
Sonatina Choir Fundraising Concert raise €3000

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





















Glanmire Community First RespondersReady to support



Our Lady of Lourdes Grotto in Glanmire - A Brief History

Seventy-five years ago, on 1 May 1949, the Our Lady of Lourdes Grotto at Glanmire was first blessed and opened in the presence of over 3,000 people. This marked the beginning of a long tradition, with the first Sunday in May set aside for friends and families to gather at Springhill before setting off on the journey to Glanmire village. On that Sunday in 1949, my relatives gathered at Saint Joseph's; my aunts, Noreen and Mary, were among the excited crowd ready to set off for the journey to the grotto. In 2024, Noreen continued the family tradition by attending the procession and was among the crowd gathered at the grotto, which you can view at www.youtube.com/watch?v=j5gURltKr6U. Indeed, Noreen tells me that, apart from one year, she has been making the annual pilgrimage since.

In 1948, Toby Roche of Woodlands, Glanmire, proposed to Canon John Gould that a grotto be built in Glanmire, inspired by the shrine in Lourdes. The chosen site, located just a few metres south of Glanmire village, was donated by the Brothers of Charity, Lota. Construction began shortly after, and on 1 May 1949, the grotto, 'ideally placed in a picturesque and rugged setting carved into the rock hillside facing the Glashaboy River' was ready for Glanmire's first procession. The crowds marvelled at the magnificent statue of Our Lady, which was in a niche 30 feet above and looked down on a natural spring, as well as the statue of Saint Bernadette. The construction project was primarily undertaken by Denis O'Riordan, a builder and producer of ornamental cast concrete from Commons Road, Cork. Angelo Bernardi, Paul Street, Cork, produced the statue of Our Lady (based on the sculpture in Lourdes) while Jimmy Twomey, Glanmire, was responsible for the electrical works.

In 1951, Denis Gwynn described the grotto as a lavishly planted rock garden, rising high above the road and sprawling across

the surrounding rocks and cliffs. Gwynn remarked that he had seldom seen such a charming rock garden and noted that the recent week of sunshine had brought many of the plants and shrubs into full bloom. He also observed that the waterfall flowed constantly, occasionally cascading with great force. In 1957 Diarmuid O'Riordan, writing in the Southern Star, noted that the grotto in Glanmire was 'the finest in Ireland. It is cut out of solid rock and no words of mine can describe it here, but I will just say it is magnificent'. Indeed, the shrine in Ballinspittle is modelled on Glanmire. This grotto was constructed during the Marian Year, 1954, and the statues of Mary and Bernadette were moulded at Beranardis by Maurice O'Donnell. Of course, it was the statue of Mary that attracted worldwide attention in 1985 when some locals claimed to have witnessed a statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary moving spontaneously. As news of the phenomenon spread, thousands of pilgrims and spectators flocked to the site of the statue. Many of the visitors claimed that they observed similar movements.

While no moving statues have been reported in Glanmire, the grotto is an important part of the area's culture and antiquity. According to W. B. Yeats, 'the history of a nation is not in parliaments and battlefields, but in what the people say to each other on fair-days and high days, and in how they farm, and quarrel, and go on pilgrimage', and annual trips to Our Lady of Lourdes Grotto at Glanmire are remembered by many generations and will continue to endure in the future.

Gardening - July

Welcome to the July instalment of the Garden.

This month I would like to focus on water conservation.

Water conservation does not have to be a big project. It can be as simple as mulching your plants (which we have covered in a previous edition) or as extensive as having a complete rainwater harvesting system.

For me I am somewhere in the middle. I mulch my plants in Spring. I also have an old water storage tank that came out of the attic. All I did was put the downpipe from the house into the tank and wait for rain to fill it (which did not take long).

The best thing about this type of tank is that you can fill a watering can very quickly from it, but the major disadvantage is that it can be unsafe if you have small children around. You can buy a lid for these tanks as well.

One of the safest ways of collecting rainwater is to buy a water butt. These are available from most D.I.Y. shops and come with a complete set of instructions. They also come in various shapes so you should be able to find one the suits your needs. You can also join the water butts together and collect large amounts of rainwater.

You can attach a water butt to any down pipe house, garage, shed, school, office building etc. The options are endless.





The best way to see how much water you save is to keep a record of how much water you use from the water butts. You will be amazed as to how much water you can save.

However, there is some maintenance with them. They have to be cleaned out and washed twice a year. Spring and Autumn. This will prevent the water from going pungent. So far, I have not mentioned the collection of grey water. This is water that has been used to wash either dishes or yourself.

You can use this water by putting it straight onto shrubs or herbaceous plants that are well established (more than a year old) but not onto the leaves as this may lead to scorching.

I would not use this type of water on any food crops or any bedding plants or annuals.

If you want to store grey water in a water butt, I would do so away from the house as it can be a little pungent.

The water that you use when washing fruit and vegetables is ideal to use in any part of the garden or onto your pots.

The other top tip I have is to put away the hose pipe and use a watering can. You will save a lot more water.

On particularly hot days move your pots into the shade (if possible)





Jobs for July

- 1. Pick over salad crops regularly.
- 2. Keep an eye out for pests like greenfly and take appropriate action.
- 3. Water and feed all containers.
- 4. Trim the edges of your beds to give the garden a sharp look.
- 5. Stay on top of the weeds with regular hoeing.
- 6. Water compost bins and heaps to prevent drying out.
- 7. Enjoy your garden.

Copper Valley Vue


- Work is continuing in preparation for the installation of the new bridge at Copper Valley Vue and culvert at Brooklodge.

Playing Matters

There were a number of big games for the Junior A football team in the last month. A draw with Douglas and a big win over Delaneys saw White's Cross qualify for the City Division Junior A league final for the first time since we beat Passage on a 0-12 to 0-11 in the 2015 decider. This progress to the final is a big step for the evolution of this team. Over the last 5 or 6 years we have seen a number of new players join our Junior panels which was much needed to support an aging squad that had brought so much success to the club. The re-formation of the St Colmcilles club 4 years ago has enhanced the feeder route from underage to adult level. We had some success when winning a Junior B league title in 2021 but this is the first time that we have become really consistent at Junior A level; in this decade at least.

The performances have been consistent throughout the campaign and many players were given game time. This gave confidence that we could beat Nemo Rangers in the final despite knowing that Nemo football teams are not easily beat in any final. On the day we started well but we quickly found ourselves five points behind by the 20 minute mark. In this period we failed, for the most part, to win our own kickouts and were turned-over on a number of occasions. Our opponents punished our mistakes as we would expect them to. From here to the remainder of the game we would force ourselves back into contention only for Nemo to extend the lead out again when they needed to. Two black cards within minutes of each other in the second half did not help our cause. At the end we lost by six points. We have no complaints about the result and we congratulate Nemo. However, there is still a strong belief that our squad is developing nicely. We are actually drawn to play against Nemo Rangers in the opening round of the championship. Despite the defeat in this final we can look forward to the rematch with confidence.

Our second Junior football team are also making big progress. Last year we were beaten narrowly by Ballyphehane and Nemo Rangers in the league. This year, however, we have come out on the right side of the result after two similarly tough games. We also received a walkover from Whitechurch. In game four we faced another local rival in the form of Rathpeacon. This was the proverbial game of two-halves . At halftime, we were well in command and lead 3-09 to 0-02. In the second half the home side came back into the game and reduced the lead to eight points. Had they been more efficient in front of the post, they could have made things more uncomfortable for White's Cross. We introduced a number of the current minor side at half-time. Ronan Healy, Shane and James Buckley (no relation) all made a big impression on proceedings with the former getting our first score of the second half after 25 minutes. He would add another as we finished strongly to win on a 3-13 to 1 – 07 scoreline.

In our fifth game against Ballinure, the minor players would again play a prominent part with Shane and Ronan both adding a brace of goals each. Adam Dunne and Brendan Quain also scored goals in this game as we recorded 6 goals in total. Scoring 6 goals in a competitive adult game is something of a rarity for White's Cross. Though not all of our results are fully listed or recorded, a cursory glance at the records shows that a hurling league game from May 1963 against Sarsfields may be the only other such occurrence.

Though we scored 6 goals, we still only matched to collect two league points. At the time of writing there was one further game at the end of June against Rochestown. A win here would be enough to see the team reach the final of the Division 4 league. This too would be a massive boost for the club.

Most of the older age groups have had a month off from competitive action with Leaving and Junior Cert taking precedence for the players. These competitions recommenced in late June.

This under 15 hurling victory is the most obvious dividend to date of the effort that has been put in by all.

Writer's Corner with Eleanor O'Kelly-Lynch

'A reader lives 1000 lives before he dies; the man who never reads lives only one.'

George R. R. Martin, A Dance with Dragons.

A primary school teacher recently told me about her challenging fifth class: a lot of boys and noise. She said it was hard to motivate them, keep them focused, calm, enthused. The children were from varied backgrounds with various levels of ability with many coming to school hungry or living in some sort of chaos. This was a teacher with 14 years' experience under her belt, no shrinking violet. 'It's not easy,' she said. 'you'd be worn out and it's not one-size-fits-all. You just have to try everything.' But one thing she said intrigued me, when I asked her what strategies seemed to work best.

'Stories,' she replied. 'When I read a story, calm descends on the classroom – some days, you can hardly hear a pin drop.' The class follows the story from their own books, stepping into another world where they might encounter danger, twists, curious characters. Maybe a secret or a journey unfolds and someone – the baddie – might get their comeuppance. How wonderful to hear about the power of a good story to transfix a bunch of rowdy eleven-year-olds! Despite all the screens, the gaming, and the empty virtual distractions, it's heartening to see children captivated by a story.


A few weeks ago, I had the pleasure of speaking at Fermoy and Kinsale libraries. Hats off to Cork County Council library services. When I was a



child, our public library was a musty old space ruled by a cross old librarian with false teeth who clacked angrily at anyone who dared to speak – even a whisper was forbidden as she pointed to the large sign saying, 'SILENCE' behind her desk.

Today, libraries are such inviting places with colourful and comfortable children's areas, book clubs, writing groups, talks, school visits and customer-friendly access to stories that beckon to us – waiting to transport us into a thousand other lives.

And here's the thing: being a writer depends on being a reader. I never came across a writer who didn't say that reading was where it all started. Zadie Smith says, 'Learning to be a good reader is what makes you as a writer.' And Somerset Maugham




If you are a writer or would like to write, the advice is always to keep – or start – reading. Reading gives you inspiration, expands your concentration and your levels of empathy. Reading helps you to subconsciously absorb grammar, spelling, sentence structure, musicality, and rhythm. Reading also helps to reduce stress, which in itself is a good reason to read more.


Traditionally, Ireland was known as the land of storytellers with a rich folklore tradition. Seannachai travelled from community to community recounting incredible stories, legends, poems, and memories. The oral tradition worked because stories read aloud packed a punch and had a heightened emotional effect on the listener. Many of those fifth-class students I mentioned above may not have been quite as absorbed in the story had they been reading it silently to themselves. One of the best gifts we can give our children and grandchildren is the love of story. We can nurture this by using opportunities wherever we can to read or tell them a story - and no, it needn't be just at bedtime.

Children love a story in a car on a long journey, ideally one you make up as you go along. If it's a long walk home and your child is complaining, tell them a story. If you're stuck in a long queue with an impatient six-year-old, sometimes a story helps to pass the time. And remember, all these stories will only add inspiration and creativity to your own writing when you do eventually get a precious moment to sit down yourself and draft your own story.





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


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
