Headlining the festival this year are **Cardinals**, local rising stars who played support to Kings of Leon in Dublin last month and will also be playing Electric Picnic later this summer.

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

Beatrice Gubbins, Dunkettle

In 1946, Beatrice Edith Gubbins was described as 'one of Cork's most outstanding water-colour painters'; today, her skill and talent can be seen on the walls of the Crawford Art Gallery.

Early Life

Beatrice was born on 19 September 1878 at Dunkettle, Cork, the youngest child of Thomas Wise Gubbins and Frances née Russell. Thomas Wise Gubbins was born and lived in Limerick but moved to Cork when he inherited Wise's Distillery on the North Mall. Naturally. for a man of his stature, an appropriate home was desirable and in the 1860s he purchased Dunkettle House in Glanmire (in 1869 his butler, Edward Clarke had been arrested for stealing about a dozen suits of clothes belonging to Gubbins!) Thomas and his wife, Frances raised their seven children, two boys and five girls in the Palladian-style mansion and the family can be found (excluding Beatrice and older brother, Colonel Russell Gubbins) living in Glanmire in 1901.

It is highly probable that on the night of 31 March 1901, Beatrice was on one of her jaunts on the continent: her favourite time to travel was in Spring. In 1899, she visited Venice and the Italian lakes; the following years saw her in France and in 1902 she visited Barbizon, the French village famed for its beautiful countryside, inspiration to many artists including Théodore Rousseau, Charles Jacques, Jean François Millet, and Diaz de la Peña.

Two years after her trip to Barbizon, Beatrice's father died after a 15-year battle with illness, the official cause of death classified as chronic interstitial nephritis. After the death of Thomas Wise Gubbins, his wife and daughters, Maud, Kathleen and Beatrice ran the house at Dunkettle. The eldest Gubbins daughter, Marian, left to take up farming at the nearby Hermitage and Gertrude had married (her husband dying in 1900). Mary Maud oversaw the household at Dunkettle, while Kathleen ran the farm and produced some of the best dairy butter in the country, frequently winning awards.

Beatrice, the artist and later life

Beatrice's artistic talents were evident from an early age and her prowess was frequently acknowledged in the Gentlewoman, a richly illustrated English weekly newspaper for women. In the 5 November 1898 edition, she was awarded the graduate's price for 'A group of poultry in water colour'. Later, Beatrice displayed her work with the Royal Hibernian Academy, Belfast Art Society and Watercolour Society of Ireland. Between 1910 and 1911, she had five paintings displayed with the Academy, including The Kerry Coast, Misty Morning and Untrodden Ways. She was also the honorary secretary of Queenstown (Cobh) The National Gallery of Sketching Club. Ireland notes a typical feature throughout her watercolour. Flowers in vases with a Chinese Figure 'is a delicate poise and simplicity in the composition ...used to create a quiet, peaceful air.' Interestingly, the girls in the Gubbins family suffered from congenital deafness, which may have contributed to Beatrice's painting style. In 1911, Beatrice can be found on the English census, staying at Deal House, Campden, Warwickshire with her cousin, Katherine Frances Gubbins. She received treatment a year or two later in London which seems to have improved her hearing.

With the outbreak of World War 1. Beatrice contributed to the war effort by training as a nurse. She first worked at the Cork Steamship Company's voluntary hospital at Craiglea, Tivoli in Cork. She and her colleagues tended to wounded soldiers who had been transported back from the killing fields of Europe and beyond. In her diary, she notes that on 12 November 1915, the medical team were preparing for a serious operation on a soldier's head, "but at 5.30 when he had been anaesthetized, the bit of shell came out with a forceps!! It was outside the skull the whole time-everybody laughed!!" A year later, Beatrice moved to England and worked at a hospital in Exeter until the end of the war.

Upon her return to Ireland in 1919, she faced renewed conflict as the Irish War of Independence raged, particularly in 'Rebel Cork'. This did not seem to hamper her travels as between 1920 and 1924, she travelled to Italy. Corsica and Sicily. However, when her mother's health declined. Beatrice returned to Dunkettle to care for her. Frances Gertrude Gubbins died at Dunkettle House on 21 December 1924, aged 92. Five years later, Beatrice resumed her travels, visiting Morocco in 1929, the West Indies in 1930, Algeria and Tunis in 1931 and Portugal in 1934, evidently this trip being her last. Beatrice returned to Cork spending the next years at Dunkettle. Her beloved oldest sister, Marian, died at the Hermitage on 9 February 1939 and Beatrice herself died on 12 August 1944 at Dunkettle, she was just 65 years and was buried in Saint Lappan's, Little Island, Cork.

Beatrice left a rich legacy with a large collection of beautiful water colours depicting scenes from Glanmire and those inspired by her trips abroad. In 1946, two years after her death, the Cork Examiner announced that art lovers who were to visit the spring fair at the Imperial Hotel, Cork to raise funds for the Victoria Hospital, would be afforded a rare opportunity to purchase a work by one of Cork's most outstanding water-colour painters.

The article also reminded readers that the Crawford Art Gallery had the foresight to acquire her work for their collection some years earlier and her work is still displayed on the walls of the gallery, ensuring her legacy endures for future generations. So, the next time you are in Emmet Place, pop in and as you climb the main staircase, have a glance at Beatrice's work, Continental Street Scene.

Gardening - September

September is a month for taking stock as well as planning what to grow for next year. I find that walking around the garden with a note book, and jotting down which plants have done well, and the plants that have not done so well.

September is also the best month for planning forward (all gardeners are optimists). The flower bulbs should be in the garden centres now, and the earlier you buy them then better the quality and selection you will have to choose from.

Bulbs are the easiest plants to grow and also the least fussy. One of my favourites are Daffodils (Narcissus). There are la lot of different varieties to choose from. as well as a wide range of colours, shapes and heights. You can have Daffodils flowering from January right through to April if you pick the right varieties.



You can grow them in most soil types as long as it is not waterlogged and of course in containers.

Tulips are also a great value bulb to grow, and they generally flower after the Daffodils so you could have a continuation of flowering all the way through Spring.



The best scented Spring bulbs are Hyacinths. It is best to grow them in containers near a door or window so the scent will waft it on nice Spring days.



All the bare rooted fruit trees and hedging will be coming into stock over the next few months. Now is the best time to choose what you would like to grow. The earlier you order your plants the greater selection you will have.

September is also harvest month for Apples. It is also a month that wasps are most active and cause the most harm on our fruit.

To help prevent wasp damage remove any damaged or fallen fruit from the tree. Check daily for any ripe fruit.

The best time to pick your fruit is early morning as the wasps are most active in the warmest part of the day.

In the vegetable garden, most of the summer crops should be ready for harvesting and or storing. Lift onions and dry them before storing. The easiest way to store onions is to put them in a net bag, and hang it up somewhere airy and dry as well as frost free.

Potatoes should also be dug up, and most of the soil removed before storing them in brown paper bags (or anywhere dark) for the winter. All damaged or diseased potatoes should be removed before you store them. Potatoes should not be stored in

plastic bags as this can encourage moisture in the bag and lead to problems with mould.

You can still sow seeds in the vegetable garden at this time of year.

Crops like lettuce, the cut and come again varieties, where you only pick the leaves as they grow. Radishes are also a good crop to grow as well as corn salad. (Lambs lettuce)

For the gardener who likes a bit of spicy food, you can grow a selection of mustards.

Now is also the time to sow Garlic. Buy your garlic bulbs from a garden centre as these will be free from any pests and diseases and give you the best chance to get the best crop.



It is best not to grow Garlic where you have grown Onions previously as it is the same family group.

Jobs for September.

- 1. Keep lawns trimmed and add a feed of Iron as this will help to control moss.
- 2. Harvest crops as they are ready.
- 3. Reduce the amount of feeding for containers.
- 4. Plant bulbs as they become available.
- 5. Prepare a compost bin ready for fallen leaves.
- 6. Mulch shrubs for the winter.
- 7. Build an insect habitat in the garden to help them through the winter.
- 8. Enjoy the Autumn sunshine...







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Writer's Corner with Eleanor O'Kelly-Lynch

I always think September is a time for starting over. Okay, it's not the start of a brand-new year - when we make all our 'new year, new us' resolutions but it's a great time for a re-set. There's still seventeen weeks of 2024 and we can get a lot of stuff done in that time to make 2024 a memorable year. The kind of stuff that can make our hearts sing. The kind of stuff that helps us grow and discover new things about ourselves.

In September, the kids are back at school, holidays are mostly over, summer clothes are packed away and we begin to look forward - to autumn colours, curling up by the fire, new beginnings, new possibilities. There's a bit more routine in the house maybe, so you might find September a good time to cultivate something new for yourself. After all, while outwardly, we live busy, even frenetic lives, it's the journeys we take inside our heads that matter most, the ones that dictate how we see the world, others and of course, ourselves. The life within. The life we live often unbeknownst to others.

So, this September, you might consider journalling as a way to unlock your own creative wells and rediscover your creative self. And I say re-discover because as small children we were all naturally and unselfconsciously creative. A study of four-to five-year-olds found that 98% scored on the 'creative genius' range on a NASA creativity test while ten years on, only 12% of these now 14-15-year-olds maintained that score. Something smothers the creative flame, but we can always rekindle it. Creativity is a muscle - the more we use it, the stronger it gets.

You might have heard of Julia Cameron's book, The Artist's Way,' about discovering and recovering your creative self? Maybe you'd love to play the piano, paint, write a memoir, take an acting or cookery class. Maybe there's something you always wanted to do – travel, study, start a business, learn a new skill, write a novel or a play – this is all the work of our creative minds as we have to use our imagination to dream up these dreams and our creative powers to unlock those possibilities.




In the book Cameron advocates that the first thing we should do every morning is to write three pages in longhand – something she calls, The Morning Pages. It takes about 5 minutes to complete.

Here is what she says: In order to retrieve your creativity, you need to find it. I ask you to do this by an apparently pointless process. There is no wrong way to do the pages. These daily morning meanderings are not meant to be art. Or even writing. I stress that point to reassure the non-writers working with this book. Writing is simply one of the tools. Pages are meant to be, simply, moving the hand across the page and writing down whatever comes to mind. Nothing is too petty, too silly, too stupid, or too weird to be included.

All you will need is to have a pen and notebook at the ready and every morning, ideally first thing, you will write three pages without stopping to lift your pen. You can write about anything that's spilling around in your head, the mundane everyday chores and stresses, emotions, worries, frustrations, and feelings - just let it all tumble out. The only rule is keep writing for three pages or five minutes and do not read over, change, edit, judge it, or think about it. If you can't think of anything to write about, just write about how can't think of anything to write about now and continue about why you're finding it hard till something pops into your head again. Just keep writing. When you're done simply close your notebook and carry on with your day.

After three or four weeks, take some time to go through your pages and note anything that seems significant, any recurring themes, issues that keep arises and note what you might do about these.

The insights we get from these pages, Cameron says, help us to excavate buried dreams and bring about a self-awareness. She says that it is impossible to write your morning pages for any extended period of time without coming into contact with an unexpected inner power – a connection with a source of wisdom within. Something she calls – and I love this – 'a spiritual electricity.'



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Crossword Puzzle





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
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
