It is a joyous time for many and people are considerate, kind and helpful but such natural neighbourly outpouring should not be just confined to the festive period. Christmastime for teenagers and young adults, as well as the young at heart, is a period when party- time fever takes control whereas for the "golden oldies" it is invariably a time for reminiscing as those many bittersweet memories of bygone days come flooding báck. Christmas is a magic season for children whose innocence and radiant smiles display a sense of nt, anticipation, and enorma excitement, wonder happiness. And of course there are also the school holidavs! Christmas publications are varied and a look-back at those published in times past make interesting reading today. An example of this at local level is the sixth edition of the Glounthaune School magazine in 1983 - almost forty years ago and costing 50P! The late Padraig O Néill was school principal back then and he outlined a general breakdown of expenditure for the year; Cleaning, Labour, Equipment and materials amounted to £2,532; Oil £1,400; Paper, including art materials and charts £1152; E.S.B. £640; Insurance £1,000; Sundries such as phone, repairs and postage £500. The amounts compared today with the foregoing figures for 1983 must be staggering. Incidentally, the total shortfall of £1,500 for the year, the Department of Education paid £5,700, was provided via the collections taken at Sunday Mass. Three hundred and forty four pupils; one hundred and eighty boys and one hundred and sixty four

girls attended the school in 1983 and that, after just two years of opening, was the maximum number that could be accommodated. Christmas The stories section of the magazine included the followina: Santa Claus: "Developed from a real person, Saint Nicholas who lived_around the year 300 A.D. was Bishop of Myra which is now in Turkey. He was a very kind man and often went about at night taking presents to the poor. His fame spread after his death and he became the patron saint of children. They were so fond of Saint Nicholas and his habit of bringing gifts that the customs of celebrating his feast day maintained. Dutch was settlers brought the custom with them to the USA and English speaking children tried to pronounce the Dutch name St. Sinterklaas but because they said it quickly and excitedly the name soon changed to Santa Claus". **The Christmas Tree**: "According to legend the custom began with an English missionary named Winfrid. While travelling Germany through about twelve hundred years ago he met a group of Druids at an oak tree. The Druids were about to sacrifice young Prince Asulf to the God Thor. Winfrid stopped the sacrifice and cut down the oak. A young fir tree immediately appeared where the oak had stood and Winfrid told the Druids that the fir was to be their new holy tree. Germans were The the first to decorate the tree". **Mistletoe**: "In Scandinavia the mistletoe is considered the plant of peace. Enemies declared a truce if they met under it and perhaps this is the origin of the present custom of kissing under the mistletoe". The magazine outlined how Christmas is spent in Europe: "In Switzerland young people visit nine fountains on their way to mass and take three sips of water from each fountain. A legend says that when they do this they will find their future husband or wife waiting at the door of the church. As in other countries they believe that

animals are able to speak at midnight in honour of their presence at Christ's birth". "In **Italy** people fast on the day before Christmas and most gifts are given on January 6th because according to legend a kind old witch comes down the chimney with gifts. She carries a bell in one hand to announce her arrival and in the other she holds a piece of coal which she uses to beat the naughty children". "In Sweden the celebration of Christmas begins on St. Lucia's Day, December 13th. The eldest daughter in the house dresses in white and wears a green wreath with seven candles on her head. She brings coffee and buns to the rest of the family and the children believe the little elves bring them their "In **Poland** an presents". empty chair is at the table for the Holy Child and a few straws are scattered on the table to remind everyone of the stable in which Christ was born". "In **France** children put their shoes in front of the fireplace on Christmas Eve so that Father Christmas or the Christ Child can fill them with gifts. Adults however exchange gifts on New Year's Day. Oysters are very popular in Paris for the main meal while goose is served in rural areas. Rolled chocolate cake in the shape of a Yule Log is a popular dessert". The pupils, in their fifties or thereabouts today, submitted articles, poems, short stories etc. for the magazine and these were interesting, varied and the following gives a flavour. A poem entitled "Christmas Time" poem was submitted by ten year old David Luskin: "Christmas time is near, and all the trees are bare, we made some wine so we could dine, 'cause Christmas time

is near. Christmas time is here and I began to cheer, I got some toys from all the

bovs. 'cause Christmas time

is here. Christmas time is

over; lucky enough my Dad is sober. I shed a tear at the

start of the New Year, 'cause

Christmas time is over". Ten

year old David Toal penned "Glounthaune": "As I gaze

out of my window I can see

the road below, the village and the railway line and the gentle waters flow, the cattle as they quietly graze among the meadows green, and Fota in the distance is only barely seen. I love this little beauty spot my Mum and Dad have found, to make a home for all of us 'mid the scenery around". Ten year old Siobhān O' Shea contributed a poem called "The Christmas Tree": "The Christmas tree is tall and bright, it glitters and glows by the candle light. I like the tree when silver balls are hung, and tinsel and stars are put among. I love the tree with its candles alight, where Santa lays my present by night. I like to look at it burning bright, Oh the Christmas tree is a glorious sight". David Keane submitted a poem entitled "On Stage": "I'm ten years of age and I'm going on stage, in a Christmas play on St. Stephen's Day. On my way that day I'll be ever so gay, I'll act with all my might and I hope I won't get stage fright. I don't mind if we have flaws, as long as we get applause. Hoping at the end of the day the audience will say, hip hip hurray and all of us actors will be jolly and gay". A poem from nine year old Grainne Murphy was called "Grandad": "My grandad old and shaky sits on a rocking chair; he smokes a pipe and cigarettes and blows it in thin air. He worked upon the railway when he was in his teens; he toiled from dawn to dark and wore quite shabby jeans. He often tells us stories of how when he was young, he had so many worries of battles to be won. But now he's old and worn, his clothes no longer thorn, he smiles as he remembers the days of long ago".

Selective tree pruning carried out during winter will hardly spoil the canopy of remaining branches but bear in mind that not all trees can be pruned then, or when it becomes apparent. Older trees are more tolerant than others, but beech, it should be made known, will not sprout readily following

win hot sprout reading following severe pruning. I myself have flopped into that trap! Never prune walnut trees in winter; they will bleed for days, even weeks. Prune these when in active growth and in full leaf. Cherries are another species which cannot be cut when the notion strikes the owner. These

On frozen branches, observe if you will, how the terminal buds grow fatter with passing time, and silent seeds sown with confidence earlier, prepare for the amazing new growth which follows as days once again lengthen.

Ceann de na nósanna sean-bhunaithe faoi na laethanta agus na seachtainí roimh an Nollaig is ea grúpaí cantairí a bheith ar na sráideanna. Is gnáthach go mbíonn Carúil na Nollag á gcanadh acu agus bailiúcháin á dtógaint suas acu le haghaidh carthanachtaí.

Cathain a thosaigh nós seo na gCarúl Nollag? Is cosúil go dtagann an focal 'carúl' ón Sean-Fhraincis nó ón Meán-Bhéarla, 'carole', a chiallaíonn 'ag damhsa'. Téann carúil siar chomh fada leis an tríú céad déag nó níos faide fiú. Bhí nasc ar leith idir an Eaglais agus carúil. Ba í an Eaglais Chaitliceach an t-aon Eaglais Chríostaí (cé's moite den Eaglais Cheartchreidmheach) ar fud na hEorpa go dtí gur tháinig an Reifirméisean sa séú céad déag. Le teacht chun cinn na bPiúratánach, a raibh darcadh diúltach acu faoi cheiliúradh, cuireadh carúil agus ceiliúradh na Nollag faoi bhrú. Sna 1650-idí cuireadh ceiliúradh na Nollag sa Bhreatain agus in Éirinn faoi chois. San áireamh, dar ndóigh, bhí na carúil Nollag. Ach níor mhair Ré Chromail ró-fhada agus bhí carúil le cloisint ar na sráideanna agus sna heaglaisí arís.

Ba é an bhrí stairiúil a bhí le 'God Rest You Merry' ná 'Go dtuga Dia síocháin agus sonas duit'. Rinne Charles Dickens tagairt don charúl seo in 'A Christmas Carol'. Rinne Shakespeare tagairt don nath, chomh maith, sa dráma 'As You Like It' a scríobhadh in 1599. Inniu, dar ndóigh, tá an claonadh ann aidiacht a dhéanamh den fhocal 'Merry' i nathanna mar 'Merry Christmas.'

Le teacht i gcoróin na Banríona Victoria sa Bhreatain in 1837, tháinig borradh faoi Charúil na Nollag. Bhí fonn ar Victoria moráltacht a chur chun cinn in aimsir na Nollag le béim ar luchanna an teaghlaigh. Ceann de na carúil Nollag atá coitianta ón ré seo is ea 'The Coventry Carol' atá ainmnithe as cathair Coventry. Déanann an carúl tagairt don scéal ón mBíobla, nuair a d'iarr Héaród ar na Trí Ríthe scéal a chur chuige faoin áit in ar saolaíodh Íosa ionas go bhféadfadh sé Íosa a 'adhradh'. Dar ndóigh, níorbh é sin a bhí i gceist aige a dhéanamh. Ach cuireadh in iúl do na Trí Ríthe i mbrionglóid gan an láthair a chur in iúl do Héaród agus mar sin d'fhill siad abhaile ar bhóthar eile. Mar dhíoltas, d'ordaigh Héaród go gcuirfí gach leanbh faoi bhun dhá bhliain d'aois chun báis. B'shin é 'Marú na Neamhchiontach.' Rinne an fáidh Irimia fáistine faoin eachtra seo seacht gcéad bliain roimhe. Tá an scéal inste i Soiscéal Matha, chomh maith.

WEIGHT LOSS VS FAT LOSS

When it comes to losing weight, we need to understand a few things first, so let's become more informed about how it works.

We all have a number of calories we need to eat each day to stay the same weight, this is called your maintenance calories. When we eat more calories than we need to stay the same weight, we are in what's called a calorie surplus and our weight increases. When we eat less calories than we need to stay the same weight, we are in a calorie deficit and our weight decreases. There are lots of calorie calculators out there to help you find this based on a few questions and measurements. The main factors that change how many calories we need is our current weight, age and how active we are.

Sounds simple doesn't it, but here is where people trip up. Dropping too many calories and exercising too much in a last-ditch effort to lose weight quickly. And yes, weight will go down but is this something that you can sustain and is it healthy? When people try to lose weight on very low calories while exercising, you are likely losing healthy muscle mass when your goal is to lose FAT not MUSCLE. The more muscle you have the higher your BMR (Basil Metabolic Rate) is, this is th rate е at which our body burns calories. So,wewanttokeepourBMRupand not let it drop by strong lean muscle.

Why maintaining is healthy amount of muscle important?

Having a healthy amount of muscle mass can lead to less body fat, a stronger immune system, improved energy levels and reduced stress. Fat on the other hand is mainly

for energy storage, insulation and organ protection. When your body contains too much body fat it impairs the bodies insulin. responsiveness to raising blood sugar and insulin. This leads to major causes of death and disability, including heart attacks, strokes, high pressure, blood cancer, osteoarthritis, fatty liver and depression.

PARKING PROBLEMS IN GLANMIRE

Traffic volume in Glanmire has grown massively over the years due to population growth, and congestion regularly occurs due to the poor road structure, ongoing roadworks and humpback bridges which were built a number of centuries ago, plus a vacant Barleycorn site.

School traffic AM and PM is a major issue because of the following student numbers (approx.):

St. Joseph's National School	- 720
Glanmire Community College	- 1300
Brooklodge National School	- 450

The above three schools are all within a quarter of a mile of each other, and combined with:

Colaiste an Phiarsiagh - 450

means a total of approximately 2900 +/- students travelling to and from school each day.

At present St. Joseph's parents are using a 0.8 acre site for drop and collection, which is critical to the school's operation. The site is now for sale, targeted for building and urban renewal.

It is critical that this site is retained and properly developed for parking and school use. There is a major challenge here for the stakeholders, especially the local population, councillors, politicians, the Department of Education, City Council, the Church, etc.

It is now urgent that a major effort is made by all the above to retain this site.

Are the people of Glanmire going to regret not shouting STOP?!

White's Cross GAA held its Annual General Meeting on Monday 14th of November. It is all change at the toptable as the three principle officers (Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer) have vacated their role. Katie Flynn served as treasurer for four years. Transparency is key in this role and for each monthly meeting for each of the four years, the club committee has been furnished with up-to-date, accurate accounts. Given the nature of the development the club has undertaken in the last few years and the associated fund-raising, loan applications, account set-ups and grant draw-down, the role of the treasurer within the club has never been more demanding. She, too, has been instrumental in the development projects whilst also concerning herself most with the dayto-day secretary duties that are most demanding. There have been a number of offthe-field events that landed on her desk, so-to-speak, that put additional requirements on her during her time. Thankfully, the departure is not a sudden one and all three will remain in the club and part of the committee. The new officers that come in (to be finalised in coming weeks) do so knowing that there will be plenty of support from those that are outgoing.

Finbarr Kiely RIP

White's Cross GAA are saddened at the passing of Finbarr Kiely. Finbarr served as a coach in White's Cross for over a quarter of a century, as well as being our school coach in Scoil Naomh Michéal, Upper Glanmire National School for over a decade. Finbarr was one of the most sought after and respected Cork GAA coaches.His coaching career took him to three clubs: Delaneys, White's Cross and Mayfield. He also coached in three local schools including Scoil Naomh Michéal, Upper Glanmire National School, where he was based for over a decade, and guided school teams there to three Sciath na Scol titles. Finbarr accumulated a whopping 58 titles at adult level as player
