

"NÍL AON GLEANNTÁN MAR DO GLEANNTÁN FÉIN" GLOUNTHAUNE NEWS BY "THE FOREIGN CORRESPONDENT"

THE TIDY TOWNS COMPETITION

The primary focus of the competition is to encourage communities to improve their local environment and make their area a better place to live, work and visit.
The Dept. of the Environment,
Community and Local Government
supported by SuperValue, sponsors for the past thirty one years, organises the competition and emphasises the importance of participating rather than winning as the very act of taking part brings benefit to the community. A disappointing aspect at local level is the fact that once again Little Island was a non-entry. participated in the years 2013 and 2014 and secured an impressive fifty six and fifty one per cent marking. Little Island is a large area but surely the plus one thousand businesses located there could give a helping hand to the local community. The Little Island Business Association motto is Promoting People, Promoting Business, and Promoting Little Business, and Promoting Little Island; "Tidy Towns" involvement would be an appropriate way of promoting the latter. The Tidy Towns adjudication is based on eight criteria with a total of five hundred and fifty marks on offer and there are eight population categories. Glounthaune was entered in Category "B" which relates to a population range of plus two hundred to one thousand. The adjudicators referenced this and pointed out that the 2016 Census reveals the population of Glounthaune to be one thousand, four hundred and forty persons: "a figure that is likely to have risen further over the past six years. Therefore your area is now considered to be a Category "C" small town – one thousand and one to two thousand five hundred". It is interesting to note that Shandon was the only Cork South Category "C" entrant in the 2022 competition and was awarded two hundred and seventy one marks, seventy three fewer than three fewer Glounthaune. Actually there was a somewhat similar occurrence in the winning "three-in-a-row" years; having won the 1967 Southern Regional Award in Category "A", a population of less than two hundred, the then Bord Failte placed Glounthaune in Category "B" for subsequent years with its "B" for subsequent years with its spokesperson Mr. Greavy advising at the time that the population according to the 1961 Census was two hundred and forty nine. There was an abundance of much publicised controversy at the time but the decision stood and this lead to the resignation of two local members, the late Peter "Sonny" O Sullivan and the late Eddie Murphy but they rejoined later that year when the competition results were announced and Glounthaune had secured back to back awards, and in fact went on to win "three-in-a-

row" in 1969! The total number of entrants in the 2022 competition was eight hundred and twenty two and Glounthaune, adjudicated on June 15th, secured three hundred and forty four marks. This is a whopping thirteen marks greater than 2021 which, similarly in 2020 was restricted to remote judging due to Covid and was based on submissions attached to the participant's entry forms. Such an increase in marks is put in perspective by the fact that one single mark is so precious; it was that thin margin that separated the 2022 overall winner Trim, on three hundred and sixty six marks, from Clonakilty and Rosscarbery was one further mark behind. The "Sustainability – Doing more with Less" criterion was once again problematic for Glounthaune; a marking awarded was therefore it is an obvious category to target going forward as there The top mark secured, as in previous years, is that relating to "Nature & Biodiversity in your Locality"; a marking of 78%. Eight hundred and eighty two centres entered the 2022 competition and Country along with Cong Co Glounthaune along with Cong, Co. Mayo was placed in one hundred and thirtieth position, twenty two marks less than the overall winner. Ninety nine centres from Cork participated and Glounthaune with twenty one marks fewer than winners' Clonakilty was in twenty third position. There were three hundred and thirty nine entrants nationwide in Category "B" and Glounthaune was thirty fourth.
Cork had forty four centres in
Category "B" and Glounthaune was
placed tenth, twenty marks less
than top entrant Rosscarbery. Cork
is subdivided into three regions is subdivided into three regions and Glounthaune, one of nine Cork South entrants in Category "B' was third to Kilbrittain obtaining nine marks fewer. The following is a synopsis of the adjudicators report relative to Glounthaune.

Community - Planning & Planning Community 49/80: Involvement adjudicators were pleased to note that the hard-working committee of eight is assisted by up to twenty volunteers and commented that:
"it is clear from your entry form
that you are a very active group
with frequent area cleanups and beach cleans taking place along with a host of community activities". The adjudicators were impressed by links established with other community groups, commenting that they would like to hear of the collaborations that take place on tidy towns projects. The good working relationship Cork County Council and connections with the schools were acknowledged, as was the strong support from local businesses. Streetscape & Public Places 45/80: The report commenced on a misleading note: "We would like to congratulate the committee and

volunteers on their excellent work in delivering the new bicycle path which was launched in October last". Shhh! Other related aspects of the Walk/Cycleway were also referenced and the adjudicators: "look forward to seeing these projects completed next year". The adjudicators remarked that the présentation standard commercial premises was exceptionally high, with the Elm Tree standing out: "The Post Office, Church Centre, Flower Shop and Community Hall also deserve praise for their well-kept appearance. We acknowledge that improvements have taken place to Fitzpatrick's Shop and the Rising Tide Bar and both buildings looked very well during our visit". **Green Spaces & Landscaping 46/80**: The adjudicators referenced the Walk/ Cycleway related improvements: "the new triangular landscaped area adjacent to the cycleway near the Elm Tree looked exceptionally well with its abundant pollinator friendly planting that included white daisies and lavender". The (naturally grown) wildflowers and new trees that line the road margin were also appreciated. heritage railway garden, the centenary garden, the village garden and that at the entrance to the Highlands received favourable comment as did: "the attractive and colourful landscaping around the perimeter of the village green where the colourful lobelias, white daisies and lupins were eye-catching". The adjudicators applauded the 4km of beech hedging alongside the Walk/ Cycleway and urged the committee tó identify further locations where natural boundaries would be more suitable than solid walls or fencing. Nature & Biodiversity 43/55: The adjudicators were pleased with the development and extension of the wildflower meadow at Johnstown and also the addition of pollinator friendly bulbs. The monitoring of the Ashbourne Pond water quality and establishing the reason for its deterioration, as well as successfully dealing with it, was acknowledged. The adjudicators classified banning the use of chemical herbicides / weed killers as a positive step and suggested that the committee should urge householders in the locality to do likewise. The adjudicators asked if locating Barn Owl boxes at Harper's Island was a success and they noted that a second bird hide was built. The committee's "no mow" policy to encourage mow" policy to encourage pollinators and wildflower planting acknowledged, and adjudicators pointed out that this should only be done in areas where there is either no or degraded vegetation as existing vegetation that is thriving should not be displaced. Sustainability – Doing more with Less 23/55: The Walk/ Cycleway is again referenced and the adjudicators suggest that its

usage should be monitored over time in order to establish if it is leading to behaviour change transport users. r harvesting at among rainwater Community Centre was praised and the adjudicators was desired if it could also be developed in other areas of Glounthaune with the suggestion that perhaps it could be a schools project. The reuse of stone and wood was commended the adjudicators and particularly interested to hear about sawdust being used as a weed preventing mulch and that further details of this would be appreciated. The adjudicators would also like the committee to submit details in 2023 of the activities undertaken to raise awareness of the need to reduce waste and conserve Tidiness & Litter 64/90:The adjudicators remarked that the standard of litter control was exceptionally high and aside from pieces of litter adjacent to a picnic table on Ashbourne Walkway, no <u>li</u>tter could be seen Ashbourne anywhere. The strategy to eliminate dog fouling was noted and: "it appears your approach is working as no problems could be identified". They were pleased to see that all areas in Glounthaune appeared to be weed-free and neatly swept, and that signage and sign poles were carefully maintained. There were some minor issues raised but: "the overall standard of tidiness was particularly high". Residential Streets & Housing Areas 38/55: The adjudicators admired: "the lovely mix of housing areas within Glounthaune from the period terraced dwellings in the centre of the village to well-kept modern suburban properties" remarked that work relative to preserving the character of the older houses in the village could clearly be seen: "as the centre of the village and the green looked particularly well with its neatly cut grass and well maintained planting schemes". The adjudicators wondered, and would like advice in 2023, if maintenance of other residential areas is undertaken by residents. Approach ReStreets & Lanes 36/55: Roads, adjudicators reported that: "the máin approach roads Glounthaune looked marvelous on adjudication day". The Elm Tree and surrounds received special mention, and the repurposed phone boxes were greatly admired, as were the citing of townland markers. Concluding Remarks: The committee and volunteers were congratulated on an excellent performance and the adjudicators were most impressed with the range, quality and high standards of the projects presented.

BOWLES MAUVE, A WINTER WINNER

The longest and severest of winters eventually come to an end. Spring arrives, (reluctantly most years) but it holds the promise of increased temperatures, coupled to glorious new light, and joyous hope. Signs are slow to manifest themselves, but be assured they're on the way. Occasional 'pet' days will dawn to lift our spirits with a medley of colour and perfume, released from early shrubs and emerging perennials. These are more vital than ever, for in these pinched, penurydepressing, stricken days, many believe that spring has nothing to offer, and that it's certainly not 'just around the corner'.

For those without a home, without enough finance to live what we here in Cork call a 'normal' life, the cold is enduring, life remains stagnant, and no birds sing in the gardens of their mind. However, a whiff of an evocative flower fragrance, can often raise their spirits and bring about hope for better times ahead. No wonder aromatherapy has gained such favour in today's busy world!

In reality we cannot have every fragrant plant growing in our gardens, but there are a few hardy kinds worth sourcing. One in particular which I wish to promote today is the old-fashioned biennial wallflower and its longer lasting Biennial wallflowers relations. were (and still are) raised from seed and sold under the name Erysimum. The best variety, the most floriferous and longest lived. is that sold as Erysimum 'Bowles Mauve' named after E.A. Bowles owner of Myddleton House near Enfield in the UK.



Bowles mauve in the autumn garden makes a refreshing sight but should be replaced with new specimens after about five years

This grey-leafed bushy wallflower, packed with violet flower spikes (see illustration) loves to live its entire life of four to five years in light, sun-drenched soil which drains easily in winter. During all of this time it will produce a non-stop succession of flowering spikes (which do not set seed) so if you have room for only one plant this is the one to choose. Noted for its nine month flowering, my own plant of evergreen 'Bowles Mauve' has been in full bud and partial bloom since early December, despite the wind, wet, and cold. As I write (it's still freezing cold) the promise of 'best is yet to come' is very evident.

Left to its own devices, this garden-worthy wallflower would in time become woody and leggy but the way to extend its lifespan and keep it short-joined and bushy is to cut it back hard towards midsummer. By August, it will have recovered and go on to flowering size before autumn grows old. An established plant will measure as much as thirty inches across with a similar height. Cheap as plants go, this variety is normally easily sourced and most garden outlets will have stock on the benches. Add sharp grit to heavy soil before planting and choose as sunny a spot as possible. Totally hardy, this plant is reliable, and easy to manage. Try a plant in a pot on the balcony or terrace and be delighted all year.

et do you fall? THE JANUARY GARDEN

Shrubby dogwoods, grown for their colourful winter twigs, can be cut now and used as material for propagation. Begin now. It's so easy and it costs absolutely nothing. The material should be cut below a leaf joint, and then inserted into the soil where it can be left undisturbed until autumn. Alternatively, you can pull suckers from the base of an established plant and either pot them up or simply plant out. I am not asking readers to go out and remove pieces of cornus from the side of our major roadways (where they are grown in their millions) but you may be able to beg a bit here or there! There are many around this area and I admire them both up around Fernwood and out beyond Grandons. THE DEVIL'S COÁCH-HORSE.

The glasshouse is more or less out of bounds during the months of December and January but soon, I will be returning to its confines. Wildlife exists there all year round and in among the stacked clay pots and along the mottled wall, pest eating spiders find a perfect winter hide-away. Here too, the nimble black beetle commonly called the devil's coach-horse lives and waits for a re-awakening of slugs and leatherjackets. He has a voracious appetite for both. His work is valuable, so I let him be in his cosy hideaway.

Díoladh na sclábhaithe i margaí Mheiriceá agus ar an mbealach ar ais iompraíodh earraí mar shiúcra agus tobac le haghaidh mhargaí na hEorpa. Bhí uaisle Nantes saibhir de dheasca na trádála seo.

Tháinig athair Ricardo, Matthew Wall, ó Chill Mhocheallóg, Contae Luimnigh. Bhí sé i seirbhís le Henry Fitzjames, duine de mhic mhídhlisteanachá Shéamais 11. Thug fostaíocht Matthew deis do Ricardo aithne a chur ar shaol na n-uaisle. Rinneadh giolla de Ricardo. Bhí sé ag freastal ar Bhandiúc Marie Anne de shliocht na Bourbons. Fuair sé oideachas den scoth agus, de dheasca a chuid seirbhíse, bhí cur amach aige ar uisce faoi thalamh na cúirte.

Ag tús an 18ú Céad, fuair Séarlas 11, Rí na Spáinne bás. Ní raibh aon oidhre díreach aige agus d'ainmnigh sé Philip, Diúc Anjou, garmhac le Louis XIV, mar chomharba air. Níor theastaigh ó chumhachtaí na hEorpa go mbeadh Bourbon de chuid na Fraince mar Rí na Spáinne agus thosaigh Cogadh Chomharbas na Spáinne chun é a stopadh. Ach i ndiaidh na coimhlinte, deimhníodh Pilib mar Rí na Spáinne. Bhí fonn air an tír a neartú agus a dhéanamh nua-aimseartha. Rinne sé leasuithe riaracháin agus míleata. Nuair a cháiligh Ricardo mar oifigeach cabhlaigh, ceapadh é mar bhall de chabhlach na Spáinne. Ach in 1723, ghabh na Briotanaigh é in iarracht na Spáinne chun an tSicil a athghabháil. Nuair a scaoileadh saor é, thuig sé go mbeadh sé níos fearr dó a ghairm a leanúint ar talamh. Mar sin, d'aistrigh sé go dtí Arm na Spáinne. Fuair sé coimisiún mar alférez (dara leifteanant) i Reisimint Hibernia. I Márta 1727, chuaigh Ricardo agus James ar mhisean go dtí an Rúis. 



Citizens Information: KYR: Gift Vouchers



What is a gift voucher?

Gift vouchers are any voucher, coupon or other document (including an electronic document) that can be used instead of money to pay (or pay in part) for goods and services. Gift vouchers come in different forms, such as paper gift certificates, electronic cards or gift cards. They can be issued by a single business or for a group of shops (such as a shopping centre).

When you buy a gift voucher, you enter into a contract with the trader. The voucher is like cash that you hand over in exchange for goods and services.

What are the current rules that apply to Gift vouchers?

The rules for gift vouchers sold after 2 December 2019 are set out in the Consumer Protection (Gift Vouchers) Act 2019.

The rules state:

- · Gift vouchers must have no expiry date or be valid for at least 5 years see 'Expiry dates on gift vouchers' below
- Traders cannot specify that a gift voucher is spent in one transaction
- Traders cannot charge a fee to change the name on a gift voucher (if you have to register a name on the voucher)
- If the balance remaining on a gift voucher is more than €1 after you buy something with it, a trader must reimburse the balance to you. They can give you cash, make an electronic transfer or give you another gift voucher

Are there any exceptions to the rules? The rules do not apply to:

- Vouchers you can only use to buy specified goods and services at a discounted price, from a specified trader on a specified date, or for a specified period of 3 months or less. For example, vouchers from deal websites such as Groupon or Pigsback
- Vouchers issued as part of a customer loyalty or promotion scheme
- Vouchers issued as a refund for goods you returned to a trader
- Vouchers and gift cards sold before 2 December 2019. The expiry period and the terms and conditions that applied at the time of purchase still

apply to these vouchers

The rules do not apply to electronic money gift cards.

What is an electronic money gift

In general, electronic money gift cards (for example, One4all gift cards), are cards that can be used in a number of different shops.

Electronic money gift cards are regulated under the European Communities (Electronic Money) Regulations 2011. The Central Bank is responsible for enforcing these regulations.

Under the Regulations:

- · You must be informed of the conditions for using the e-money card, including any fees before you buy the card
- Fees must be proportionate and in line with the costs actually incurred by the e-money issuer (that is, the business who issues the card to you)

Is there an expiry date on gift vouchers?

There is a 5-year minimum expiry date for all vouchers sold after 2 December 2019. This is set out in the Consumer Protection (Gift Vouchers) Act 2019. Under the rules, gift vouchers must either:

- Have no expiry date, or
- Must be valid for at least 5 years from the date the gift voucher is issued.

You must be given details of the expiry date in a durable format (for example, on paper or by email) at the time you buy the gift voucher.

The legislation does not apply to gift vouchers bought before 2 December 2019.

What are my rights if I still have a voucher bought before 2 December 2019?

You should have been made aware of the expiry date at time of purchase. Some traders print the expiry on the voucher itself, on the packaging, on the website or you can see the policy in the shop. If it is not clear, ask or look for the policy on the website before buying. Expiry dates can vary as the trader decides how long they are valid for.

Some traders may be flexible. If your voucher has expired, contact the trader to see if they will extend it. However, if you bought the gift voucher before 2 December 2019, they have no legal obligation to do this and some may charge a fee.

What are my rights if I lose a gift voucher?

Gift vouchers are like cash, so if you lose them, the company does not have to replace them. If a voucher was made out to you specifically and is not transferable to anyone else, you may be able to get a replacement. This depends on the gift voucher's terms and conditions and the company's policy.

If you lose a gift card, you may be able to get a replacement card but you need to check with the retailer. You could be charged a fee for the replacement card.

What happens if a trader goes out of business? If a trader goes out of business before

you use the voucher, you may have difficulty getting your money back. Usually, the trader will owe money to several people so your claim is just one of many. There are rules for the priority to be given to the various debts owed in the case of the business going into liquidation or receivership. Generally, you will be low in the order

of priority. You will need to make a claim in writing to the appointed administrator or liquidator (if applicable) providing proof of your voucher. However, it is unlikely your voucher will be honoured. If a new owner takes over, they do not have to honour your voucher.

For this reason, you should buy gift vouchers using a credit or debit card, as you may be able to use chargeback through your bank or credit card provider.

The Competition and Consumer Protection Commission (CCPC) has more information on companies going out of business on www.ccpc.ie

Where can I get more help?

If a trader refuses to honour a gift card, first try to settle the dispute directly with the trader.

you bought the gift voucher after 2 December 2019, you should make the company aware of the rules under the Consumer Protection (Gift Vouchers) Act 2019.

If you cannot resolve the dispute, contact your local Citizens Information Service and they will advise you about your options for redress.






