GONE TO POT

In gardening, less can sometimes be more, and many beginners tend to over-plant and over-ornament. It is a mistake to introduce too many ideas, objects, or plants into too small an area. Most properties are small these days and there's a natural tendency to want everything that takes one's eye in other people's gardens. As well, it is all too easy to divide up a garden into too many compartments, making it seem smaller than it actually is. Ease up I suggest over-heavy planting but increase the number of stopping points, and places of interest where one can sit and rest.

An easy way to create interest near garden seats and rest areas (and especially on balconies) is to use pots containing appealing and engaging plants. Herbaceous perennials are often neglected as suitable subjects, yet many lend themselves to simple pot culture. Let me give you a few

examples.

Perennial wallflowers are made-tomeasure container plants. Although they belong to the cabbage family (which make tap roots) in pots and containers their roots spread and divide. These evergreens often flower continuously through winter as well as summer but they're probably at their best right now. Many have dark buds opening to paler flowers that become more colourful as they age. All are wonderfully fragrant. Erysimum Bowles' Mauve is probably the best but 'Plant World Lemon' has flowers fading from pale yellow through bronze to mauve. Others are easily and cheaply sourced at garden centres.



Hosta 'Gold Standard' delights from March to November in its large glazed pot. This variety (and most others) enjoy cool, shade conditions and as such are ideal for apartment balconies and the like. Remember to water often as the large leaves can act as a kind of umbrella

Another good perennial is the Hosta. One plant on its own in a simple hand-thrown or glazed pot makes a spectacular sculpture, moving through a series of different forms from tight, sharp spikes to huge open leaves. Hosta 'Gold Standard' (illustrated) is a classic in our garden. Its elegant green/yellow foliage has a grape-like

bloom from early spring to late autumn and elegant blooms in midsummer. Needless to say slugs would love it any night but to keep these rampaging gastropods away the pot is stood in a šhallow tray of water to make a simple

Heucheras which I have covered in the past but don't forget that all are ideal when cultivated in pots and they have a range of qualities with which to bamboozle us. Apart from the fact that this family of ornamental foliage plants came through the last two winters here at Villa Marie without as much as a damaged leaf, their foliage is endlessly colourful, it has a good texture and the 'foam flower' (its colloquial name) always looks elegant and stylish. Best of all, they extract very modest demands on the compost and the prevailing conditions of sun or shade. Generally, heucheras do best in light shade during the hottest part of the day for full sun would burn and discolour its foliage during very hot spells. Dappled shade therefore suits them admirably. The worst insect pest on these is vine weevil but they're easily controlled with Provado Vine Weevil Killer. My personal heuchera choices include; 'Tiramisu', 'Lime Cordial', 'Marmalade' and Electric Lime' but believe me no variety will be found less than good.

for up to two months in summer. Ideal for clothing sloping banks, steep inclines which cannot be grassed, or hungry dry sites, the plants are best bought in bloom for their colours will then be evident. Be warned however that they resent being transplanted or their colours will be the strong transplanted or pruned. Once you decide on a sunny, well-drained position and planting has

taken place, leave well alone.
CLEMATIS; Here's a bright idea you might like to copy. Next time you visit your local garden centre see if you can source a clematis called 'integrifolia'. This delightful variety from central Europe enjoys full sun and is ideal for a border among other perennials for it only grows to about three feet with a similar spread. It's captivating two inch mid-blue, bell-shaped flowers formed from four petal-like sepals, appear from mid-summer to early autumn. It flowers on the current year's shoots so should be cut down to a pair of buds six inches above ground in very early spring. The leaves are mid-to-dark green and the flowers are followed by silvery brown seed heads. This clematis likes fertile, humus-rich soil which drains easily. Failing this, any of the Raymond Evison clematis (from Guernsey) will certainly delight for they grow and flower at around six feet or less and be ideal for training up through low-growing shrubs. Try one on a metal or willow 'tepee' and you'll have a feature as we'll as enchanting blooms for much of summer and autumn.



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THE JUNE GARDEN

JUNE is surely the most effervescent and ebullient month of the year. Growth is frothing and the sensation of newness abounds in the hedgerows and all through the countryside. In the garden, miracles are now a daily occurrence. Swollen buds on a tree peony opened only recently to reveal resplendent flowers and I had the privilege of not alone holding it in my hand but drinking in its perfume whilst marvelling at its very existence but wondering at its fragility. Yes, miracles are to be found in all gardens this

HERBACEOUS plants (and in particular lilies) should be watched carefully and their stems tied as they develop, otherwise they may be damaged by wind and wet conditions. Link Stakes are still one of the best options for neatness and practical support for floppy plants but bamboo can be used, so too pea sticks, pushed in among lengthening stems and growths. Be on the lookout for bright red lily beetles and pick these off once noticed. An infestation would quickly defoliate an entire stand of lilies. Dot confuse these with Ladybirds/ Lily beetles have no spots, are generally oblong and raise their young in black droppings. their young in black droppings. SWEET_PEA; Beware dryness at the

roots of sweet peas. Never allow them to go short of water and feed them regularly with a liquid fertiliser. I like

to use liquid feeds, especially those based on seaweed, during the period May to late June, thereafter liquid tomato food, as often as needed. Flowering will then be generous and

prolonged.

DAFFODILS; Remove the foliage of clumps have been growing in the same spot for a number of years and are not flowering well, then overcrowding may be the cause and now is the optimum time for tackling the problem. Lift and divide the daffs, replanting immediately the fattest, more substantial bulbs. Keep two inches between these.

Excess stock can be used in new planting positions.

APHIDS; Watch for aphids and greenfly on roses and other ornamentals including lupins. Regular spraying mounts are proving the province of the province o may be necessary to prevent damage and poor flowering. The insects can usually be found feeding on the young shoots especially towards the tip of all soft growths. If you want to remain chemical-free, try using a good squirt of washing-up liquid mixed with a few littes of water applied where needed litres of water applied where needed.

ROCK ROSES; The 'tissue paper' flowers of Cistus (rock roses is their common name but they're not true roses as we know them) are charming, especially those which are white with carmine red centres. They may be as large as three inches across and although they last but for a day at a time, the shrub will produce them in great numbers

Fairíor, ní fios inniu cén áit sa reilig ina bhfuil Dan curtha. Ach comóradh gaiscí Dan i mbailéid a scríobhadh, ní amháin i mBaile Átha Cliath ach ar fud na tíre.

Trí chiliméadar ó Chill Chuillinn i gContae Chill Dara, tá Donnelly's Hollow. Tá leacht aoil ann a dhéanann comóradh ar bhua cáiliúil Dan ar George Cooper. Jerry wished to acknowledge the role of Peter Falvey who first submitted an expression of interest to the Council the results of which were evident for all to see. The Deputy Lord Mayor, Cllr Joe Kavanagh, complimented the Community Association and the people of the area on the wonderful spirit and cooperation that exists and urged everyone to volunteer and continue their support and sponsorship to enhance the various activities in the area. Continuing, the Deputy Lord Mayor, speaking of those assembled that he has been pursuing this service for years and that, three

The Eucharistic Procession set to return to the streets of Cork on June 11th, the first time since 2019



Last night saw the launch of the 97th annual Cork Eucharistic Procession, taking place on June 11th, 2023. This will be the first Procession in the city since 2019, with the previous three being cancelled due to the Covid-19 pandemic and guidelines.

The 2023 Procession will begin at 3pm at the Cathedral of St Mary and St Anne, and, for the first time, will take a new route, crossing Christy Ring Bridge concluding at Ss Peter and Pauls Church for a Homily and Benediction celebrated by Most Reverend Fintan Gavin, Bishop of Cork and Ross.

It was officially launched at the Visitor Centre at the Cathedral of St Mary and St Annes by the Lord Mayor of Cork City, Councillor Deirdre Forde and Bishop Gavin with people from parishes throughout the city and county, priests and religious. representatives youth and scouting groups, choir members and musicians from many parishes.

The Eucharistic Procession has been a milestone in religious and community life since the first one too place in 1926. Before this, each parish held its own Eucharistic Procession, but it was felt that it was needed to unite the people of Cork city in prayer after the divisions of the Civil War. This worked, and the first Procession was attended by 40,000 people who took to the streets to worship as a community of parishes.

This year, as well as taking a slightly different route, people are being encouraged to join at the Cathedral of St Mary and St Anne, and walk the Procession collectively from this point, if they are able.

Speaking last night at the launch for the return of the Eucharistic Procession at the North Cathedral Visitor Centre, Bishop of Cork and Ross, Fintan Gavin said:

"The Eucharistic Procession has been an important milestone on religious and community life for the city, and I am pleased to see it return. This will be the 97th celebration of the Cork Eucharistic Procession as we look forward to its 100th anniversary in 2026. Preparations have been underway for several months and we hope to reach out to as many people, parishes, and faith groups to welcome them to celebrate.

I invite you to join the Procession on Sunday 11th June to walk in faith as people and families from different parishes, age-groups, communities, and countries. Together, we look forward to a memorable and prayerful Procession this year."

The first Procession for all the parishes of Cork City took place in 1926 to help unite the people of Cork City in prayer after the divisions of the Civil War and was attended by 40,000 people.

The 2023 Procession has been revised to gather the Catholic community together as a Diocesan Community of Faith, walking together as one family of parishes.

Citizens Information - Travelling Abroad What to Consider Before You Go



COVID-19 rules

"Some countries still have restrictions in place for travellers". warns John Beausang, Citizens Information Manager for Cork City North. "You should check the public health advice before you travel. Check what documents you need to bring and check if any restrictions are in place. Each country has different entry requirements. Some countries may need proof of vaccination for COVID-19 while others no longer need it. You can use the EU Digital COVID Certificate to show that you are fully vaccinated against COVID-19 if you are travelling to the United States for example. To avoid disappointment, always check the entry requirements of your destination before you travel."

Travelling to China

If you are planning to travel to China, you should consult the Department of Foreign Affairs Travel Advice. Currently, Irish citizens are advised to avoid non-essential travel to China. If you are travelling to China. you should wear a face mask for the full duration of your journey. You should also ensure that you are up-to-date with all your COVID-19 vaccinations before you travel. There are no mRNA vaccines or other non-Chinese vaccines available in China.

Before you travel

Check travel advice and entry requirements for your destination Check the travel advice and entry requirements for the country you are travelling to before you travel abroad. You might need a visa, this depends on your destination. You can find out if you need a visa on the Department of Foreign Affairs website.

Is your passport in date?

Check that your and your families' passports are in date before you book. Passport Online is open to all applicants. You can get information on how to renew your passport or how to apply for your child's first passport there, or by contacting your

local Citizens Information Centre. Do you have travel insurance?

You should get travel insurance for yourself and your family. If you have a travel insurance policy already, or travel insurance is included in your health insurance policy, you should check that you are covered for hospital treatment for COVID-19. You should bring your European Health Insurance Card with you if you are travelling to the EEA or Switzerland.

Healthcare: United Kingdom

You cannot use your EHIC in the UK. But you can still get the healthcare you need. You will need to show your Irish passport to the GP or hospital. Make sure that it is in date, it must be renewed every 4 years and each family member needs their own. An EHIC does not replace travel insurance. Irish people travelling in the UK are entitled to access healthcare through the Common Travel Area.

Healthcare: Australia

Ireland and Australia have a reciprocal health agreement. This means that Irish visitors to Australia will receive emergency services and assistance towards the cost of prescribed drugs and medicines on the same basis as persons ordinarily resident in Australia.

Driving abroad

If you plan to drive while abroad, make sure that your Irish driving licence is valid and that you bring it with you.

Some countries outside the European Economic Area (the member states of the European Union, Norway, Iceland and Liechtenstein) may require you to hold an International Driving Permit (IDP) in addition to your Irish driving licence.

Always make sure you are properly insured for driving while overseas. You can get more information on driving abroad from the Road Safety Authority or by contacting your local

While abroad

John advises "It is worth making a note of the address, telephone number and opening hours of the Irish Embassy or Consulate in the country you are visiting. In countries where there is no Irish diplomatic or consular representation, you may seek emergency assistance from embassies or consulates of other European Union countries. The Department of Foreign Affairs website provides advice on what to do to stay safe while abroad and what to do in an emergency."

Travel tips

Before you travel abroad, these are some other tips to help with your

- Check if you need any vaccines or immunisations before you travel (At least 8 weeks in advance)
- · Make a note of the 24-hour emergency number of your bank so you can cancel your credit card or debit card if it is stolen.
- Check your mobile data allowance with your mobile phone service provider. (For travel outside of the EEA).
- Do you need to bring a special adapter to plug in your electrical devices?

It was one of the very first games in the competition in fact. The East Cork board was not officially formed until 1926 but a league begun in 1923 after what had been a tumultuous time politically for the country as a whole. For the record despite being level at half-time Upper Glanmire lost that game to Little Island on a score of 2-02 to 1-01.


