áfach, a chuirfeadh áthas ar Collins. In 1884 tháinig grúpa cuardaigh ar sholáthairtí a d'fhág foireann an Jeannette. Dheimhnigh an áit in ar tháinig siad orthu, amach ó chósta thiar theas na Graonlainne, an teoiric go raibh sruth Artach leanúnach ann.

Tá scéal an Jeannette dearmadta inniu ach amháin i measc daoine a bhfuil suim acu sa taiscéalaíocht. Tháinig aistear tubaisteach Ernest Shackleton go dtí an tAntartach tamall de bhlianta ina dhiaidh agus, dá dheasca, ligeadh scéal an Jeannette i ndearmad. Ach tá feachtas curtha ar bun inniu ag duine de shliocht Jerome J. Collins chun a ainm a ghlanadh. Is í siúd Amy Johnson agus tá blag tosaithe aici:www.anirisharctichero.blogspot. com ina ndeir sí: "Is é an sprioc atá agam ná na liamhaintí a cuireadh i leith mo shinsir a chur ar ceal agus an onóir agus an tsíocháin a thabhairt ar ais go dtí mo shinsear agus do mhuintir Choileáin.

Rinneadh socrú go n-aistreofaí corp Jerome J Collins ó Nua Eabhrac go Corcaigh agus go gcuirfí ann é. Bhí máthair Jerome tar éis bháis in 1880 agus bhí sí curtha i Reilig Woodlawn. Socraíodh go gcuirfí a corp, chomh

maith go Corcaigh agus go gcuirfí abhus í. Tógadh an cónra mhiotail ón uaigh. Bhí cónra Jerome cosúil le cónra a mháthar ach bhí dath rósadhmaid air. Bhí an bratach Meiriceánach os cionn chónra na máthar agus bhí bratach an 69ú Reisimint de Stát Nua Eabhrac os cionn chónra Jerome. Bronntanas ó mhná Thiobraid Árann a bhí ann agus ba é seo an chéad ócáid in ar ceadaíodh é a bheith in easnamh ón reisimint. Cuireadh é le corp Jerome mar bhí sé ina chaptaen ar cheann de chomplachtaí na reisiminte. I measc na gcathanna atá luaite ar a mbratach bhí 'Savage Station', 'Wilderness', 'Yorktown', 'Antietam', 'Bull Run', 'Gettysburg' agus 'Fredericksburg'.

Shroich na hiarsmaí An Cóbh ar an 6 Márta 1884 ar an ngaltán 'City of Chicago'. Tógadh na cónraí díreach go dtí Ardeaglais Naomh Colmán.Tháinig daoine go dtí an Ardeaglais i rith na hoíche chun paidir a rá ar a son agus ar maidin bhí sé lán go doras ag a naoi a chlog, nuair a cheiliúir An tÁthair J Barry an tAifreann Éagnairce. Bhí cór na hArdeaglaise i láthair. Ag a deich a chlog, tógadh na cónraí ón Ardeaglais agus iad á n-iómpar ag baill den Queenstown United Traders' Association. Bhí socruithe cuí déanta don tsochraid mhór phoiblí. Bhí an lá fliuch agus bhí na sluaite ar dhá thaobh na sráide fad a bhí na cónraí ag dul thar bráid. Sheinn banna Naomh Colmán an Dead march. Bhí na Coimisinéirí Baile i láthair agus bhí baill ó na ceirdeanna éagsúla- siúinéirí, másúin, báicéirí, péintéirí agus mar sin de ann. Bhí Consal na Stát Aontaithe, An Ginearál Piatt, agus maithe agus mór-uaisle eile ann. Bhí bratacha na

n-árthach ar fad a bhí sa chuan ar foluain i lár crainn.

Thart ar a leathuair i ndiaidh a haondéag, tháinig bád gaile, 'An Erin' ó Chorcaigh go dtí Cé na nAimiréaltachta. Bhí baill an Bhardais ar bord. Cuireadh na cónraí ar an mbád. Bhí dhá bhád gaile eile ann, 'An Citizen' agus 'An Lee' a thóg an pobal go Corcaigh le haghaidh na sochraide. Nuair a bhí na báid ag dul thar Inis Sionnach, bheannaigh na trúpaí a bhí ann dóibh.

Nuair a shroich an tsochraid an cé i gCorcaigh, bhí slua bailithe ann. Faoi mar a tharla i gCóbh, bhailigh an ceirdeanna éagsúla in ord mórshiúil. Tógadh na cónraí as an long. Cuireadh cónra Mrs Colins in airde ar chróchar agus bhí ceithre chapall á tharraingt. Bhí sé chapall ag tarraingt chónra Jerome. Bhí baill ón mBriogáid Dóiteáin, Cumann Shráid na Beairice agus daltaí scoile á leanúint. Bhí sé fós ag stealladh báistí ach níor chuir sé aon bhac ar na sluaite. Lean an tsochraid tríd an gcathair go dtí an Meal Thuaidh, Bóthar Thobar Rí an Domhnaigh go dtí gur shroicheadar reilig Churrach Cheapáin. Bhí na sluaite ar thaobh an bhóthar ar an mbealach. Bhí bláthfhleascanna de gach cineál, a bhronn na cumainn éagsula, in airde ar na cónraí. Bhí slua mór bailithe ag geataí na reilige. Ba é an Moinsíneoir Sheehan a bhí i mbun searmanas na hadhlactha. Íslíodh cónraí Jerome J Collins agus a mháthair isteach i dtuama an teaghlaigh. Bhí bannaí ceoil i láthair a sheinn ceol gruama, duairc a bhí in oiriúint don ócáid.

Ag cruinniú den Bhardas, léadh litreacha ó dhaoine mór le rá nach raibh in ann freastal ar an tsochraid. Bhí ceann ó Easpag Chorcaí, An tEaspag William Delaney, a bhí ina sheanfhear ag an am. Deir sé go raibh babhta broincítis air. Bhí nach mór daichead bliain caite aige mar Easpag Chorcaí. Fuair sé bás dhá bhliain ina dhiaidh in 1886.

Is cinnte gur imigh scéal truamhéileach Jerome J Collins i bhfeidh ar mhórán. Nuair a fuair sé bás den ocras agus den fhuacht in áit iargúlta i bhfad ó bhaile, ní raibh ach é féin agus roinnt compánach ann. Chuir an pobal i Meiriceá agus in Éirinn a meas air agus a mbród as a shaol in iúl. Deirtear gurbh é seo an tsochraid ab fhaide a bhí riamh ann, is é sin ón tSibéir go Nua Eabhrac agus ansin go Corcaigh.



Erection of Posters and Advertising Signage

With effect from 1st February 2020, Cork City Council Litter Warden Service will be targeting illegal signage across the entire city (including the extended boundary areas of Glanmire, Douglas, Blarney and Ballincollig).

Under Section 19 of the Litter Pollution Act 1997, a person who is not the owner, occupier or person in charge of any structure or other land (including doors, gates, windows, trees, poles or posts that are in or are visible from a public place) shall not exhibit or cause to be exhibited thereon any article or advertisement.

Michael Sheehan from the City Council's Waste Enforcement and Cleansing Operations Unit said: "We would like to remind all individuals, businesses, political groups, estate agents, sporting clubs/associations and schools of the provisions of Section 19 of the Litter Pollution Act 1997 with regard to illegal postering. There has been a

noticeable increase in the frequency and volume of illegal signage across the city. These signs detract from the amenity of the areas that they are erected in and often are erected in such a manner as to create a hazard for both vehicular traffic and for pedestrians."


"Cork City Council's postering protocol caters for the erection of temporary posters in a limited number of cases in a controlled manner having regard to public safety."

Cork City Council has a postering protocol in respect of property it owns and this protocol is available at www. corkcity.ie.

In order to avoid litter fines of €150 for each illegal sign, poster or article of advertisement, Cork City Council advises each sector of society mentioned above to remove any and all illegal posters or advertising signs that they may have erected.

Aneamia is a condition in which vou lack enough healthy red blood cells to carry adequate oxygen to your body's tissues. Having anemia can make you feel tired and weak.

There are many forms of aneamia, each with its own cause. Aneamia can be temporary or long term, and it can range from mild to severe. See vour doctor if you suspect that you have aneamia. It can be a warning sign of serious illness. Iron Deficiency Aneamia is the most common form of aneamia.

Aneamia signs and symptoms vary depending on the cause. If the aneamia is caused by a chronic disease, the disease can mask them, so that the anemia might be detected by tests for another condition.

Depending on the causes

of your aneamia, you might have no symptoms. Signs and symptoms, do they occur. might include fatigue, tiredness, dizziness lightheadedness.

Signs of aneamia include a pale complexion and an abnormally smooth tongue

The severity of your symptoms may depend on how quickly your anaemia develops. For example, you may notice very few symptoms or they may develop gradually if your anaemia is caused by a chronic (long-term) slow loss of blood, such as a stomach ulcer (an open sore that develops on the inside lining of your stomach).

Iron deficiency anaemia occurs when the body does not have enough iron. A lack of iron in your body can be caused by a variety of factors. Bleeding in the stomach and intestines is the most common cause

of iron deficiency anaemia in men and in women who have been through the menopause (when a woman's monthly periods stop).

If your GP suspects that your medication is causing gastrointestinal bleeding, they may be able to prescribe an alternative medicine that is less harmful to your stomach and intestines

some rare cases, gastrointestinal bleeding can be caused by cancer, usually of the stomach or colon (part of the bowel, which makes up the digestive system). About 450 cases of stomach cancer are diagnosed in Ireland each year.

In women who are still menstruating (having monthly periods), the most common causes of iron deficiency anaemia are: menstruation and pregnancy.

Usually, only women with particularly heavy periods develop iron deficiency anaemia. If you have heavy bleeding over several consecutive menstrual cycles, it is known as menorrhagia.

Other conditions situations that cause blood loss and may lead to iron deficiency anaemia include: inflammatory bowel disease and haematuria (blood in your urine). coeliac disease (may also cause B12 deficiency).

diagnose iron To deficiency anaemia. blood sample will be taken from a vein in your arm and a full blood count will be made. This means that all the different types of blood cells in the sample will be measured.

Most people will experience any side effects when taking iron supplements. However, in some cases, ferrous sulphate mav upset stomach. (HSE.ie your Anaemia).







Playing quality opposition against the likes of Canovee and Boherbue in particular will give us a good gauge of how we match up against the best sides in the county. Diarmuid McDonell will continue as coach for the football squad in 2020. He will be joined in the coaching role by Glenn Arrigan for the year ahead. Glenn brings a wealth of knowledge which is sure to benefit the setup.


