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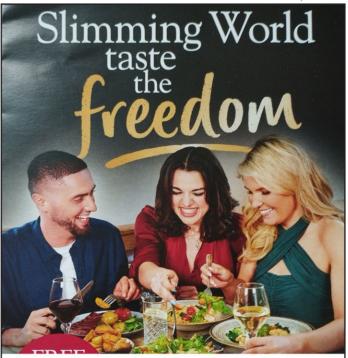

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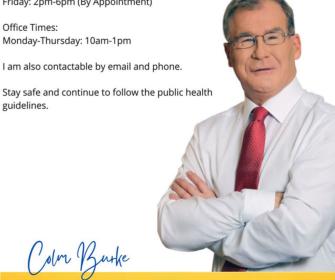

"Community Way"



"Community Way" was an named publication was produced by which Glounthaune Youth Club on a monthly basis in the seventies. A read-back of editions, such as extracts from that published fifty years ago in September 1972, offers a flavour of events back then. GAA: It was Dungournev's turn this year to end Erins Own bid number eight since the club's formation to capture that elusive Junior "A" Hurling Championship title. The game was played at Midleton on Sunday July 16th. and make no mistake about it; Dungourney fully deserved their win and they subsequently defeated Bride Rovers in the final on a scoreline of 5-07 to 2-08. Well, what of Erin's Own? Their prospects look good each year and everyone thought that winning the league title last year was the big breakthrough. Hopes of winning the championship this year were high, indeed very high, and there were even those speaking in terms of the County. But no, not even the East Cork - what happened against Dungourney?

Well first of all, sad to relate, the training sessions for the game were very badly attended. And the game itself? Erins Own was most unfortunate that one of their players' received his marching orders. This was a harsh decision by the referee and it was so trivial that the player in question only received the minimum one month suspension. This was not the first time Erins Own suffered similar decisions by the very same referee; the 1968 Fé 21 hurling championship game v Killeagh and also the 1970 junior hurling championship quarter-final v Aghada. Those

who previously declared that "we will never again play under him" must have had red faces when they again saw him pointing to the sideline this year. However, even though the referee's decision had a huge bearing on the result, playing with fourteen for three quarters of the game was of course a huge handicap: it surely was not the only reason for this defeat. It has to be asked after so many championship defeats: have the players' the ingredients for success and have they the guts and determination to win? There is no doubting their hurling ability but it is now more obvious that a team playing in the junior grade does not require that degree of quality hurling as brutal strength plays such a large part. Why then not play in a grade where there is more emphasis on hurling, namely Intermediate?

But back to the match; the number of switches made during the course of the game must have had an unsettling effect on the team's performance. Six players played in both defence and attack and this was additional to numerous other switches made during the course of the game. The difficult task for selectors is fully appreciated, but? Incidentally two years ago an Erins Own player "the remarked; selectors couldn't pick strawberries"! He has not played since and come to think of it: the selectors in question haven't selected a team since! The match post-mortem could go on and on but what's the use - the simple fact is that Erins Own has once again bowed out of the championship race. Incidentally, it would be best not to comment on the atmosphere which prevailed in the Erins Own dressing room post-match but one has to reference the dressing room; a house which many would be delighted to have as a home. It is awful to see it being utilised in this fashion. NOTE: Erins Own won their first of four East Cork Junior "A" hurling titles the following

year, 1973 - Will there be Golden Jubilee celebrations next vear?!

AUTUMN BLUES?

Autumn rolls on in its dog-day laziness, a huge interruption to the playfulness and leisure of the gardening fraternity who loved the warmth and light of summer days. As I age, I wish more and more for summer to continue. I can accept falling leaves, the cooling of the air, the destruction that frosts can wreak, even rain, but not the darkness that gathers more fully day after day.

So, while these benign days continue to arrive, I enjoy waking early each morning to savour what the new day has brought to the garden. There is something really special about embracing and greeting a September morning and the sleepy outdoors. The intimacy of these meetings is reflected in my actions for it makes me happy in mind and body. Observing the garden, the delights of this mystical season, and how life is now changing, is truly miraculous. It calls to me in the movement of late grasses, the whisper of dry seed heads and in the transformation of the green man to russet and orange. Everything seems to invite me to let go of summer!

On reflection, summer really was a riotous season and it's lasted longer than most of us could have hoped. But the garden must now listen to the call of nature, to rest, and regenerate for a period beneath the cooling soil. We too, must obey the call, but unless we remain diligent and attentive to essential maintenance, things could quickly take on a neglected look.

Shorter days this month are often blessed with bright, pleasant weather. Gardeners therefore, should take every opportunity to tidy up the garden and make headway in digging over bare soil and improving its structure.



Leaves in all their multi colours will soon carpet our gardens. Collect and bag them for they can become a wonderful source of nutrients after twelve to eighteen

Keeping the place tidy in these blanched days certainly takes priority, and this is understandable. There are those of course who still advocate leaving visible signs of decay, for it helps the environment and wildlife.

Whichever, I like to argue that there's never less to do in a garden (irrespective of season) the only difference being that now, in autumn, you come inside earlier in the evening, rather than later. Continue to clear and make ready if the garden speaks. This approach reinforces the logic of a natural cycle for the detritus of one gardening year then becomes the medium for the next. I much prefer the cathartic sense of cutting down and clearing away especially when so many hours will soon be spent looking at the garden from indoors! It would be maddening for most to see their creations in permanent chaos and untidy mess.

In closing can I add that this is the only time I envy the gardeners on the Mediterranean! Long after the autumn equinox, when we have all closed the back door, lit the outside lamps, and started supper, they will still be outside eating and drinking wine amid the perfume of lilies, lavender, and santolina, still warm from the setting sun. While our gardens are being nightly draped and corseted with inescapable spiders' webs, they will be enjoying warm breezes wafting gently through pots of scented geraniums.

That is why I'm fearful of letting go, anxious to remain clutching with summer's light and fullness. As I said in the opening line, autumn is a huge 'interruption' but it is also an important aspect of our ever-changing seasons. From September 23rd the light and temperatures will surely dip further but I shall embrace the late season blooms whilst anticipating the arrival of coloured leaves, dewy mornings and days made for the planting of spring bulbs!

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THE PEACOCK BUTTERFLY

The mysterious beauty of the peacock butterfly has not been created to charm me. No, the azure eyes on their wings are to warm predators and to give the illusion that they are much bigger than they really are. In spring the female lays 400-500 eggs in areas containing nettles because this is what her tiny black caterpillars love to east. They will continue to feast voraciously on these until it is time for them to pupate. During their time of pupation they are hidden from all of us. A miracle takes place in time for they emerge as free-flying beautiful butterflies!

SWEET MARGUERITE Daisies are a great favourite of mine, especially the Argyranthemum sold as Jamaica Primrose'. I introduced this excellent plant (old-fashioned name Marguerite) to readers years ago and whilst it fell out of favour with the newer generation of gardeners, the horny-handed hang on to it for its prolific. non-stop blooming from late spring to early winter. Observe this above New Inn School where it has been flowering non-stop since early spring. Dead-heading (which is a must) and a warm situation seem to be the only requirements it insists upon. Plants put on extra fast growth (and flowers) the later the season becomes and as such are expert at concealing gaps. The yellow blooms match very well the dark foliage of clump forming dablias also clump forming dahlias also accompanying the late blues which appear on two essential

families, the Salvias and the lovely Aconitums. The easiest salvia is still uliginosa, which has short spikes of sky-blue flowers but it has a habit of disappearing in winter if conditions get extremely cold. Some growers tell me that more often than not slugs and not hard frosts are to blame but whichever I do want to keep my specimen for next year.

CONVERSATIONS.

At a recent 'open garden' event I listened intently to a bevy of country folklore concerning the weather and planting. Among these I learned that the feast day of St. Bartholomew (August 24th) is the day on which the 'cold dew' that pre sages autumn falls, and on September 29th (feast day of St. Michael the Archangel) trees planted then 'will surely not go amiss'.

- 2) Insurance companies refusing to compensate owners for depreciation where a newer car was damaged!
- 3) An insurance company refusing to compensate a car owner, despite the person who caused the crash being convicted in Court on a criminal charge in respect of causing the accident!
- 4) Small awards for genuine personal injuries by PIAB which were subsequently increased threefold in Court!

Chaitheadh sí laethanta saoire an tsamhraidh lena gaolta i gContae Mhuineacháin. Ceann de na contaetha a plandáladh i bPlandáil Uladh ba ea Contae Mhuineacháin. D'fhág sí cuntas ar a saol, 'Doing My Bit for Ireland' agus deir sí gur chothaigh an chontráracht a chonaic sí idir saibhreas na bplandóirí agus bochtaineacht na nGael i gContae Mhuineacháin doicheall inti.

Nuair a bhí sí ag fás aníos i nGlaschú, bhí sí ina ball d'Óglaigh na hÉireann agus de Chumann na mBan. D'fhoghlaim sí conas raidhfil a úsáid sna clubanna raidhfil a d'eagraigh na Briotanaigh ionas go bhféadfadh na mná cabhrú i gcosaint go bhtéadtadh na mna caphru i gcosaint na hImpireachta. Aimsitheoir den scoth a bhí inti. Thug an Chuntaois Markievicz cuireadh di teacht go Baile Átha Cliath in 1913. Thóg an Chuntaois í timpeall go dtí slumaí Bhaile Átha Cliath agus luann sí ina leabhar uafás na bochtaineachta a thug sí faoi deara. Cháiligh Margaret mar mhúinteoir matamaitice i nGlaschú. D'iarr an Chuntaois uirthi sceitse de Dhún Portobello, Tor an Bhacaigh, a dhéanamh. Fuair sí amach go raibh armlann sa bheairic agus rinne sí plean amach chun pléascáin a leagadh ann a phléascfadh an armlann. Ghlac Margaret páirt i roinnt turasanna taiscéalaíochta chun pléascáin a fháil.

Chuir sí aithne ar Shéamas Ó Conghaile, a bhí ina eagraí don ITGWU ag an am. Le linn Stailc agus Frithdhúnadh Bhaile Átha Cliath, rinne na póiliní, an DMP, ionsaithe ar na stailceoirí agus, dá dheasca, bhunaigh an Conghaileach Arm Cathartha na hÉireann chun na hoibrithe a chosaint. Bhí idir fhir agus mhná ann agus bhí Margaret ina ball, chomh maith.

D'fhill Margaret ar Ghlaschú leis an tuiscint go gcuirfí fios uirthi nuair a bheadh sí ag teastáil. Bhí coinscríobh á chur i bhfeidhm i nGlaschú agus, dá dheasca, bhí ar bhaill Óglaigh na hÉireann ann imeacht, munar theastaigh uatha troid ar son na hImpireachta. Nuair a chuirtí in iúl do bhaill de na hÓglaigh go raibh orthu dul

go Glaschú chun seirbhís a dhéanamh le hArm na Breataine, d'imídís go Baile Átha Cliath mar a raibh campa traenála ann dóibh. Ar an 11 Aibreán 1916, fuarthas amach go raibh sé beartaithe ag údaráis na Breataine airm agus armlón Óglaigh na hÉireann agus Arm Cathartha na hÉireann a ghabháil. Bhí liosta eagraíochtaí luaite san ordú rúnda agus bhíothas chun na ceannairí a ghabháil. Bhí Sinn Féin luaite agh ní raibh Bráithreachas Phoblacht na hÉireann ar an liosta.

Chonaic Margaret buamaí agus armlón i Halla na Saoirse agus ghlac sí féin páirt i ndéantús cartús. Fuair sí teachtaireacht ó Shéamas Ó Conghaile, chomh maith, dul go Béal Feirste leis. 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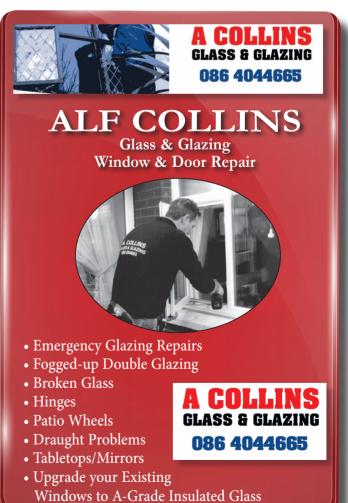

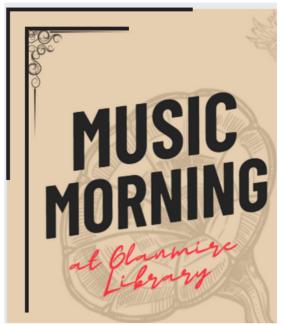

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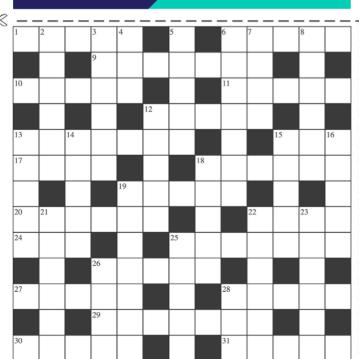
