The people of Glanmire have waited nearly 9 years for the scheme to progress to this final stage from its inception and it's long overdue. Since the OPW consented to progressing the scheme last week there is now a 12 week period where there is the possibility of someone challenging the decision by way of judicial review but once that 12 week period elapses it will be possible to proceed to the tender, the appointment of a contractor and commencement of the scheme.


I was delighted that Minister McGrath designated this scheme as the first flood prevention scheme in the country to be signed off after new EU laws governing Environmental Impact Assessments were reviewed. anticipating form of racing action again following nearly a full year without competitions.

The competitive swimming season in Ireland commences at the beginning of September and typically finishes in July for those good enough to qualify and compete at the Irish Summer Nationals which are held in UL Arena at Division 2 level and in the National Aquatic Centre (NAC) in Dublin for the top-level athletes.

The season is broken into two parts - part one is the short course (SC) season which goes from September 1st to December 31st where all competitions take place in 25m pool format; part two is the long course (LC) season where most competitions take place in 50m pool format, where possible, with many local and regional competitions still taking place at SC format during this time. Of course, Ireland doesn't have the luxury of many 50m swimming pools to compete in so the options for LC format competitions are generally limited to meets in UL Arena, the NAC in Dublin, or up north of the boarder in Co. Down at the Bangor Aurora Aquatic Centre. Typically, LC competitions are held at regional level where athletes compete at each venue in order to qualify for the larger national level meets later in the season. Munster and Connacht athletes compete at UL Arena, Leinster at the NAC, and Ulster at the Bangor 50m facility.

By March last year, the 2019/20 long course part of the swimming season was well underway. Dolphin Swimming Club had a successful short course season under their belt up to December, with strong performances at the Irish SC Nationals in Dublin in December and confidence brewing as they looked ahead to yet another successful season especially at the business end of things come July. Having travelled to Bangor at the end of February to compete at the

Dave McCullough Memorial Meet - an international competition which featured global stars such as world record holder and Olympic Gold medallist, Adam Peaty, among many other high-profile names - the top swimmers in the club looked primed for the tough months ahead with spaces on Regional and National Teams & Squads up for grabs at the end of the

Next on the competition schedule was the annual Dolphin Open – Munster's most prestigious club competition and one celebrating 40 years in 2020. The pressure was on for the home club with other clubs travelling in large numbers to try to win the 'Antoinette Bohan Trophy which is awarded to the club with the highest points tally at the end of a hectic weekend of racing. Having successfully defended their title since 2016, Dolphin were a target for all the other clubs with efforts made to take as many points from their athletes in each race as possible. The strategy of the coaches is almost as vital as the performances of the swimmers in each race and which requires a strong team of athletes to pull such performances out of the bag consistently over three days of gruelling racing.

The 'Open' took place on the weekend of March 6th — 8th and very nearly fell victim to impending COVID19 restrictions as the global pandemic started to take control in Ireland that week. Committee members and coaches met throughout the week to monitor and assess the developing situation and following advice from Swim Ireland, a last-minute decision to proceed was announced. It seems like a lifetime ago now, but the meet went off without a hitch and it proved to be a fantastic success yet again for the northside club.

Swimmers from clubs all across Munster converged on Mayfield Sports Complex with high hopes of achieving national division qualifying times — the Dolphin Open is one of the few Swim Ireland Level 3-licensed meets in Munster each season, therefore, athletes can achieve national competition qualifying times at such meets. Friday evening saw some strong performances across the club's age groups in the longer distance events, while Saturday and Sunday provided the spectators with some amazing performances from all athletes as they battled for points and medals in each event across the relevant age groups. The home club were dominant in almost every event and the points were secured leading into the final race session on Sunday afternoon so the pressure was off the athletes and they could enjoy their last few races

The week leading up to the competition was far from ideal. Many of the club's top athletes had come down with illness and there were some worrying injuries mounting which led to some swimmers racing less events than initially planned. The Head Coach, Mick McCormack, had planned to train right through this event as he prepared his charges for some of the bigger national meets approaching, especially the Irish Open and Olympic Trials which was due to take place at the start of April, so this was no time to rest up. The younger cohort of athletes in the club certainly stepped up to the mark on the weekend though and racked up some impressive and crucial points for the club. Topped up by some fantastic swims by the senior athletes, it truly was a club-wide

effort across the weekend. On Sunday evening, Dolphin were crowned victorious, having amassed the highest points tally from the 47 events throughout the weekend. ### "NÍL AON GLEANNTÁN MAR DO GLEANNTÁN FÉIN" GLOUNTHAUNE NEWS BY "THE FOREIGN CORRESPONDENT"

### A look back at the month the Glanmire Area News was published online only

The first housing estate built in the Glounthaune area was "Johnstown Park" in the early sixties and the houses were sold for circa £4,200.00. Further estates were subsequently developed including; "Johnstown Close", "The Highlands", "Annmount", "Thornberry" and then in relevant times: "Cois Chuain", "Corryfield", "Gort Fada" and "The Woods". "Harper's Creek" - should it be "Harpur's Creek"? - is presently being developed at Killahora and this will be an estate of one hundred and seventy four residential units, a crèche and doctor's surgery. Planning permission was granted in May 2018 for thirty one units Upper Annmount, Townland of Lackenroe and in July 2018 permission for an additional seven was granted. These developments have not yet commenced. A grant of planning by Cork County Council for a further fifty five houses at the same location attracted three appeals to Bord Pleanāla and in March 2020 the Council's decision was overturned. The Council also granted planning permission in February 2019 for seventy houses on land west of the school in the Townland of Ballynaroon, known locally as "Gleeson's Field". Eight appeals were submitted to Bord Pleanāla and in January 2020 the Council's decision was overturned. The reasons given for both refusals were rather similar; the insufficient high density and the necessity of a road improvement scheme for the area. It appears that Bord Pleanāla has finally got the message; infrastructure in place prior to permission. The community was obviously very pleased, especially with the "Gleeson Field" refusal, but was flabbergasted when news of a planned alternative use for this land became known just two weeks ago. A planning application for the construction of a Heliport was published on the East Cork Journal on Friday March 20th. Subject location was chosen because it was identified as a prime site for the much talked of regional twentyfour hour emergency base. However the planned Heliport is also to be utilised by the Air Corps as a back-up to their F.T.S. (Flying Training School) at Baldonnel. The cadet's pilot wings course is intensive and the PC-9M aircraft, which is a modern

tandem seat turbo-prop trainer, is extensively used for night flying training. The H2 Class helicopter, which the Heliport will be capable



of accommodating, has an overall fuselage length of minimum fifteen to maximum twenty four metres.

Aspects of the detailed planning application include; a continuous smoke source to act as a wind direction indicator, a Hangar Building to be located adjacent to the fueling section at the eastern end of the Heliport close to the school. The gross floor area of the building will be five hundred and ten square metres, the external walls will have plastered block work and the roof finish will be of cladded sheeting. Point lighting set into the ground will surround the Heliport and floodlighting will illuminate the immediate surroundings. The white coloured lights at FATO (Final Approach and Take-Off area) will be fixed, directional and positioned along the edges. These will be of one hundred candela output at intervals of five metres with each comprising of ten lights. The TDLO (Touch Down and Lift-Off area) will be lit by twenty five candela output yellow lights and spaced at five metre intervals around the perimeter. The Heliport will have provision for twenty car spaces and two truck spaces which will be located at the forecourt area, and two spaces will also be designated for fire and rescue service vehicles. Access for all Helipad related vehicle movements will be via a road to be constructed from adjacent to the school at the eastern end of the Heliport to the Hangar Building. The green coloured perimeter security fencing will consist of close mesh three metre panel widths which multi-lift to a height of four metres. They feature pressed V Beams and for additional strength and rigidity are reinforced by a four millimetre vertical and a six millimetre horizontal diameter wire across the full panel width. The Heliport will be floodlit during the hours of darkness for operational and security reasons. This planning application raises numerous questions, not least; why was there not any consultation with residents? There are so many issues to be addressed; for example the planned lighting is a pollutant, as is noise. Envisage a Harley motorcycle being driven outside your home without a muffler and that noise would only be for a brief spell whereas helicopters are audible for miles away, and in the case of inward movements the noise gets louder and louder until almost touchdown. Also bear in mind the vibration effect especially when the aircraft hovers overhead as will occur during the Cadet's training programme, and noteworthy is the fact that this includes night flying. Noise certificates for helicopters are a requisite since 1992 and all on the Irish register conform to ICAO noise emission SARPS. However that is not much comfort to residents in the nearby houses and in estates such as "The Highlands" and "Cois Chuain", as well as residents in the surrounding areas, including those on the flight path because quite simply helicopters are noisy. The adjacent school scenario must of course also be factored in as the activities at the Heliport would seriously disrupt the day to day teaching practices. Also, when a helicopter lands or departs during school breaks or at the commencement and finishing times of the school day; the Health & Safety aspect for children, teachers and parents arise. The Irish Aviation Authority has no direct responsibility for the control of noise disturbance or nuisance and as a result a complainant is subjected to bureaucratic torture because the EPA Act 1992, Noise Regulations 1994, must be accessed through the Department of the Environment. A problem also arises when a helicopter is landing insofar as everything within a hundred feet radius is scattered over a wide area. Then there is the nuisance factor relative to the upkeep of aircrafts in the Hangar Building; for example the repetitive turning on and off the engines as well as the excessive noise when idling. The noxious fuel odours, including those emanating from the fueling area, would also be a major hazard. Another problem is presented by the fact that an illuminated continuous smoke source is proposed rather than the commonly used "Windsock". The emergency procedures are questionable also; Cork County Council personnel based at "The Waterworks", Glanmire will be responsible to address any problems that may be encountered with the Heliport operations. They also decide if it is necessary to activate the Cork County Council Major Emergency Plan. But is their work-load not overburdened at present without this onerous additional assignment? And also, are the personnel readily contactable? Louden Cleere is spokesperson for the developer of the facility, Heliport Morvah, and his assertion relative to noise is that the sound level of helicopters is far below that of many accepted noise producers such as; trains, buses, trucks, cars, motorcycles, boats, lawnmowers, vacuum cleaners and hairdryers. He accepts that there will be noise but reckons that residents, who he refers to as noise receptors, will get quite used to it after a few years. However he did say that there could be understandable disturbance with night movements and his recommendation in this regard is that potential affected residents should retire to bed early in order to be in a sound sleep by midnight when the Cadets night training programme is at its intense. Referencing the alleged noxious fuel odours; he advises that a lawnmower overspill would create a far greater hazard. He says that children in the nearby school can look forward to a bit of a buzz around the place and that one lucky child, whose name will be drawn from the names of the four hundred plus pupils on roll, will be awarded a tour of the facility free of charge. He dismissed the inference that the facility would interfere with the day to day teaching practice at the school adding that a free ten minute trip on the helicopter for the Parish Priest / Board of Management would easily sort out any problem. He says that his company will not engage with the local community because from past experience subjects discussed at such gatherings are left "hanging in the air". Louden Cleere says that he is pleased to get his positive information across loud and clear per the April 1st. issue of Area News. Yes, the April 1st. issue!

Mature gardens where it had perhaps been planted in the past, can seem filled with the narrow, mauve flowers which fling back their segments at every burst of spring sunshine. The most eager of its clan they really can grow 'like weeds'- but never become a nuisance. What you never see are the seeds which lie hidden at the base of each tube. These are generally thought to be distributed by ants.

The earliest camellias burst into bloom during late February and the spectacle can cheer for a considerable time. With careful selection, it is The sun has slowly and possible to have selected bushes in bloom from November through to for late March/April, a Easter, irrespective of how late this latter church feast may be.

However, the real joy of February and later are the camellias, arch deceivers no less, for they look almost too exotic to succeed outdoors as easily as they do. Unfortunately, a snowflake, a blade of grass, a blackthorn shoot has more perfume. No spring garden is complete without at least one early variety and the best (and earliest) include those sold under the species name 'Sasangua'. Look for stockists on computer or laptop for they are rare enough on garden outlet sales tables and note the charming Sasangua 'Yuletide' which has graced our garden here for decades. It blooms in the weeks leading to Christmas with a willingness that staggers and continues to the end of February and later. Be assured also that they take kindly to pot culture.

Buy a decent sized, terra-cotta, or glazed pot for one of these, and fill it with a mixture of lime free soil from the garden, to which has been added a generous dressing of

leaf-mould, commercial potting compost or pine-needles. into this 'cake mixture' as big a camellia as you can afford, bearing in mind that the older you are, the more you need to invest in something that will not take a decade and more to reach a commanding size!

'Debbie' is a later variety reliable, free-flowering, vigorous variety which I also rate highly, but if red is

neither in keeping with your colour scheme or preference, opt for 'Jury's Yellow' (very unusual, but it most definitely requires overhead dappled shade to stop its blooms browning in morning sun following a hard night of frost) 'White Nun' or 'Miss Universe' in white. A real treasure you might come across is, 'Lavinia Maggi' in a combination of striped white and pink but look for any sasangua variety first. I have only one word for these: superb!

### **THE GARDEN IN FEBRUARY 2021**

TRUMPET lilies such as the highly scented and pure white 'Regale' and the lemon on apricot 'African Queen' perform well in pots stood outside during summer. In winter keep these safe indoors from ice and waterlogging. Garages will do fine if glass cover is not available. Repotting yearly is not only sensible but mandatory, for many still suffer the scourge of vine-weevil. As spring lengthens it would not be unusual for white weevil grubs to be found burrowing deep into the fleshy scales of the choice Asiatic and Oriental forms. Repotting eliminates their numbers from increasing.

WEATHER the dreaded winter weather insists on living up to its reputation. But despite the dreariness, localised flooding, savage frosts snow and biting cold, occasional days of bright sunshine arrive to play unexpected tricks with spectacular light effects. Pale plumes on the ornamental grasses Stipa and Miscanthus light up like fireworks in the low sun whilst long shadows seem to appear everywhere. The box balls throw long shadows across the driveway whilst nearby trees cast thin lines

of darkness which, as the light diminishes, pool together and stagnate. I love these winter light effects.

NO DIGGING! In wet and frosty weather and especially after the rain, ferocious frosts, and gales of late, the most pressing work is one of tidying up whenever possible, but no work or planting should be undertaken until conditions underfoot thaw fully, dry out appreciably, and become firm. Digging and planting in wet conditions ruins the soil structure leading to growing problems much later in the season.

### Canon Sheehan of Doneraile, 1852-1913 Cuid 2

Scríobhadh an tAthair Sheehan altanna go rialta don 'Irish Monthly' a raibh an tAthair Matthew Russell ina eagarthóir air. Bhí sé an-tógtha le haltanna an Athar Sheehan agus mhol sé dó leanúint ar aghaidh ag scríobh. Bhí éagsúlacht mhór sna haltanna. Mar shampla, in 1882, bhí alt aige ar 'The Effects of Emigration on the Irish Church'. Bhí alt aige ar Gambetta, Príomhaire na Fraince. In 1884, scríobh sé 'Free Thought in America' agus bhí trí alt aige ar 'Education at German Universities. Is cosúil go raibh sé an-tógtha le feabhas chóras oideachais na Gearmáine agus theastaigh uaidh na haltanna a úsáid mar chuid den díospóireacht a bhí ar siúl faoin oideachas 3ú leibhéal in Éirinn.

Ghríosaigh sé pobal an bhaile chun díriú ar ábhair a thabharfadh deis dóibh tuiscint níos fearr a fháil ar nithe níos airde. D'fhan sé i Mala go dtí 1894. Fuair Easpag Chluana, an Dochtúir Mac Cárthaigh, a bhí ina chaomhnóir aige ina óige, bás an bhliain sin. Ceapadh Easpag nua, Robert Browne agus tharla go raibh folúntas i nDún ar Aill, paróiste sa chomharsanacht chéanna, ag an am. D'iarr an tEaspag ar an Athair Sheehan a bheith ina shagart paróiste ann. Ba é seo an ceapachán deiridh aige. D'fhan sé ann go dtí 1913, bliain a bháis. Bhí an-tábhacht ag baint lena thréimhse ann agus inniu aithnítear é, go coitianta, mar Canon Sheehan of Doneraile. Is anseo a tháinig bláthú ar a shaothar liteartha le sraith d'úrscéalta a chuaigh i bhfeidhm go láidir ar phobal léitheoireachta in Éirinn, ar Mhór-Roinn na hEorpa, i Meiriceá agus chomh fada ó bhaile leis an Astráil.

Ba é an nós oibre maidir le scríbhneoireacht, a lean an tAthair Sheehan ná dhá uair an chloig a chaitheamh ag scríobh gach lá. Réitíodh an t-aistriú talún i bparóiste Dhún ar Aill go sásúil don dá thaobh a bhuíochas do Canon Sheehan mar bhí muinín ag an dá ghrúpa as.

Choimh maith le cúrsaí idirbheartaíocvhta, rinne sé a dhícheall chun modhanna talmhaíochta nuaaimseartha a chur chun cinn. Bhain sé leas as an Irish Labourers Act, 1883 chun scéim tithíochta a chur chun cinn in áit na mbothán suarach ina gcónaídís. Fuair sé tacaíocht ó Lord Castletown ó Doneraile Court sna hiarrachtaí seo.

I measc na leabhar a chuir Canon Sheehan amach sna blianta seo bhí 'Luke Delmege', úrscéal faoi shagart a bhí bunaithe ar a shaol féin, go pointe. Bhí úrscéal eile aige 'Geoffrey Austin' mac léinn ag dul le sagartóireacht. Chuir sé 'The Graves of Kilmorna', úrscéal faoi Éirí Amach 1867 amach, chomh maith.

I ndiaidh a bháis, cuireadh 'Glenanaar' i gcló. Sa leabhar seo insíonn sé scéal an Doneraile 4 a bhí daortha chun báis de dheasca dhúnmharú ghníomhaire talún. Daoradh chun báis iad go héagórach agus feicimid sa scéal go raibh daoine réidh chun mionn éithigh a ghlacadh ar mhaithe le hairgead. Bhí na coistí cúirte claonta go mór ag an am agus ba bheag an seans a bhí acu an crochadóir a sheachaint. Ní raibh ach duine amháin a d'fhéadfadh an scéal a athrú. B'shin Domhnall Ó Conaill, Fuascailtoir agus Comhairleoir. Thaistil duine tríd an oíche ar mhuin capaill. D'aistrigh sé capaill roinnt uaire agus shroich sé Doire Fhionáin maidin Domhnaigh. ### **GOOD NEWS... GLANMIRE FLOOD DEFENCE APPROVED**

Brilliant News outlined in the Irish Examiner on Saturday 16/1/2021

by Sean O Riordan that the long awaited flood prevention scheme in Glanmire has finally been approved, but unlikely that construction will start until August 2021 at the earliest.

Public expenditure Minister Michael Mc Grath has approved the €14 million flood prevention scheme Glanmire, which suffered a major flood on June 28th 2012.

Flooding caused tens of millions of euro in damage to around 70 households, businesses, facilities, sporting children's playground etc after the Glashaboy River burst its banks following torrential rain. Last September Minister McGrath accompanied by local TD Padraig O'Sullivan spoke visited the area and spoke to residents' associations, business and representatives promised to bring the project to fruition as quickly as possible.

Most residents in this estate have been unable to get flood insurance cover since the 2012 incident.

During that incident the local GAA pitch was covered up to the hight of the crossbar, and all facilities were out of action for over months twelve and cost many thousands of euro to return to its original state, properties were left under six foot water and some residents had to be

rescued from their homes by Civil defence volunteers using inflatable boats.

The OPW plan to provide protection for more than 100 homes, businesses and sporting facilities stretch which from Sallybrook down stream to Glashaboy Estuary Local TD Padraig

Sullivan who accompanied Minister Mc Grath stated that the project is unlikely to go to tender until March 2021 and

the chosen contractor is unlikely to make a start until August 2021.

The Community Association wish to acknowledge the work of Padraig O Sullivan TD, for helping to bring the project to fruition, to Local CLLR

Ger Keohane who led a petition and campaign, and to Meadowbrook Residents association who led the campaign up front for almost nine ears, and any many others who have helped along the way.

Happy to convey that the Sport and Amenity Fund of Cork City Council has provided funding of €30,000 for a new cluster outdoor calisthenic gym in the John O Callaghan Park. The equipment will gym include age friendly elements. will And also wheelchair friendly. A welcome and beneficial additional to our park. In relation to another grant significant Glanmire application: Area Community Association were unsuccessful in our For application Town €100.000 and While Village grant. were obviously disappointed, we are satisfied that our turn will come, we will learn from this application and be ready for the next opportunity in the future.

Communication with the City Council is good and things are happening slowly, and we are optimistic for the future. Amenities are a priority. Clearly lockdown has shown us that our facilities are inadequate as walkways are grossly overcrowded. Areas & walkways we were eager to improve and develop are now extremely busy and need attention in the near future in order to serve our community.





### CORCAIGH CORK

### **Glanmire Village 1837**

Samuel Lewis was the editor and publisher of topographical dictionaries and maps of Britain and Ireland. His aim was to give a condensed, faithful and impartial description of each location. This is an extract from Samuel Lewis Topographical Dictionary of Ireland 1837. Historically it is very interesting as it provides the names of the major landowners, big houses and industrial mills in the area. This account was printed just 10 years before the Great Famine struck which was to have devastating consequences for the area.

Glanmire, a village, in the parish of Rathcooney, North Liberties of the county and city of Cork, and province of Mumster, 4 miles (E.) from Cork, on the road to Dublin; containing, in 1821, 558 inhabitants; at the last census the population was returned with the parish. The village is situated on both sides of the river Glanmire, which, after meandering through a beautiful glen, empties itself under a drawbridge of cast iron into the river Lee.

The vicinity is enlivened with many plantations, hanging woods, and the number of gentlemen's seats and villas with which it is adorned.

The principal residences are Lota House, that of W. H. Greene, Esq.; Lotabeg, of D. Callaghan, Esg.; Lotamore, of the Hon. C. L. Bernard; Dunkittle, of A. Morris, Esg.; Sun Lodge, of W. Oliver, Esq.; Lota Lodge, of J. S. Barry, Esq.; Fort William, of Mrs. Baker; Glentown, of Mrs. McCall; Glanville, of E. Newsome, Esq.; Woodville, of N. M. Cummins, Esq.; Lota Park, lately purchased by J. J. Murphy, Esq.; Jane Mount, of W. Hickie, jun., Esq.; Lake Lodge, of John Martin, Esq.; Castle Jane House, of R. Martin, Esq.; Castle Jane, of H. Lawton, Esq.; Mina Villa, of J. Hardy, Esq.; Glanmire House, of Ed. Morrogh, Esq.: North Esk, of J. Carnegie, Esq.: Park Farm, of H. Morrogh, Esq.; Spring Hill, of G. Waters, Esq.; Glen View, of R. Young, Esq.; and Sallybrook, of J. Hodnett, Esq. In the village are extensive flour-mills, belonging to Mr. Shaw, and in the vicinity are those of Messrs. Thorley and Son, for finishing calico and linen, upwards of 1000 pieces being the weekly average; these gentlemen have also an establishment for bleaching and dyeing, and employ upwards of 200 persons; about the same number are engaged in the Glanmire woollen factory. higher up the river, by Messrs. Lyons and Hanly. The river is navigable for lighters up to the village at high water, which bring up coal, culm, sea-sand for manure, and other articles for the supply of the neighbourhood. The parochial church, a plain neat building with a tower and spire, is in the village, and was erected in 1784, on a site given by R. Rogers, Esq.; and at a short distance is the R. C. chapel for the union of Glanmire. Here are also male and female schools. supported by the rector; and a female school was built and is supported by Mr. Hickie. A dispensary is open for the relief of the poor, and a clothing society has been established.

### February Recipe: Sausage plait

### **Ingredients**

- · Packet of skinless sausages (16)
- 2 small baby peppers
- 1 large onion
- breadcrumbs (2 slices)
- · 1 tomato-sliced
- salt, pepper, and mixed herbs
- tomato puree and ketchup
- 1 roll of bought puff pastry
- · beaten egg for brushing

### Method

- In a food processor, completely break down the sausages. Transfer to a large bowl.
- Shred your peppers and onion, add to sausage meat.
- · Make your bread crumbs and add to mixture.

- Add your seasoning and herbs
- In a bowl, squeeze about half a tube of purée and mix well with about 3 tablespoons of ketchup
- · Mix well the tomato sauce mixture into the sausage mixture to bring it all well together.
- Roll out the pastry sheet, width and length
- Place your sausage mixture neatly right down the centre, and place sliced tomato along the top.
- You can simply cut off the 4 corners, and fold in the top and bottom end, and fold the 2 sides in, one on top of the other, and put a few diagonal cuts on it. OR check out how to plait on YouTube
- Brush with beaten egg.
- Bake at 180°C for about 40min

### How to Recognise the Signs of a Scam and What to do After



With fraudulent at an allbehaviour time high, it's important that we take time to familiarise ourselves with the signs of a scam and how to deal with it.

Some scams, are of course, more obvious than others, but it's the new creative attempts to rob us of our money that we must all be on the lookout for. Phishing is a cyber-crime that disguised uses text messages and email as a weapon. The goal of the scammer is to trick you into believing that the message is something vou want or need and is from a source they know or trust. For example,

a request from your bank with a click to a link or a downloadable attachment or notification to pay customs duties on a home delivery.

Speaking about the increase of scamming ploys and what we can do to protect ourselves, John Beausang Yvonne and Rayner, City's Cork Citizens Information Managers, both agree, "There is a big increase in the number people contacting of us about scams. Some can be quite obvious, while others can be very difficult to recognise.

If in doubt, do not open the message or email, click on the link, engage in any way and don't hesitate to contact the company to verify if the communication or message is real or not. If you have any concerns please contact your local Citizens Information Centre, we remain open and are here to answer any questions you may have.

Scammers are cunning and believe that they are above the law, this is why we must be one step ahead of them at all times and know the signs, and how to protect ourselves from scams. Be very cautious of;

Unsolicited contact


from a company out of the blue

- A deal that seems too good to be true
- You are asked to share personal details
- You are being pressured to respond quickly or transfer moneý quickly
- You have been asked to pay by an unusual method, for example through a transfer service like Western Union or virtual currency like Bitcoin
- Misspellings or grammatical mistakes
- Unusual email addresses


