

"NÍL AON GLEANNTÁN MAR DO GLEANNTÁN FÉIN" GLOUNTHAUNE NEWS BY "THE FOREIGN CORRESPONDENT"

THE TIDY TOWNS COMPETITION

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This annual competition was first held in 1958, it was cancelled in 2020 due to Covid and the 2021 competition, again because of Covid, was restricted to remote judging and based on submissions attached to the participants' entry forms. There were a total of eight hundred and forty seven entrants nationwide which was seventy one fewer than 2019 and Glounthaune, entered in Category "B" which relates to a population range of plus two hundred to one thousand, secured three hundred and thirty one marks. This was an increase of eight on the 2019 figure and placed Glounthaune second of the fifteen entrants in the Cork South region, just two marks behind Innishannon and this was a similar placing in 2019 but the margin was seven back then. The "Sustainability – Doing more with Less" criterion was once again problematic, albeit there was an increase of one mark, and this is an obvious category to target as there are significant marks to be gained. The top marks secured, as in 2019, relate to "Nature & Biodiversity in your Locality". The following is a breakdown of marks awarded as well as extracts from the adjudicator's report:

Community – Your Planning & Involvement 48/60: The adjudicator remarked that Glounthaune would be seen as a large village; "if one can recall from my last visit which was a good number of years ago and if a GAA fan one would associate it with the Erins Own Club". He referred to "the number of public bodies, development agencies, local businesses and other local organisations that help you by way of funding and sponsorship indicates that your work is very much appreciated and of course this is very much reflected in the marks attained over the years in the competition". The communication methods are praised and this included "the oldest form of all – word of mouth". The National School was commended on its Green School Flag successes and the Tidy Towns committee was congratulated on getting substantial funding in collaboration with Birdwatch Ireland to develop a nature trail and provide bird hides on Harpers Island. The adjudicator appreciated the extensive photo collection of activities under this category and remarked "you have been associated with the competition since the sixties, with a rest period in between! and your performance year on year is very praiseworthy". Streetscape & Public Places 43/60: The adjudicator acknowledged that because the benefit of a visit was not possible "one has to base all comments on your inputs coupled with photographic evidence - not the most satisfactory of ways but it is what it is. The photographic evidence of your work helps to get a feel for the projects that you are involved in and in collaboration with other partners. There is a large body of work undertaken in this, and indeed across all categories, and the adjudicator has examined all in detail but the nature of this year's adjudication does not allow for extensive comment. Feel assured that your work has not been undervalued in any way". The excellent work on the pedestrian and cycle lane was noted and the adjudicator remembers Fitzpatrick's of old remarking that the transformation in a year is quite staggering considering the times we have been living in.



Green Spaces & Landscaping 44/60: The following presentations were among those that appealed to the adjudicator: the Craig's Field picnic tables which "look to be of sturdy design and are sited in a popular location", the planting of yellow rattle or rhianthus minor in a number of locations "as it will allow other wild flowers to prosper", the nice upgrades of various areas -"particularly at the Railway Heritage Garden and the new planted area on the road side of the railway fence opposite the church".

Nature & Biodiversity in your Locality 41/50: The adjudicator remarked that the Nature Trail Development at Harpers Island is an example of a major nature related project that will benefit future generations. The habitat survey carried out in 2020 also received favourable mention; "this was an excellent undertaking and it encapsulates very succinctly that you

have a great understanding of what is needed under the quidelines of this category".

Sustainability - Doing more with Less 22/50: The guidelines relative to this category ask

Groups to show that their activities help make their area more sustainable and thus more environmentally friendly. The adjudicator praised the Glounthaune Sustainable Energy Community on being involved with other stakeholders. Credits were bestowed for the excellent use of disused stone from rockfall which was dislodged from a local cliff area for the construction of a boundary wall that was part of a stone based elongated flower bed. Also the second-hand book shop and saving yellow rattle seeds "especially the use of waste saw dust for use as mulch on planting arrangements". Tidiness & Litter Control 62/90: The adjudicator remarked that "the amount of diverse work that you have undertaken under both the headings General Tidiness and Litter Control is guite something, particularly given the restrictions that your members were under because of Covid. The adjudicator is not going to comment in too much detail except to say that an extra two marks are awarded based on the photographic evidence alone". Other items that appealed to him included: "as a dog lover one is aware of the near scourge of the pandemic dog poo and owners with no civic pride who wouldn't clean-up after their precious pooches. One was taken with the Cork Anti-Litter Poster "Paws for Thought" and the banner "This Place Is for You". You as a committee has put in place a number of initiatives that help to make sure that there is an ongoing awareness among the community to keep Glounthaune both tidy and as litter free as possible. The various projects have been noted and it is good to see that the younger generation is being actively encouraged to play their part as well".

Residential Streets & Housing Areas 37/50: "From the pictures that you have supplied the village looks in splendid condition and the presentation of homesteads and gardens is just superb. Yes, it would be good if an adjudication visit could have taken place as this is a category that benefits from a walk around and comments made in line with

the guidelines of the category. The visual enhancement and character preservation of Glounthaune is the main objective of the GTT and you are helped in achieving this by your local partners such as the Mens Shed giving unstinting support in helping with the upkeep of stone walls and communal areas etc. Some of the houses in the village street looked very well maintained and credit is due to their owners. The planters and the Village Pump were both admired as was the garden outside the Community Centre with the impressive heritage information panel in front".

Approach Roads, Streets & Lanes **34/50:** The adjudicator referred to the 2019 report which commented that approach roads into the village generally looked well with neat hedging and lovely stone walls. "The input and pictures that you have supplied suggest that much the same comment could be made in 2021. Under normal circumstances the adjudicator would do all the entrances and make comment so this year one is reliant on what you have submitted so thank you for the excellent set of photographs. Some additional new work has been done upgrading verges and grass margins as one enters the village. The stone sculpture on the L3004 entrance was admired as well as the planting of beech hedging on the same road. The stone wall repairs at the Dry Bridge have also been noted. The adoption of the Godwit, as depicted in the sculpture, as your logo is an interesting fact because of the birds association with Harpers Island. Some very fine work on the stone wall to the village entrance was also enhanced by some prudent planting. The four photo collage suggests that road surfaces and verges are in good condition. An additional mark is awarded on foot of the extensive input in this category". The Adjudicator's Concluding Remarks: "It's been quite a while since the adjudicator has been in Glounthaune and on foot of your submission a long overdue visit is on the personal agenda. GTT is a very proactive group who has worked tirelessly for the betterment of the village and you are to be commended for this dedication to the cause. You have done well in the competition to date and you are wished well in the future".

MAKE THEM LAST: 4 TIPS FOR SUCCESSFUL NEW YEARS' RESOLUTIONS

EMOTIONS

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When the emotional clutter of Christmas and the New Year have finally become a memory, clear thinking and confidence returns to rejuvenate my faltering spirit. can then begin to appreciate the emptiness of winter! At first glance, winter speaks of barrenness and desolation, but in fact it hides a lovely truth: the beauty of silence. The trees and shrubs, even the landscape may appear silent, but in truth they are simply resting, so there's really no need to say anything. They are not thinking about what lies ahead, whether spring is going to be early or late, or what pest or new disease might arrive to torture them.

We too, I believe, could do with a little more silence, reflection, and contemplation at least every January. We worry about so many things and yet few are imperative or essential. That said, Covid and climate change remain extremely worrying and we must continue to meet them head-on, until they are fully resolved.

As gardeners we have found that climate change has in recent years brought about milder winters and it has allowed garden weeds to continue in leaf and stalk without as much as a hard frost to sap their vigor and knock their enthusiasm for invasion. I notice the long trails of speedwell now mixed through the whorled, un-sticky (for now) goosegrass, and find it easy to remove but it's only one of many.

There seems to be a constant procession of all weeds this month and the list includes shepherd's groundsel, and hairy purse. bittercress.



Spring primroses are already pushing up through the goosegrass, creeping buttercup, and debris of all kinds and whilst they won't bloom until much later their imminent arrival can now be observed.

These, even as I write (and it is January) are rising and spreading. Unfortunately, time has caught up with me and age means that I am reluctant to seek ruthlessly, and totally remove these young offenders, but their rankness mocks my ability to get down regularly to their level. But I can, and do get down, but it takes greater effort and full concentration.

Now, when I go hand weeding, I bring a soft, waterproof kneeler, a bucket for the weeds, and a stainless-steel hand-fork, but if this method is not for you, there are other ways of achieving satisfactory results.

annual Existing weeds can be eliminated this month by smothering them with a two-tothree-inch layer of mulch material. Weeds and their seeds which are deprived of light and air will

AN IMMINENT ARRIVAL

Spring is eager to show us its first flowers, and this causes our creative endeavors to activate and stir. The weather may still be unkind, but winter is on the wane, losing its vicious grip on the land and its occupants. Doubt and hesitation may be the hallmark of the opening days of this month, but the spirit of renewal is strong and every day that passes sees the buds of hope not alone trying to break through but opening to the new light and increasing temperatures. WINDFLOWERS

Anemones are also known as 'windflowers' for they can appear during late spring and early summer when the wind is constantly out of its lair. There are many forms but the Coronaria varieties 'St.Bridgid' and 'De Caen' can be planted anytime now through to late March. Anemone

corms look very unpromising, being quite small, dry, and often wrinkled, so soak in tepid water overnight before planting to help them swell. Plant any which way really for they have neither top nor bottom, but do choose a warm and sheltered sunny spot, about 3" deep and as much apart. Flowers form in summer but dallying too long with planting will delay the onset of early blooms. There is only one point to remember. The coronaria anemones (other varieties too) only open their rays of petals in full sunshine, so they are not for a shady place. I have had a better return from these over the years than many other bulbs, but you must put them in positions they'll appreciate. They'll reward you yearly for a decade and more.

THE JANUARY GARDEN 2022

On many occasions over recent years, I meant to mention something unusual

certainly not live or germinate. Anything in the organic line will suffice, well-rotted manure, garden compost, wood or bark chippings, gravel, pine-needles (wonderful beneath acid-loving rhododendrons and all lime haters) or best of all, 'GeeUp' horse manure. As well as smothering weeds, these materials will keep within the soil the moisture we now frown upon and release it when conditions demand. Who could forget the drought conditions on occasions last year, and how plants everywhere were put under overpowering stress? Similar conditions will no doubt return this year but by mulching now, you'll stave off its worst effects.



Wild garlic is another early riser and green shoots are already along the roadway on the approach to New Inn

Kill existing weeds on drives and gravel areas with Pathclear or Weedol, both of which can be used during cold weather. The former will stay active for six months, the latter will not. It can however be applied to all unwanted soft green foliage even in the coldest conditions. Keep these chemicals clear of ornamentals and on no account treat weeds in lawns.

about garden snails. Not only have they become fat and bulging, but when wet weather is forecast, they can be found (in our garden) positioned securely, high on all kinds of support! Six to eight feet would not be unusual. Do they know or can they sense when torrential rain is due? It's uncanny to say the least. If I were living in France, the largest in the garden could surely be sold, for there they are normally bred there for consumption with garlic butter.

It takes up to four years for snails to grow large and in doing so chomp through our choicest delphiniums. lupins, and hostas. To control them I lay bait in the form of pellets hidden under pieces of slate or tile supported on small stones. The snails and slugs find them easily. The only problem with stamping on snails is they make a disgusting mess on decorative paving!

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Well done to all groups who finished out the year with one last training session, while some also went ice skating! Evervone had an enjoyable afternoon after a great year of football. We look forward to another successful year in 2022!






