Endurance Test At Glounthaune Station

The "Examiner" of June 8th. reported that the frequency of the Cork commuter rail network between the city, Cobh and Midleton was set to double and "that this marks the start of a decade of delivery for the region". Meantime since July daytime off-peak 18th.the weekday on both the Cork to Cobh and Cork to Midleton service has increased from every sixty minutes each way to a frequency of every thirty minutes. With both services sharing the line between Glounthaune and Kent Station it means that there is a train every fifteen minutes each way between six, forty five am and seven, forty five pm. for the Glounthaune and Little Island communities. This frequency was one of the key improvements for the city's commuter rail network, as outlined in Cork Metropolitan Area Transport Strategy's. The improvement of the service is of course welcome but it is disappointing that the "late night" departure times remain unchanged. The last train ex Cork servicing Glounthaune and Little Island is the ten, thirty pm to Cobh and on Sundays' it departs at ten pm. Taking-in a show at the Opera House or attending some other social event is out of the question! The last departure back in the days when customers were a bit of a nuisance and classified as passengers was at eleven, twenty five pm. The last train ex Cobh is at eleven pm and on Sundays' at ten, thirty pm whereas in the "old days" it was at midnight. The last departure ex Midleton is at ten. forty five pm and on Sundays' at eight pm. Could there not be a sixty or ninety minute each way service during the night, or could the present times be extended somewhat? This would be an attractive and safe means of accommodating the youth generation in particular. larnröd Eireann's future plans include a sixty two kilometre high-frequency network between Midleton, Cobh and Mallow, a ten kilometer of dual-track to Midleton and the eventual electrification of the Cork commuter network. larnröd Eireann also confirmed that it plans to unveil details later this month of investment on a second track between Glounthaune and Midleton and will begin public consultation. It also plans to install a new footbridge, and lift for mobility-impaired customers, at Little Island station as well as installing a new passenger information system at all stations on the Cobh and Midleton lines by the end of this year. The planned installation of a lift at Little Island station once again highlights the deficiency of such a vital facility at Glounthaune station and this has been referenced in this column for the past number of years. And it is also interesting to note that commuters utilising Little Island station have presently roadside access and egress for both platforms: Cobh and Midleton destined trains from the northern car park side, and the southern footpath side for the Cork bound trains. Now the number two platform at Glounthaune station, which serves the Cork destined trains via the inbound from Midleton and Cobh, can only be accessed via the footbridge which is of course a problem for wheelchair users' as well as those with mobility difficulties. and also for parents with small children who have to experience the trial of being obliged to negotiate the bridge while carrying a buggy. Handrails were installed back in 2018 which are of assistance to the infirm but the problem for the wheelchair user and the parent predicament remain because the rails reduced the width of the steps and this exacerbates the task. The

footbridge was very rarely used in past times because it was possible to cross at the western end of the platforms which were sloped downwards to rail track level. Sleepers were firmly positioned between the tracks at these locations and thus formed a level-surfaced crossing. This facilitated traversing platforms so the problem being experienced today did not exist back then. It was of course pre "Health & Safety" days but is the present scenario compliant with such? Glounthaune was one of the stations where it was planned to have a lift installed but this was during the "Celtic Tiger" vears and the associated funds exhausted. However there were ample funds available in 2009 for the construction of a thirty metre span overbridge at Tivoli to serve a few houses that were already accessible and at a cost of five million euro. However, larnröd Eireann has devised an Irish solution to this problem at Glounthaune station and it is interesting to point out that this was offered in a "tongue-in-cheek" fashion in this column on the June 2018 edition of Area News! Signs have recently been erected at both platforms at Glounthaune station; "Access & Egress: Access to opposite platform by footbridge only. If you are unable to use the footbridge you must travel to Cork (to Cobh is shown on the Platform One sign), remain onboard and return to exit at your destination". Now a person affected would presumably have already disembarked from the train so having read the notice would then have to wait for the arrival of the next train! Such an "arrangement" also means that it is not possible for such customers to utilise the last trains ex Midleton or Cobh unless they arrange overnight accommodation and travel on the first departure train ex Cork the following morning! That is assuming that they had not already disembarked from the train because otherwise it would entail "sleeping rough" overnight at Glounthaune station and then continue on the lengthy hazardous journey home via Cork per the first train the following morning! The EU "Passenger Rights Regulation" is relevant as it stipulates; "passengers with reduced mobility can travel in a way that is comparable to other citizens. Railway companies and station managers have to establish non-discriminatory access rules for the transport disabled persons, and of persons with reduced mobility, including the elderly". The regulation is in force since 2007 and yet fifteen years later the foregoing scenario exists at Glounthaune station. This glaring requisite should be addressed as a matter of urgency and it is not an issue for consideration away down the line - quite simply; it should be fast-tracked!

THE BUS (BY) PASS!

There are only six weekday departures ex Cork which serve Glounthaune whereas there are twenty to Carrigtwohill which begs the question relative to the differential; why cannot these fourteen buses exit the N25 at Junction Two. Little Glounthaune, Island and instead of the Carrigtwohill Junction West, Three? Naturally there is no bus stop between the two Junctions on the N25 but if Junction Two was utilised both Glounthaune and Little Island would have a further fourteen services per day, and there would also be an opportunity for Bus Eireann to secure additional customers. Glounthaune is served by five buses on Saturdays' and Sundays' whilst the Carrigtwohill figure on Saturdays' is fifteen and eleven on Sundays' therefore the total differential number of services for the week is thirty. Similar figures apply to Cork destined departures; the total ex Glounthaune for the week is fifteen whereas the number ex Carrigtwohill is forty six. There would be an additional thirty one services ex Glounthaune if those buses accessed the N25 at Junction Two rather than Junction Three. Unreal.

Cork, In all areas 0f pretentiousness is increasing to the point of vulgarity, and it's leading to arrogance and bilesnobbery. Discrimination like follows at a slower pace. I have experienced it and lived with it for over seventy years. To give you a few multifarious examples of how it works let me start with postal addresses, in other words, where you live. There are the 'leafy' areas the auctioneers and valuers love to promote, and those which contain social housing. Into which bracket does your home fall? Next comes place of employment and your position therein, followed by the type of car you drive (with up to date 2022 number plate), the sporting club or gym you attend, and the involvement you and your partner play in the social calendar. But the most arrogant of all I have found is your accent, for as soon as you open your mouth, you are pigeon-holed into a specific category. In Cork there are three, all beginning with the letter N. Accent, it seems, determines (rightly or wrongly) your social standing!

In recent decades snobbery has even permeated the gardening world, evident in the gardeners choice of plants and accessories. So when I use the word 'aristocratic' to describe the world of the Heuchera family, I am not trying to be haughty. They really are elite and pride themselves on their endless range of qualities. These can bamboozle us with their foliage for it is endlessly beautiful, and flowers which many would describe as sublime.

In my plantings I remove all their blooms even as they develop,

THE GARDEN IN AUGUST

LAVENDER

If you try to grow lavender where the ground or compost lies heavy and wet it soon falls victim to a disease called shab, an ugly condition where patches of growth turn black to begin, later dying slowly. Later, the whole bush gives up. On free-draining ground or where the compost in containers is lightened with sand, grit or small gravel, lavender can be for once removed the leaves expand in size and increase in colour intensity. At least that's my experience with varieties of Heuchera and perhaps it would be worth trying it in your garden. The same treatment should be given to Brunnera 'Jack Frost', removing all those sky blue flowers before they get the chance to vamp you and make you change your mind.

With today's modern strains there is no whimsy in asserting that a Heuchera plant is more than the sum of its parts-you will love them I assure you, for their long list of likeable characters including their very modest demand on maintenance. Even the effects of the dreaded vine-weevil seems to have tapered and eased in recent years. I find very few grubs among their roots now.

Therefore, if you can provide dampish soil and a sheltered woodland-type setting (beneath a garden tree or shrub perhaps) then the foliage of all Heucheras will continue to work their magic for the whole of winter. These were the only plants which survived unscathed from the extreme conditions experienced during the winter of 2010/2011. This is surely one of their greatest strengths for the coloured foliage is guaranteed to remain evergreen and attractive through the worst that winter can throw at us.

an enchanting plant. Try it as suggested recently or as a low hedge in place of box, as an under-planting to roses or as an edging to beds and borders. Flowering in July and August, it conveniently comes between the two main flushes of roses-and has the further merit of keeping most of its silvery, aromatic leaves through the winter.

PHLOX

Of all the garden scents, the soft peppery smell of phlox

Try Heucheras in pots and containers and above all as part of window-box plantings. In the open garden, they'll relish well-drained, neutral soil. Avoid planting yellow forms in full sun for it will readily burn and discolour the foliage. Generally, they will do best in light shade during at least the hottest part of the day.

My personal Heuchera choices are 'Tiramisu', 'Lime Cordial', 'Marmalade' and 'Electric Lime' but believe me, no variety will be found less than good.

SUMMER PERFECTION

By early August a spirit of indolence and inactivity begins to come over the gardener who grows flowers! Some would say they are simply taking a well-earned rest and this can be true. However, it is not until late July that the garden becomes swamped by a great sea of growth and in the presence of all this the modest grower can do little but stand aside and gaze with wonder and enjoyment! What a wonderful hobby this gardening is.

TOPICAL TIP

Wise gardeners will have preserved precious soil moisture for their plants with a mulch layer of organic material such as bark chippings, cocoa shells, garden compost, or other organic-type material. Ideally, these are applied early in the season and certainly long before drought conditions arrive, but it is never too late to put down such a covering. Do make sure that the ground is already wet if laying down mulch materials this month. Whatever about the weather at the moment (and it's great) I do expect August to be the driest month of the year.

is the one which reminds me most of schooldays and youth. So as they continue flowering watch the moisture content in the ground for these really insist on plenty of water. They will bloom regardless, may I add, but in a tired, limp kind of way, and the plants will have a tendency to collapse and droop to expose unpleasant stems and browned leaves. In a wet summer, they will reward you with a long succession of huge powder-puff flowers in pleasing clean colours.

Bhí deontais thalún tugtha ag Rialtas Cheanada d'inimircigh agus fuair a bhean, Rosalinda, talamh mar oidhreacht óna muintir, chomh maith.D'fhás na Colthursts bia, choimeádadar ba agus sicíní. Chaith Colthurst tamall ag obair mar ghnáth-oibrí, chomh maith, nuair a bhí bóthar nua á thógáil. Cheannaigh Rosalinda 60 acra talún ar 600 dollar agus thóg Colthurst féin teach agus bothán samhraidh. Ansin fuair Rosalinda leas mionlaigh i ngabháltas 310 acra ar dhollar amháin.

In 1929, bhog na Colthursts go baile beag lasmuigh de chathair Victoria ar Oileán Vancouver. Ach ní fhéadfadh John Bowen Colthurst dearmad a dhéanamh ar an droch-cháil a bhí curtha ag an gCoimisiún Ríoga air. Scríobh sé go rialta, chomh maith, chuig an Maor-Ghinearál Bird agus faoi dheireadh rinne Bird gearán faoi. Scríobhadh sé litreacha chuig nuachtáin áitiúla ag gearán faoi iompar na maor seilge, chomh maith.

Thosaigh Colthurst ag cur suime sa pholaitíocht agus, go háirithe, sa Pháirtí Liobrálach. In 1934, cuireadh a ainm ar aghaidh mar iarrthóir Liobrálach i dtoghchán réigiúnach. Níor roghnaíodh é, áfach. Ansin thosaigh sé ag cur suime i gcóras ar tugadh Creidmheas Sóisialta air. When I decided to write an article on this topic, I wasn't thrilled at the prospect. Facing the fact that selfsabotage is a difficult thing to admit, and that this short article couldn't possibly do the subject justice. But sometimes, facing the thing you don't want to do is, in fact, the very thing you need to do!

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So what is selfthe sabotage? As name suggests, it's the myriad of ways we jeopardise our own progress. This is true for our profession, health (physical and mental), financially and our relationships (romantic other significant or relationships). Sabotaging our own progress in life (or areas of life) can be subtle or overt, and sometimes only apparent becomes when a lot of damage has been done.

selfdo How we then? As sabotage mentioned above this can be subtle or glaringly obvious. We can see it in other people all the time, however, we often blind spot have a when it comes to our own destructive behaviour. Think about a person who chooses to overuse alcohol or drugs. These are very obvious selfdestructive behaviours and can cost а person everything and everyone they have. But more often self-sabotage our is subtle, seemingly harmless, and takes its toll over time.

Some examples of this are the jobs we have.

ľve countless met people who feel unfulfilled or unfairly treated where thev work, yet they stay put and grow resentful. They lose focus on the fact that they can drive their own career if they are pro-active about it. Another example is the overuse of the array of social media. If you tot up the hours spent by you (or someone vou know) on everything from Netflix to Instagram and all the recreational apps that exist, I bet you'd be amazed at the time that is wasted by this activity. The worst part is there is nothing to show for it at the end.

Relationships are also an area where selfsabotage is remarkably common. This can happen in several ways, however. You may know someone who tends to go from one toxic relationship to the next time and again. Remaining in a toxic relationship, or one you know isn't right for you is another form of selfdestructive behaviour as it holds you back from the potential to live an amazing life with the right person in the future.

So what to do about this common form self-limiting of behaviour? The answer takes a lot of work, but is seriously worth it. The key to unlocking the answer is simply self-awareness and ensuring you know what you want out of life. Admittedly it's easy to lose focus of these concepts when life is busy, but these are the foundations of a successful future.

Self-awareness first This is the cognisant awareness of your own behaviour, actions and above all, your habits. Einstein defined madness as doing the same thing over and over but expecting a different result each time. So self-analysing your daily rituals and habits will often reveal (albeit sometimes uncomfortably) whv you are where you are in life. If you've done the same repetitive thing for years and are still unsatisfied, then perhaps changing what you do will give an alternative result. We are the result of the habits we practiced for the past 5 years. If you've spent all your free time watching tv and eating junk food, you're likely to be in a different place than someone who took night classes and who works out every day.

The reason it's SO difficult is that we often disconnected feel from the future version of ourselves. That's why having a clear picture of what you want in your future is vital. If you want to be fit and healthy in 10 years time, then what you do today will build towards that. If you want that amazing relationship in 10 years time, how you treat that relationship now will have an impact.

Many self-destructive behaviours are linked to very primal survival instincts as well as to our emotions. If we feel psychologically safe enough to try something and fail we stand a good chance of overcoming these

emotional booby Furthermore. traps. I'd argue that our own self-image is a key determining factor when it comes to how far we manage to get towards that doal in 10 years time. Ultimately if we don't believe we can become that person, then we will sabotage ourselves so much on the way, we will never get there.

taking the time Bv to consciously grow your own self-belief (Psychological safety), you will be able to grow your relationship with that version of you - who you'd like to be in the future. building And that relationship (like any relationship) generates commitment and This dedication. in turn, makes it easier to be aware of the little things we do each day that hold us back from becoming that person we know we are capable of becoming.

Glanmire Youth Project recently celebrated its 21st birthday with a function in the Youth Project Centre, where former members of the management team, representatives of local statutory and voluntary agencies, current members in the Project, and staff came together for a great reunion and to hear the many wonderful stories from the many now, not so young people. Stories on how the Youth project had benefited them over the years.

A local Management group was formed in 2001 and a detailed submission was made to **OGRA Chorchai** outlining the urgent need for such a facility at that time, as Glanmire had an increasing young population with very limited resources. This was supported by the CEO of **Ogra Chorchai Declan O'Leary** who has been very supportive over the years. Senior Officials from the Department of Education met with the proposers of the Project and readily agreed that the project was a priority.

The task then was to set up a steering group, find a premises to operate and hold interviews.

The original steering group was **Cynthia Kelleher, Dermot O'Connell Michael Burns, Sergeant Teresa McHugh, Fr. Sean O Driscoll (Chaplain GCC, RIP) and Madge Fogarty.** The group were fortunate to get a cohesive Management Group together with the same ideals and philosophy, that being - to try and meet the needs of the young people of the area, support the staff, develop the project and liaise with **Ogra Chorchai** (now Foroige).

The project was initially based in a room in **Glanmire Hair Studio** for a short period. The Project the moved across the road to the Glanmire GAA Clubhouse, where it was based for several years before acquiring their current accommodation beside **Sarsfield's Hurling pitch**.

From those humble beginnings the Youth Project has developed into one of the most Professional Youth Organisations in the City, working with over 100 young people on a weekly basis. The Project operates six days a week.

The Glanmire Area Youth Project is involved in a variety of development work which includes:

- Music (many have gone on to play with groups and bands)
- Sport
- A "Drop In" facility
- Croup and individual wor
- Group and individual work
- Educational Grinds (in association with the men's shed)
- Support to the children of those seeking Asylum, and more recently children from Ukraine.

Most importantly it gives young people a space to socialise in a safe environment, in an informal way, giving an opportunity to learn new skills by interacting with positive role models, staff and volunteers.

Glanmire Youth Project had a clean sweep in the Ocean to City boat race youth category and project recently completed a beach clean up as part of an environmental programme. The project made fairy doors for the Rocky Road walk.

In their summer programme, there are a variety of activities for young people organised by staff which include day trips, fishing trips, water sports etc.

There is no doubt that the project developed from humble beginnings in Glanmire GAA hall to the excellent Project that it is today.

Brian O'Toole has been our Youth leader for the past sixteen years. He has been the bedrock of the project, leader, and has been key to the development of the Project. Apart from running the Project he has developed excellent relationships with the young people, local schools, relevant statutory, community and voluntary agencies and community volunteers.

We were delighted to invite **Angela Ginnell** as a staff member. Prior to her appointment, Angela was an excellent volunteer in the Project and was able to hit the ground running.
