HOUSING AT GLOUNTHAUNE

Why are they trying to desecrate our sacred little gem? Naturally housing is of the utmost necessity and is very welcome in our area, and it can also contribute enormously to life in our domain. A vibrant community has so much to offer but infrastructure to accommodate large-scale developments should already be in place and not, as presently pertains, a "cart roimh an gcapall" scenario. And plans to overdevelop any area should not be entertained. Developers' of an estate should have dialogue with the community in advance of a planning application and take its views into account. This is not happening and the first and only advice at present is either via a planning notice published in a newspaper, or the one erected at the development site. Also, the community should have an input on naming an estate, and roads within if applicable and such should be based on local historical or topographical features. This would replace the present method whereby the developer submits same to the planning authority for approval. Also, gifting of suitable land for sport and other community activities should be one of the conditions applied to the developer on the grant of planning permission. Two estates were developed in relatively recent years; "The Woods" and "Gort Fada" and two further ones are being developed at present; the well-advanced 0 Mahony "Harpers Creek" at Johnstown / Killahora which is a one hundred and seventy four unit estate with a crèche and doctor's surgery. The other is a Bluescape Ltd. development of forty seven units on land to the north of Annmount Estate and eastwards from the Forge Cross, which are to be accessed via a signalised junction adjacent to the Cois Chuain housing estate eastern entrance. another There are three developments planning at application stage; developers Barlow Properties applied to Cork County Council on April 23rd.2021 for planning permission to erect ninety four units at Ashbourne, comprising of eighty six apartments and eight houses. There were thirty five submissions, one of which, the Tree Council of Ireland pointed out that Ashbourne holds the largest concentration nationally of champion and heritage trees in any single location, and that includes the National Botanic Gardens in Dublin. It called on the council to reject this proposal in its current form and request the applicant to submit a new design that will encompass the preservation of the integrity of the gardens and trees. In response to the council's request; new designs were submitted and this included reducing the number of units by six. The council has recently requested further changes including the removal of one apartment block which was planned to be built where the former tennis courts were located, and it has also called for the design to be given a radical overhaul as well as placing far more value on the site's The characteristics. second development at planning application stage is that lodged by Bluescape Ltd. on December 16th.2021. The company applied directly to Bord Pleanála thus availing of the Strategic Housing Development Scheme as the planned development consists of one hundred houses or more. This scheme was created in 2016 as a fast-track planning mechanism to facilitate the delivery of large housing projects. It may end in the autumn rather than next February when it was due to expire, and this is due to a rash of legal challenges resulting on lengthy delays. The location of this development is at Lackenroe and Johnstown townlands; one hundred and ninety six houses, plus six-three storey apartment blocks comprising a total of sixty four apartments, and a two storey crèche are planned on land eastwards of that presently being developed by the same company, as referenced above, and to utilise the same signalised junction, except for two houses to be accessed from the locally known "Back Road". A second secondary emergency access is also proposed at the northern side. Additionally, five houses are planned for south of the "Back Road" on land which was formerly part of Ashbourne with access provided from the road. Also, a four-storey mixed-use building with a roof terrace, consisting of twenty four apartments with community / commercial units at ground floor level are planned on the same land south of these dwellings; close to the Walk / Cycleway located beyond Fitzpatrick's and the Waterside Apartment Block, with access adjacent to where the Walk / Cycleway commences. lt is noteworthy that only nine car park spaces and two motorcycle spaces are planned. These comprise of four spaces for visitors, two disabled spaces, one parent and child space and two for electric vehicles. Accordingly standard parking spaces are not proposed and this in effect means that there is no planned parking area for residents of the Apartment Block. The application attracted eighty six submissions and Bord Pleanála's decision will be known on April 19th. A further fast-track planning application for seventy two houses and forty apartments was lodged with Bord Pleanála by developers Ruden Homes on February 4th. 2022. The location is at Ballynaroon on land locally known as "Gleeson's Field" which is on the Caherlag road west of the school. Additionally, the applicant has a legal interest in land at Ballyhennick, which is located just further west of this, and the intention is to submit a future planning application for housing there. The proposed development comprises seventy two houses and forty apartments and the Bord Pleanála decision will be known on May 30th. The foregoing details reference a total of eight hundred and twenty housing units and beg the question; is infrastructure in place to accommodate such? The simple answer is no. Will planning permission be granted for the current applications? Well, the recent decision by Cork County Council to introduce a one-way road system suggests; "fearing the worst". The council in their wisdom published the regulatory notice on the Irish Times which read; "Pursuant to Section 38 of the Road Traffic Act 1994, Cork County Council proposes to introduce a one-way road system and associated traffic management, signage, and road markings at Ballynaroon and Lackenroe townlands. This is for road safety purposes to facilitate the probability of additional large housing estates in the area. The public are invited to lodge submissions on or before Tuesday March 1st." Now, as this newspaper is not widely circulated locally the following are details of the one-way system; (1) from the Church to the Dry Bridge; northbound only. (2) from the Dry Bridge eastwards along the "Back Road" to beyond Johnstown Close; eastbound only. (3) the adjacent link road from the Johnstown Close Park area to the juncture of the L3004 main road east of the station; southbound only. (4) the Priest Hill; northbound only. Overall, it is fair to say that residents will be seriously inconvenienced by the one-way system. This is not only because of the circuitous route to get to their destinations but also the higher speeds, which no doubt the system will attract and will have an impact on pedestrian safety. Problems are envisaged, such as; (a) the church to the Dry Bridge section must, in

addition to the present volume, accommodate traffic from the Highlands Estate as there is no right turn at the estate's exit and traffic therefrom is required to utilise the "Back Road". Johnstown Close / Park destined traffic from the main road must also use this section and then proceed eastwards along the "Back Road". This is because the link road east of the station is southbound only. (c) The "Back Road" residents will the experience greatest inconvenience in terms of the volume of additional traffic and they are also restricted to eastward movements only. So, for example if their destination is Caherlag; they are obliged to access the main road via the link east of the station and proceed to the Dry Bridge via "The Hill", adjacent to the church. The "Back Road" must also cater for traffic originating from Caherlag Road / Cois Chuain and, very significantly, that from the Forge Cross direction. Incidentally the reason that the Priest Hill is northbound only is to prevent traffic joining the fast-flowing "Back Road" eastbound traffic at the rear of Ashbourne. The imposition of this one-way system has left a lot to be desired. Why was there not any consultation with the community? And publishing the notice on the Irish Times was very dubious. A council spokesperson commenting on the system said; "we accept that there might be a slight increase in traffic on the "Back Road" but it will not be significant enough to create a problem. A little inconvenience is expected for residents of estates such as Johnstown Park. Johnstown Close, Cois Chuain and The Highlands". The spokesperson added; "The council has fulfilled all statutory requirements and we have also consulted with various developers as the council receives substantial planning fees, and much more, from them. We consider that their generosity should be acknowledged in every respect, even if detrimental to the interests of the local community. They will also be attending a "signing of the order ceremony" for the one-way system on Friday April 1st. which will be held at one of their offices. The one-way system should be operative a few weeks later". This is of course also "April Fool's Day" and it is significant that this report on the "planned" one-way system is published on the April 1st. issue of Area News! Happy Fools Day! **SLÁN ANOIS** ©

Citizens Information Ukranians in Ireland

John Beausang, Citizens Information Manager for the Cork City North area gives an update on the supports available to Ukrainians coming to Ireland, those who have recently arrived in the country or for people who want information

on how to support them. John says "When Ukrainians or people travelling from Ukraine first arrive in Ireland they need to go to the reception centre at Dublin Airport and give their details. This is where they will get the papers they need to show that they can stay in Ireland. The staff at the reception centre can also help them to get somewhere to stay and help with monev."

Visas

Citizens of Ukraine do not need a visa to travel to Ireland. John also clarifies that they do not need proof that they have a COVID-19 vaccine, or need to take a COVID-19 test before they arrive. If they do not have a current passport, they can use another form of identification to travel to Ireland (for example, national ID card, expired passport or birth certificate). The Irish Government has asked airlines to accept these documents. John cautions that if you are travelling with family members who are not Ukrainian citizens, they may need a visa to come to Ireland.

If you are already in Ireland and you need to bring children here from Ukraine without their parents, you should contact the Department of Foreign Affairs at 01 4082000 and ask for their Ukraine Unit.

Immigration and international protection

The EU, including Ireland, is using the Temporary Protection Directive. This means that Ukrainians are allowed to work and access services and benefits without making an application for international protection (refugee status). This applies to Ukrainian citizens and their families. It also applies to people who live in Ukraine and cannot return to their country of origin.

Housing and accommodation You can get help with somewhere

to stay at the reception centre at Dublin Airport.

If you are already in Ireland and you have nowhere to stay, you can email the International Protection Accommodation Service (IPAS) on ipasinbox@equality.gov.ie.

Healthcare

You can access healthcare in Ireland. You can also apply for a medical card. This allows you to access healthcare services for free and get medicines for a reduced price. Contact your local CIC for more information and help with the application.

Social welfare

You can apply for social welfare (financial support) when you arrive in Ireland from Ukraine. You need to get a PPS number (an Irish social security number). You can apply for a PPS number when you arrive in Dublin Airport. If however you are in Ireland already, you should go to your local Intreo centre or branch office. You should not apply online for your PPS number.

The Irish Government has published social welfare information for people arriving from Ukraine under the Temporary Protection Directive. This information is also available in Ukrainian and in Russian.

If you have children, you can get Child Benefit. This is paid to the parents or guardians of children aged under 16. It is also paid for children aged 16 and 17 in full-time education. You do not have to have proof that your 16 and 17 year old children are in full-time education for the first two months after you arrive in Ireland.

Education

The Tusla Education Support Service can help you find a school for your children. You can get more information about how to enroll children by calling your local CIC.

What Can I Do If I Want to Help? **Pledging Accommodation**

John advises that there are a number of ways you can help Ukrainians coming to Ireland. You can pledge accommodation on the Irish Red Cross website by registering your profile on the Register of Pledges on www. redcross.ie. Someone from the Irish Red Cross will contact you to get further details. The Irish Red Cross is working with the Irish Government to match people who have accommodation to offer, with refugees who have come to Ireland. You can pledge a spare room in your house or a completely vacant property. Pledges can vacant property. Pledges can be offered on a charitable basis you can request to receive using Assistance Payment. or Housing Shared properties must include direct access to cooking facilities, shared or private bathrooms and private bedrooms of a reasonable size. All properties must be close to public transport and within a short commute to villages, towns or cities.

Tenancy agreements are entered into and the period requested is usually 12 to 18 months. Support from Red Cross caseworkers is provided throughout the tenancy and once the tenancy is in place the guest/tenant will be placed on the local authority housing list.

Other Ways to Help If you speak Ukrainian and want to help, you can contact the International Protection Protection Accommodation Service (IPAS) which is responsible for the provision of accommodation and related services to people in the International Protection ('asylum') process

Alternatively, NASC is an organisation that works with migrants and refugees to advocate change within Ireland's for immigration and protection systems, to ensure fairness, access to justice and the protection of human rights. Based in Paul Street in Cork, NASC offers supports and training to groups interested in a community sponsorship sponsorship Community programme. Sponsorship groups befriend and help newcomer refugee families to navigate different aspects of life in Ireland to support and welcome them into their local communities.

THE APRIL GARDEN

I have often likened gardening box to a selection of chocolates: the more you delve, the more you discover what surprises lie under each layer of dark, corrugated, crinkly paper! The one thing I dislike of course is the paltry few of my favorites: the Turkish delights, the orange and coffee creams, the wickedly delicious strawberry the cups! I know that the road to sheer indulgence is not paved entirely with hazelnut clusters either but the manufacturers should try a little harder at getting the correct mix! Until then, let's lo

look at something eye-catching in the April garden. Now a spring garden without scent is simply unthinkable. so we must have plants to entertain our noses at every turn Corylopsis will fill the bill handsomely during early April when its soft yellow to pale primrose, cup-shaped flowers, hang in tassels from bare branches and these smell sweetly of cowslips. Well, mine smells of cowslips anyway, even

A MUST FOR RAINY AREAS

Primulas I do like, especially the old-fashioned forms such as those known as 'laced' primulas and all double kinds in traditional yellow, even the sky blue varieties now sold everywhere. They remind me of West Cork where the traditional vellow forms grow 'wild' and free in gardens high above the roadsides. I used to have a few good clumps but they slowly failed through winter rot. In recent years I have revived just a few, and I guard them determinedly. Success I believe has been achieved in high rainfall areas through the generous use of sharp grit, horticultural grit to be precise, a medium which has a benevolent and healing influence on everything it touches; bulbs, perennials, pot plants, and tender trees and shrubs which insist on sharp drainage and a place sheltered from excessive winter wet.

No gardener I reckon should be without a decent mound or bag though it is named Corylopsis "willmottiae" which gróws to six feet. In a small garden, this variety or or "pauciflora" will come to perfection and be no bother to look after.

All varieties will withstand a little lime in the ground but above all, the family likes to be kept moist and cool during summer and this kind

of arrangement is easily catered for here in Glanmire. Give it the kind of soil and situation that suits azaleas or rhododendrons and you will have a friend for life coming up trumps during every spring that you are around to see it. In fact it is usually seen growing

of sharp grit, for its uses are truly manifold. As you work it through potting compost or mix it into planting holes notice its wonderful scrunch, its sharp cleanliness, its ability to melt into the medium to create a welcoming, free-draining home for just about everything. All bulbs, corms and tubers will benefit from a generous fistful or two placed directly beneath their basal plates. This applies especially to all varieties of lily, to tulips and choice alpines planted this month of April.

This kind of wonderful grit may be produced in Co. Roscommon by the Glenview people but its heavenly stuff to use in and around the garden. It may well be a by-product of quarried stone, but one surely finely ground by the angels for use by mortal gardeners here on earth. Ordinary road grit just isn't the same. It doesn't even come near the feel or the alchemy of sharp grit nor does it give you the same kind of sensual pleasure as it slips between your fingers.

among azaleas and the like, and in many instances it looks better than the palest and coolest forms of these.

As a member of the Hazel family, this shrub comes into bloom just as the blooming period of the Witch Hazels comes to an end but it always surprises me as to why it is not as popular as the Witch Hazels themselves. Perhaps reason is because the Corylopsis is not reliably hardy in very cold areas (especially in Britain) and the blooms are often damaged by late-night frosts and biting easterly winds. In such cold areas the plant is best placed in light shade where the overhang from bigger subjects gives just the kind of protection it so evidently needs.

TIP: Come the month of September, buy a bag (no less, for they are relatively cheap) of sky-blue, Muscari "armenicum" for these will bloom at the same time giving you the most wonderful colour contrast in the spring garden. You will thank me in the years ahead for such a suggestion.

No, horticultural grit I assure you, is best only when sharp, and the sharper the better

Use it throughout winter in composts in which to strike hardwood cuttings or try it in similar mediums during May through to August as you insert softwood tips. Mix it with everything you plant between now and mid-summer. Use it in the greenhouse on trays which hold over-wintering plants or top dress these same plants so that green algae and slime (not to mention liverwort) will be unable to gain a foothold. Lay a mound of sharp grit around hostas and delphiniums to deter slugs and snails or use it to lighten the most stubborn sticky clay. You can even use it as a clean protective mulch safeguarding your choicest stock from excess wet and cold next winter. Use it also to mark their positions as they sleep deep beneath the cold soil. Magical is surely the correct word for this heavenly material. 'Hillside and Dooleys have stocks ready now.

Chuir sé tús le fiontar nua a raibh an-rath air, de réir dealraimh, agus ansin thit sé as a chéile gan choinne. Inniu, thabharfaí scéim phirimide nó scéim Ponzi ar a leithéid d'fhiontar, ach ag an am, bhí an chuma air go raibh bealach nua aimsithe chun saibhreas a bhaint amach don ghnáth-dhuine.

Díoltóir ceannródaíoch ba ea é a thairg brabús mór do dhaoine agus a thug geallúint láidir dóibh go bhféadfaidís a gcuid airgid a fháil ar ais ag am ar bith. Infheistíocht den scoth a bhí ann, dar leis. Ag an am, 1954, bhí an geilleagar in Éirinn marbhánta agus bhí airgead fíor-ghann. Tuigimid inniu gur cheart dúinn a bheith ar an airdeall, má deireann duine go bhfuil modh aige chun airgead mór a dhéanamh go héasca. Ach in ainneoin níos mó a bheith ar eolas againn faoina leithéid de scéim inniu, buailtear bob ar dhaoine fós.

Rugadh Paul Singer in 1911 i Bratislava in Impireacht na Habsburgach. I ndiaidh Chogadh Domhanda 1, tugadh an tSeicslóvaic ar an tír nua-chruthaithe agus inniu, is é Bratislava príomh-chathair na Slóvaice. D'fhás sé aníos i bpobal Giúdach. Bhog an teaghlach go dtí an Ostair in 1925 agus fuaireadar saoránacht Ostarach. Ina dhiaidh sin. d'fhreastail Paul ar Ollscoil Lausanne san Eilbhéis agus ghnóthaigh sé dochtúireacht in Eolaíocht Pholaitiúil agus Sóisialta. Nuair a bhí bagairt na Naitsithe ag méadú i dtús na dtríochaidí, d'aistrigh tuismitheoirí Paul go Londain. Faoin am seo, bhí Paul ag déanamh staidéir ar an bhFraincis agus ar an Dlí Idirnáisiúnta i bPáras. D'fhreastail sé ar an London School of Economics ar feadh tamaill, ach d'éirigh sé as chun dul isteach i gcomhlacht airgeadais a athar. Bhí caipiteal £10,000 ag an gcomhlacht agus £10 ag Paul ann. Ach i nDeireadh Fómhair 1953, fógraíodh an comhlacht bancbhriste. Bhí fiacha £58,150 ar an gcomhlacht agus ní raibh ach £12,326 de shóchmhainní aige.

Thaitin a bhfaca sé leis agus chuir sé fios ar a bhean agus a bheirt pháistí. I bhFeabhra 1954, thug sé cuairt ar Shanahans i nDún Laoghaire. Ceantálaithe a dhíol troscán agus seandachtaí ba ea Shanahans. Athair agus mac, Jerome agus Desmond a bhí i mbun an chomhlachta. Cheannaigh Singer píosa troscáin ar £100. D'fhill sé an mhaidin dár gcionn chun an bille a íoc. Chuir sé é féin in aithne do mhuintir Shanahan agus thug sé a chúlra dóibh. Saineolaí ar stampaí a raibh taisteal forleathan déanta aige ba ea é, a dúirt sé. Ní raibh sé seo fíor ach bhí sé in ann dul i bhfeidhm ar na Shanahans. Dá dheasca, bunaíodh Shanahans Stamp Auctions. Chuir Singer agus Shanahans £100 araon isteach sa chomhlacht. Nuair a deireann duine inniu go mbailíonn sé stampaí, tuigimid gur caitheamh aimsire atá i gceist aige. Ách gnó ba ea é seo.

A TRIBUTE TO AN EVERYDAY LEGEND

A few weeks ago I saw something that inspired me in a way most books or articles never could. It happened at the strangest of times and in a very unlikely location. But this brief experience, for me, shows that we are all responsible for our own life and everyday legends are all around us.

a mid-week It was evening. I sat in a very quiet carpark checking emails on my phone. After a while I heard children's voices. but thought nothing of it. Soon after I noticed a woman jogging past my parked car. Again I barely took any heed and continued to tap replies to emails, consumed by my work. Eventually, I looked up from my device and took time to observe what was really playing out in front of my eyes.

Here was this woman. A mum, for sure, and clearly a busy one at that. She didn't have the physique of an Olympian athlete but here she was jogging laps around this car park. She had kids, who must have been too young to leave at home. So this incredible lady brought her kids, who sat in the family car, windows open, and shouted encouragement at their mum as she ground out lap after lap in that car park. Here was this woman with every excuse under the sun not to train. Despite all the reasons she might have not to run, she found a way of overcoming life's circumstances. I sat there in awe as I watched the scene. in utter admiration of this woman. She had a goal and by god she was going to achieve it. She inspired me that evening, and I have no doubt is an amazing role model to her young family too.

Excuses are what keep us in our comfort zone. They are handy little soundbites we like to repeat to avoid the unpleasant sensation of pushing beyond our comfort zone. Each of us has something we would like to be different in life. But some of us search for handy excuses not to do what we need to do in order to achieve it. That's because probably involves it stepping outside what is comfortable and risking the unfamiliar.

In order to make any change, we must be willing to do the uncomfortable – maybe even the unpleasant. I'm sure this runner, a mum with a young family, had homework to supervise, perhaps had spent the day at work, and maybe had a dinner to prepare – who knows. Yet, despite all these things, she found a simple solution and made sure she got her workout done while ensuring her kids weren't missing out.

Sitting there, watching this runner training. I was reminded of one of my favourite guotes. When we see success, it's only the tip of the iceberg and most of the effort is not obvious. Behind every success story there is personal sacrifice and a mind-set that overcomes excuses rather than giving into them. In the words of Muhammad Ali, "The fight is won or lost far away from witnesses - behind the lines. in the gym, and out there on the road, long before I dance under those lights."

I'll never know what happened this to determined and inspirational woman. I don't know what her goal is or what her purpose was that evening. But what I do know it this: Our life is determined by the choices we make. Those small daily habits, our routines, no matter how small eventually, inch by inch, determine the quality of what we have around us in life. It's the power of habit that determines the eventual guality of our life.



The Arrival of the S.S. Titanic at Queenstown in 1912. The talk of Oueenstown must have been the arrival of the R.M.S. Titanic on 12 April 1912. The largest most technologically advanced ship in the world was moored near Roche's Point. The Cork Examiner reported "She dropped anchor at 11.55 a.m. about a mile outside Roche's Point and as one saw her steaming slowly into view, a majestic monster, floating it seemed, irresistibly into the harbour, a strange sense of might and power pervaded the scene. She embodies the latest triumphs in the world of mercantile marine" On board Titanic were the first class passengers, the cream of society, millionaires and aristocrats who paid handsomely for the voyage. Next in line were the second class passengers followed by third class who made up the majority of the passengers. Although third class conditions were cramped, running water, electric light and

good food was available. Three first-class, Seven second class and 113 third class passengers embarked on the tenders Ireland and America from the White Star wharf. The tenders brought an enormous amount of luggage and the very lucrative 1,385 sacks of mail. The Ireland and America also returned with the Irish mail and a 24 year old deserter named John Coffey who wisely decided to get off. Another passenger Fr. Browne was saved from possible disaster by a telegram from his Jesuit superior ordering him to "get off that ship". Browne was a keen amateur photographer who had taken extensive photographs of the second class areas of the ship. He also took the last known photograph of Captain Smith looking down from the lofty heights of the bridge.

Lawrence Beesley's in his book The Loss of the S.S. Titanic records "The Titanic turned slowly through a quarter-circle until her nose pointed down along the Irish coast, and then steamed rapidly away from Queenstown, the little house on the left of the town gleaming white on the hillside for many miles astern. In our wake soared and screamed hundreds of gulls, which had quarrelled and fought over the remnants of lunch pouring out of the waste pipes as we lay-to in the harbour entrance; and now they followed us in the expectation of further spoil." Little did any of her passengers realise that she was about to steam into oblivion and become the most famous ship that the world has ever known.
