## **Building Capacity**

#### **Demands versus Capacity**

Every time you do an activity, whether it is getting up from a chair or running a marathon, you are placing a demand on your body. If your body does not have enough capacity to manage and carry out this demand you are more likely to get injured. For example, if you don't have enough strength and endurance built up in your leg muscles, trying to run long distances may result in injuries or soreness in your legs. Or if your thigh muscles are a little tired, weak or inactive, getting up from sitting throughout the day might place too much demand on your knees



and may result in pain or injury to your knee joint. I like to think of the Demand versus Capacity issue like a balancing scale.

When you have a good balance between the demands you are placing on the tissues and the tissues capacity to cope with these demands then vou are more likely to have nice healthy tissues and less likely to get injured.



However, when the demands on the tissues exceeds the capacity of the tissues, that is more likely to result in soreness or even damaged tissues.

What is the solution? One option could be to temporarily lower the demands placed on the body (maybe not possible all the time) and then build capacity up in the body tissues. If you build capacity, you can then gradually increase the demands placed on the body and get back to doing what you want to

Now, there are many factors that contribute to capacity that can't be changed (e.g., age, past medical history, genetics), but changeable factors include strength, endurance, power, flexibility, diet, and life stressors. Targeting these factors can make a huge difference to the capacity of the tissues and go a long way to redressing imbalances anv demands versus capacity in our activities of daily livina.

Physiotherapy Health Centre is now open and operating out of Unit 5a in Sallybrook industrial estate. The centre has experts in the areas of physiotherapy, exercise rehabilitation, strength and conditioning, nutrition and health and sports psychology- all areas to help build capacity.

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# **DOLPHIN SWIMMING CLUB**

Dolphin Swimming Club (DSC) is one of Ireland's oldest swimming clubs and is the oldest swimming club in Munster. This year, the club will celebrate its 120th anniversary. Founded in 1901 by a group of young men in the Ballintemple area of Cork, the club branched out in 1902 to establish Dolphin Rugby Football Club as a means to keep fit during the winter months and a relationship between the clubs continues to this day. Historically, the club has always been strong in swimming, with water polo and diving a pivotal part of the programme in its early years and it remained a men'sonly club until 1934 when the first women were allowed to join.

Later years saw the introduction of lifesaving and teaching of swimming to children. Dolphin have been active in all the major Cork pools down through the years, initially at Eglinton Street indoor baths and the Lee baths, the famous riverside 50m outdoor facility where the club was active until 1976 and 1985, respectively. With the provision of new indoor facilities in Cork in the 1970s at Churchfield, Douglas and Mavfield, the club relocated its activities to those pools and now calls Mayfield Sports Complex home, with LeisureWorld Churchfield & Bishopstown, Coral Leisure in Cobh, and Brookfield Leisure pools also in weekly use - true signs of growth and progression in recent times.

Today, the club is active for over 46 hours per week in the water and up to 10 hours per week in the gym. There are 16 squads in the club, 14 of which train to compete. Dolphin runs a successful learn to swim programme that conducts three classes each weekend from September to June and, in most cases, feeds the participants into the competitive squads.

The swimming programme is led by Head Coach, Mick McCormack, who is a Swim Ireland Level 3 Coach, as well as a PF & English teacher, while the management of the committee is led by club Chairman, Dr Giuseppe Whelan. Mick is highly active at Munster Regional level, currently serving as the Munster Performance Pathway Chair, and is a member of the National Performance Advisory Group in Swim Ireland. He has also represented Munster as coach at international competitions in Scotland and Slovenia in recent years.

As a team, Dolphin SC has been going from strength to strength and this was clearly evident at last season's Irish Summer Nationals in Dublin where the club racked up an individual medal haul of 15 Gold, 8 Silver & 6 Bronze, as well as a silver medal in the girls 4 x 100 medley relay, to finish the meet as the 2nd highest ranked club in the entire country, just behind Ards Swimming Club from Belfast, but it was also the most successful meet in the club's illustrious history to date. Dolphin's Hannah O'Shea emerged as the 'best overall athlete' at that meet while Neddie Irwin & Jack Cassin came away as 1st and 2nd placed males, respectively. Away from the pool and out on the open water, more success followed with Neddie Irwin winning the annual Lee Swim, followed by club captain at the time, Niklas Leahy in 2nd place.

With the uncertainty surrounding any upcoming competitions at this point, the swimmers have been back in the water training since the start of June - first, on the river Lee and at sea but subsequently in the pool since the end of June. Zoom workouts have become pivotal to all the squads while we have been out of the water and the swimmers have shown great resilience

and dedication during this difficult time. Coincidentally, the last swimming competition to take place in Munster before COVID19 was the annual Dolphin Open in Mayfield way back in March where the home club emerged overall victors. The Irish Winter Nationals which took place in Dublin in December was the first taste of competitive action for any swimmers in Ireland since March with Dolphin's Hannah O'Shea competing as part of the Irish National Squad. Everyone is hoping that they won't have to wait very long before they experience those great days again!

## YOUR CHOICE: "SHANKS' MARE" OR "ON YER BIKE"

A new shared one decimal two km pedestrian and cycleway path which links Dunkettle Roundabout with the Glanmire - Richmond road and continues past the Gaelscoil and onwards to Burys Bridge was opened on November 16th. This was delivered by Transport Infrastructure Ireland (TII), Cork City Council and Cork County Council as part of advance works to the Dunkettle Interchange Upgrade Scheme. It will link-up with the Burys Bridge to Carrigtwohill path when constructed, and it will also be part of a more long term pedestrian and cycleway plan to extend as far as Midleton and possibly beyond to Youghal. The path will in the main run on the northern side of the present L3004 carriageway, the former N25, and there are many "pinch points" along the route most notably at; "The Island Gate", the vicinity of the church, "Fitzpatrick's Shop" and "The Elm Tree".

Part eight planning permission was granted by the elected members of Cork County Council in March 2020 and the delivery of the scheme is dependent on funding from the National Transport Authority (NTA). This body has in the past allocated an annual grant to Cork County Council for the implementation of its Regional Cities Smarter Travel Programme whereby individual sections of schemes are progressed each year. From a funding, procurement and construction point of view; it is not feasible to deliver the entirety of a scheme such as this. Much work has been done since the grant of planning permission; surveying, enabling works, procurement and detailed designs along the route.

Funding was approved for the detailed design as well as the of the construction section westwards from "The Elm Tree" as far as the "Harpurs Creek" housing estate and this work is presently in progress. The developers of "Harpurs Creek" is, as per one of the planning conditions, obliged to construct the element from the Estate to the Train Station and it is interesting to note that this was to be actioned prior to first occupancy! The NTA has also approved funding for the detailed design of the remaining elements of the scheme and these are due to commence during the first quarter of this year. Subject to funding allocations; a decision will then be made on which sections should proceed to construction. Would suggest westwards from Glounthaune Station and maybe an input from GCA would be valuable in this regard?

"CADDIES TODAY – GOLF STARS TOMORROW" This was the header of an article published on the April 3rd.1951 edition of the "Evening Echo". QUOTE: Lessons finished at Little Island National School and there is a wild rush, not to get home but to the eighteen hole course of Cork Golf Club. Perhaps the pupils wish to reduce that handicap before tea? No, what they wish to reduce are their monetary difficulties! At least forty of them can earn good money by spare time caddying for the one hundred and sixty members of that club.

Their busiest periods are at weekends and during competitions such as; "The Open", "The Captain's Prize" and inter-club contests. One youngster told me he earned two pounds and ten shillings last weekend and others say they averaged between one pound and that figure for the same period. Their calling is actually an incentive to study because an unwritten law, rigidly enforced, says that no truant or pupil neglecting schoolwork will be allowed to caddy. In fact a few years ago Little Island National School secured the Blue Riband of national education: "The Carlisle Premium".

The youngsters themselves are real golf enthusiasts and some of them speak with pride of when they caddied for Jimmy Bruen, Dr. Billy O' Sullivan, Redmond Simcox, George Crosbie and other distinguished players. A twelve year old told me almost reverently of the day Dr. Billy holed out in one and John Devane was proud to say he caddied for the Muskerry Club "ace" Nick Power.

They play golf too on their own fifteen hole course and they hold competitions with the prizes being cups and saucers, hair cream and similar articles. Occasionally the proprietors' of a local tuck shop donate a trophy, usually a decorative glass bowel filled with raspberry cordial. They are fluent Irish speakers so in a few years' time they should be eligible to join "An Chumann the ´ "Gaelic Gaelach", Golfing Society". At present their cheerful faces and enthusiasm must be an encouragement to members of Cork Golf Club, especially when they are trying to get out of a difficult bunker. The caddies include; Thomas Barry, Patrick Twomey, Matty Murphy, Patrick Murphy, Stephen Devane, Michael Mc Cormack, William Waters and Gerald Dunlea. UNQUOTE. That article was penned seventy years ago and it highlights the fact that a book on Cork Golf Club from a caddies' perspective, and there are many in our midst, would be very interesting!

# Wishing a happy and healthy New Year to everyone

### A WINTER WONDER

Many gardeners know appreciate the easily-sourced and popular winter-flowering shrub known as Mahonia, but how many are aware that it is named after Bernard McMahon, an Irish emigrant who settled with his wife in Philadelphia during the late 1790's? They ran a small nursery and seed shop, and some of the most noted gardeners of the time were customers. Sadly, they could only have known the American

varieties, which are nothing compared to the splendid Asian kinds discovered long after their day.

In a winter garden a mature specimen of any mahonia will be found best at making an architectural statement. With lustrous foliage rimed with frost or glistening in the damp, the sprays of flower will look like strings of topaz, mocking it would seem the lifeless greyness of winter. It continues to give the garden scene a strong theme when otherwise there would be little, but which variety is best?

The best forms smell of Lily-ofthe-Valley, and their berries, unlike those of the holly, can

be made into jam. 'Charity' is an excellent variety, distinguished by its size and perfect sprays of golden-yellow flowers. It will grow to six feet and more in good conditions, but it is easily controlled by pruning immediately after the winter blooms fade. This exercise is important and one third of the growths (of all varieties) should be cut to a few inches each year. New shoots will arise from the stumps and these are the ones which bloom best in subsequent

Ín small gardens, 'Winter Sun' will be found very tidy or for that matter 'Lionel Fortesque' a wellbehaved shrub which holds its blooms like outstretched arms but on a distinctly higher plane. Whichever variety you choose, do not be afraid to prune as suggested otherwise they will get long and leggy in a short span of time.

Is there any limit to their value? Well, not if you value their yellow winter blooms, prickly holly-like leaves, and in many varieties, a delicious perfume. These can be as dramatic as fireworks and dominate the scene for weeks on end from late autumn.



Bright yellow blooms throughout winter, distinctive holly-like foliage and a perfume akin to Lily-of-the-Valley are the hallmarks of most Mahonia varieties

The variety with the finest foliage are found on M. Iomariifolia an aristocrat of the family which boasts sprays of up to two feet, pinnate like a killer shark and equally as sharp! The most common form sold, Mahonia japonica, is probably best for scent. This indestructible shrub will grow anywhere producing arching, then spreading, racemes of acidyellow fragrant yellow flowers from November to early spring, followed in turn by attractive blueblack berries.

This variety is also first to bloom and I recommend it (and Charity) to those who want something to admire during January. This

excellent variety is now showing at a garden near you, so regular is its early winter arrival.

#### HYACINTH PROBLEMS

At times, hyacinths fail to set flowers even though the foliage looks healthy and strong. The worst pest of these is the larvae of the garden swift moth which eats the basal plate and roots of hyacinthsdamage that is often blamed on slugs. For some reason, the larvae seem to be especially fond of 'City

of Haarlem' and 'Pink Pearl' but all varieties and colours are at risk. Although hyacinths are ideal for planting in containers, they often fail in window boxes or small pots where, in winter, they can easily be frozen solid. Although all hyacinths are totally hardy, if frost penetrates deeply enough to reach the root tips (something that is unlikely to happen in the open garden) they die, and rot spreads up the plant. This gives rise to the presumption that all is

fine when in fact the bulbs are slowly being killed. All this however may smack of dark-day pessimism! With global warming (and all the rain of late) perhaps any frosts we get this year will be mostly benign.

### WINTER SCENT

If you need to be further encouraged by winter scent, source and plant the likes of Viburnum farreri, and Bodnantense 'Dawn'. These like to be planted in ground that contains ample humus yet drains easily. At the same time, do not change drastically its ability to hold moisture during summer. It may be wet just now, but by next summer, things could be totally different!

cap lily) is a good second choice and falling apart, revive it in buckets of damp compost for a couple of days.

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# THE JANUARY GARDEN

If you see healthy lily bulbs offered for sale, bulbs of a good size with fat scales tightly held together, then buy sooner rather than later. Plant when conditions are suitable in rich, free-draining soil which has had organic matter added. Plant deeply, eight inches being perfect. Make lilium Regale your first choice. Use pots if you wish. Lilies do remarkably well in these and those known as 'rose' pots will be found most advantageous.

Purple Lilium martagon (Turk's

for it is excellent for naturalising in rough grass and among deciduous trees. Plant this variety four inches deep. If any lily seems to be drying out, becoming soft

There is a lot happening and we would urge as many as possible to get involved and let your voice be heard, know what is happening, be part of shaping the future Barleycorn Site; Further to our Correspondence to Oliver Moran Chair of the climate change group of Cork City Council to buy the Barleycorn site. He brought our request to the local area Committee meeting of Cork City Council.

This request addressed by the Property Department I the Council.



The Barleycorn site is currently zoned for mixed-use purposes which the City Council would not be interested purchasing without clear development proposal.

Clearly the City Council is only interested in purchasing property of this kind for housing. amenity or housing, with a priority for housing. The mixed use zoning does not satisfy that and the City does not have the money to purchase solely for an amenity Park.

The executive of Cork City Council wanted to emphasise to the

Community in Glanmire that the site assessed by the Property Department, and proposal was proposal not without dismissed investigation.



Cllr Moran points out that it is likely that city Council will not be purchasing the property as an amenity.

While we acknowledge the efforts of Cllr Moran, and Cllr Ger Keohane for their endeavours it is deeply disappointing that a facility like this

would not be considered for an amenity by Cork County Council Glanmire is the fastest growing town in Munster with a population of over 20 thousand people, with over ninety per cent of the population that have come to reside here in the past thirty years, from all over Ireland and further afield, unfortunately the facilities remain much the same as they were in the 1970s. Any new facilities have been led by enlarge by voluntary, Community, and sporting organisations and administrators Glanmire provide hundreds voluntary personnel, and sporting coaches which enhances undoubtedly the Community at no cost to the state.

In a new Community like Glanmire an amenity like the Barleycorn site is vital for the mental health, integration, exercise for young and old along with all the other proposals that we have mentioned in previous correspondence. This is a once off opportunity. Perhaps the Council might reconsider.

The current Government has set aside one Billon euro for projects like this and are spending a million a day on Green projects, one would hope that some of this could filter its way into the Glanmire Community

Two issues that need immediate attention in early 2021:

1 The Glashaboy flood project (Now in in its 9th year waiting) 2 School

places for children.

On a positive note there have been some great businesses have come to our area; there are now a choice of coffee shops, including the recent addition of the 'River Cafe' at the foot of the Rocky Road. New food offerings with the refurb of the Barn to a bar & gastro pub and longevity of the wonderful 'Brook Inn' and 'District 11'., and even a little fashion for ladies with 'Love Life'.



Local businesses have done their utmost to meet government guidelines and it is beyond difficult when businesses such as our local hotel, the Vienna Woods, invested so much in enhancing their property for guests and weddings but yet cannot host either.

We enter 2021 with the hope of a successful vaccine yet continued restrictions to try and beat this pandemic but by continuing to stand together, keep united and focused on our community we work towards a brighter future in 2021 & brighter times and days ahead.




# Cycling In Cork in the 1890s

These 1898 Cork advertisements illustrate that the bicycle had evolved from the humble bone shaker to a very efficient means of transport. Early cycling machines such as the penny farthing acquired their name because the larger front wheel resembled one penny and the smaller rear wheel was similar to that of a farthing coin of the period. These simple straight forward engineered bikes had no brakes and the cyclist had to pedal backwards to stop. The large front wheel with pedals attached was designed for speed on level ground. This worked in reverse when cycling uphill as the front wheel was far too cumbersome to pedal under pressure. Another problem when cycling from this height was the danger of falling which became known "as taking a header." By 1884 The Irish Cycling Association (ICA) was established as cycling was now becoming a very popular sport. Dunlop pneumatic tyres revolutionised cycling although they had been first patented by William Thompson. John Boyd Dunlop's reinvention of the pumped wheel, the diamond frame and the standard chain drive were some of the many advances which created the bicycle boom of the 1890s.

As seen from these Cork bicycle advertisements a vast amount of publicising occurred in Cork city. R. B. Baker was advertising Sparkbrook cycles at a then considerable discount and Humber bicycles with the latest Dunlop tyres were also on offer. J.T. Mulligan of King Street announced that he was the only cycle agent providing free lessons. J.S. Harley was the sole agent for the legendary Raleigh bicycle whilst the Victoria Cycle & Motoring Co stocked American bicycles. Easy payment schemes and bicycle hire ensured that a large outlay of money was no longer required in order to obtain one. Radical advances in engineering had now brought a newer, safer method of transport to the masses.

# **Caroline Bailey Editorial- Slimming World Consultant**

Hi! My name is Caroline and I began my Slimming World journey on the 15th of January 2020.

My total weight loss to date is 5 stone 1.5lbs. I have always battled with my weight before I joined Simming World. I had no confidence and I was constantly putting myself down. I couldn't even look at myself in the mirror without feeling horrible.

was SO nervous insecure about walking in to my first group meeting but I couldn't have felt more welcomed and supported by everybody there. Staying in group was the key for me. # **December / January Recipe: Fruit cake**



Traditional Christmas cake

(We have decided to repeat the recipe for the fruit cake for January, as the Method was omitted by mistake in December)

# **Ingredients**

- 16 oz mixed fruit/ sultanas
- 2 oz cherries
- 3 oz mixed peel
- Quarter pint of sweet sherry (Bristol cream)
- (soak your fruit and sherry for 1, 2 or 3 days, stirring occasionally)
- 6 oz butter
- · 6 oz soft brown sugar
- 3 large eggs
- 6 oz self raising flour
- 2 oz plain flour
- Pinch of salt
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1 teaspoon nutmeg
- 2 oz ground almonds
- · Grated rind of lemon

#### Method

 Grease and line the sides and base of an 8 inch round tin with a double sheet of greaseproof paper.

- Put a double sheet of tinfoil paper all around the outside of tin, tied with a string. (Can be done the day before)
- Beat the sugar and butter until pale and creamy, stir in flours, salt and lightly beaten eggs.
- Add in ground almonds, spices, and all your soaked fruit. Mix very well together.
- Spoon into tin, and gently flatten the top.

Sit into a roasting tin (if you wish). Place in the centre of the oven at 160°C.

After about 45 minutes, as cake is slowly beginning to brown, place a double sheet of tin foil/cardboard over the tin. Lower oven to 150°C for another 1h 20- 1h 30min approx.

Leave to cook until golden brown, and the centre of cake is firm. (check with skewer/ needle)

I make this cake several times throughout the year, and is a real treat also in mid summer! Best wishes for 2021 from Upper Glanmire ICA

# **MAKE YOUR BED IN 2021**

You have heard the slightly ominous phrase, "you've made your bed, now lie in it". In other words, your actions determine your consequences, and you reap what you sow.

That all makes sense and when you think about it, this is what many natural processes are about. Many animals must put in tremendous work to gather food to see them through winter and hibernation. Farmers work from spring to autumn before reaping the rewards of their work. It's a natural system and there is no short cut to it. In more everyday terms, we are the result of our own actions.

Our small daily habits accumulate over the and months years to produce the results we see today. Think about the person who goes to the gym as an example. If you go to the gym for 30 mins and come home to look in the mirror, what will you see? The answer is nothing. No change at all. And if you go to the gym the next day, and the next, the same vision will be staring back at you from the mirror. Zero changes and no reward for your effort. But does that mean that nothing is happening? Just because you cant see immediate results it doesn't mean you're not making progress.

The truth is that it takes weeks and months to see any physical change. In the same way that an acorn buried in the earth appears to do nothing, until one day the first shoots of a new oak tree appear above ground. The same is true for all our little daily choices: how we eat, how we take care of our psychical health, how we work, how we parent our kids. We all slip up from time to time, but its our consistent choices which create the outcomes in our lives over the long term.

Why do so many of us find ourselves going from crises to crises or living in unhappy situations? Why do we think life is something that happens "to" us? The answer is probably that most of us are too busy in life to step back and look at our journey through life from afar.

If you had a helicopter and used it to hover above your life right now, what would you observe? From this helicopter you can see your past journey through life to the present. You could also see your future direction based on your day-to-day decisions so far. If you don't like the destination ahead of you as you hover above, then you know you need to find another destination and begin making the daily changes to get you to this new future outcome.

I had a coaching client this year. She was young and full of potential. A full time UCC post grad student with untold success available to her. Yet when she came to me first, her life was in serious disarray. Her grades were poor, her assignments always late, even after working through the night before to complete them. She disliked her part time job and lived from day to day watching Netflix for hours in a very messy bedroom. The result was that she fought constantly with her parents and was always frustrated and critical of herself. It was just awful to see someone with so much promise be so negative to herself.

As I coached her over the comina weeks, several patterns became apparent and we worked out a plan. One evening, after college, she went home and tidied her room. Old plates, cups, laundry etc, were all dealt with. She polished, vacuumed, and organised her wardrobes and chest of drawers. She cleared out all the clutter. It took her hours. In the end she was exhausted, but she was extremely proud of what she had accomplished.

That evening, she made sure to bring her plate and glass to the kitchen before going to bed, so her new room would remain spotless. When she awoke the next morning, she told me she was bursting with pride. Her day started out earlier, and with more of

a spring in her step. Her attitude in college was better. That evening, once again, she made sure her room was in perfect order before going to sleep.

Over time, this sense of responsibility personal and pride in herself grew. It resulted in her college assignments being handed in a week ahead of time. It meant a clean and tidy room and a happy outlook on life first thing each morning. She created a plan for after college and began looking for a job that complimented this. She began working out. It resulted in her giving herself rewards for the achievements she was now making. In short, she took control of her life. Life no longer happens to her, but

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
