






Gardening - November

As I am writing this article and looking out the window at the rain, my eye is drawn to the trees around the garden. Trees are often under rated as to the impact, and structure they add to any garden.

Some trees have beautiful autumn colour like the Japanese Maple which come in many sizes and shapes. You can have them in pots, or as a large tree depending on the size of your garden. However they do require some shelter from harsh winds.



Other trees are grown for their shape, like evergreen conical Conifers, which if planted around the garden can give a regal feel to the surrounding area.

Some other trees offer a more tactile appeal like Birch trees. Other varieties of Birch trees have very flaky bark, which almost invites you to peel it off. Which I did when I was younger (and still do). Another Birch tree which has nice bark, is the Siberian Birch. This has a white bark which really stands out in the winter time.



Birch trees are best planted in groups of at least three or more, depending on the space you have available. They should not be planted too close to the house, as they could cause a lot of shading and the leaves could block the gutters. But my favourite trees to plant and grow are Apples. Not only for their fruit, which was prolific this year, but the blossom in spring time is a welcome sight.

Apple trees, depending on the rootstock size can be trained to almost any size or shape that you desire. They can be grown in pots or soil, so there should be one to suit most gardens. For best advice talk to the people in the local garden centres.

Another job I like to do this time of year is to fill up some pots with winter colour plants, and put them near the front door or outside the window where we can see them. This can help to brighten even the dullest days.



I mainly go for coloured foliage plants. There is a large range of these plants available in most good garden centres. I like to use Silver coloured leaf plants, especially if I have a dark coloured pot. This helps to show off the plant better.

I also put in some miniature daffodil bulbs to add to Spring colour as well as some Violas. I prefer Violas over winter Pansies as they have smaller flowers, but more of them. They can also withstand the winter better then Pansies.

The foliage plants that you use in the pots can last for years. The only thing is to keep them trimmed in Spring, to encourage more foliage, and to pot them on into a slightly bigger pot every year.

When they get too big for the pots you can then put them into the garden and they should grow away quite happily. November is the month to start planning your winter pruning program.

This will include plants like Roses, Apples, Pears, currants etc. The best way I find of doing this is to walk around the garden, and look at the structure of the plants, and then decide which branches or stems to remove or reduce to benefit your plants.

Some people often ask why should you prune? The easiest answer to that is for our convenience. People like to look into a rose flower and not look up to it. It is easier to pick fruit while standing on the ground rather than on a ladder.

Pruning helps to reduce the weight in branches and stems that a plant has to carry, and should in turn increase the life expectancy of the plants.

Jobs for November

- 1. Remove any remaining leaves from the lawn and pathways.
- 2. Wash algae from paths and steps.
- 3. Finish planting any bulbs.
- 4. Pot up winter colour plants.
- 5. Discard any remaining summer bedding plants into the compost bin.
- 6. Wash and store any patio furniture for next year.
- 7. Order any bare root plants you need from the garden centres.
- 8. Enjoy the garden.

Brewery

Weaver's Square, Bleach Yard Hill, Mill Pond, and Sand Quay are names that reflect Glanmire's industrial past, alongside another name: Still Hill, later referred to as Brewery Hill because of the nearby brewery. One of the earliest mentions of this enterprise is found in the Cork Advertiser dated Thursday, 29 November 1827, which advertised old whiskey available at John Lyons & Co., Riverstown Distillery. Established in the 1820s, this business employed sixty people and produced 180,000 gallons of whiskey. Coal for the operation was transported by barge from Cork to Sand Quay in Glanmire Village when the Glashabov River was at high tide.

In Ireland and worldwide, the history of alcoholic beverages spans many Patrick McGovern, a centuries. biomolecular archaeologist at the University of Pennsylvania Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology, offers an interesting view on this history. He argues that beer predates bread, suggesting that early humans cultivated grains mainly for alcohol production due to its simpler processing and greater nutritional benefits. Fast forward a few millennia, and earlier generations believed that whiskey could help prevent influenza, while beer was regarded as a staple food for much of the nineteenth century.

Before the First Industrial Revolution (1750-1850), the trade of alcohol faced challenges from production limitations and transportation However, technological difficulties. advancements opened new markets for commercial producers, leading to increased alcohol consumption and related social issues. During this period, drunkenness became increasingly prevalent in Ireland, prompting a Quaker named William Martin to establish the Cork Total Abstinence Society in 1835 to address the problem. Later, around 1838, Father Theobald Mathew became involved, much to the dismay of local distillers and brewers, including Denny Lane, who had connections to Glanmire. Denny Lane was born in 1818 to Maurice and Ellen Née Madden. Following his father's death, he inherited property in Glanmire, including the distillery in the Glyntown/Riverstown area. The Cork Examiner featured one of the first references to Lane on 20 May 1846, where an observer praised his character. At that time, Ireland was experiencing turmoil due to the Great Famine, and Lane's philanthropic efforts, such as distributing wheat and barley to his dependents and supplementing emplovee wades. brought comfort to the locality. However, despite (or maybe because of) his generosity, Lane appears to have lacked business acumen and left Riverstown impoverished in the late 1850s.

By the 1880s, ownership of the brewery shifted to Sir John Arnott. Lane redirected his efforts to the Silversprings Starch Works. Scottish-born entrepreneur three-time Cork Lord Mayor, Sir John Arnott employed a Public Analyst to assess the quality of his products. An

advertisement in the Southern Star on 29 December 1894 highlighted that Arnott's stout was measured at over 12½ % proof. Sir John Arnott passed away in 1898, with an estate valued at £600,000. In 1901, the Murphy Family, owners of the Lady's Well Brewery. acquired both St. Finbarr's Brewery in Cork and Riverstown Ale Brewery While they closed and Maltings. and dismantled the latter two, they continued to operate the malt houses. Notably, a relative of John O'Callaghan. a founding member of the Riverstown Community Association, managed the establishment, as verified by Guy's Street Directory, 1914.

The site later deteriorated but was recorded by the Archaeological Survey of Ireland, which documented archaeological sites from 1984 to 1992. The entry for the distillery indicates its location on the southern bank of the Glashaboy River and describes the early/mid-19th-century complex marked as 'Distillery' on the 1842 OS 6-inch map, of which only two buildings It details the rectangular gable-ended structure, locally known as 'the maltings', alongside various architectural features. The complex was labelled 'Brewery' on the 1902 OS 6-inch map, signifying its change in function. The site was engulfed in flames in August 2016. As a result of the fire, these buildings were lost, but thanks to Google Maps, we do have images of the past heritage at Still Hill. A new change is anticipated as the site is being put on the market this year, with photos available on Coholan Downing's website. The hope is that any new development will honour the legacy of the former brewery, distillery, and maltings in Riverstown.



Finbarr also wants to see more seating in public areas. 'It breaks the journey,' he says, 'especially for older people, and gives local residents a place to sit and chat when the weather is mild.' Finbarr also added, 'It's lovely to see families



enjoying green space and playground facilities in John O'Callaghan Park.' He says that anything that adds beauty to an area is a worthwhile pursuit and quotes the poet, John Keats, saying "a thing of beauty is a joy forever."

It is no surprise that the Glanmire area has recently been awarded Commended. Highly Commended and Healthy Village certification at the Muintir na Tire award ceremony at the Kingsley Hotel. But you get the impression that the real 'award' for Finbarr is to see the pleasure people get from an eye-catching floral display or a well-placed bench where residents can rest and enjoy the greenery around them.



One little girl came up to him in the playground recently while he was painting and said, 'Are you the man who looks after our park?' That made him smile and it's what keeps him going - making a little difference and seeing people take pride in small improvements to our public spaces. He also commended the local authorities, Cork County Council - and now Cork City Council - for providing grant aid for different projects and to all in the local engineers' department for all their support and assistance.

When I asked him about future projects, Finbarr wasn't short of ideas. 'I'd love to include a sculpture at Riverstown Cross, he says, and he has exciting plans for a Butterfly Garden next year, reminding us too that new volunteers are always welcome. 

"It's not just about putting on plays – it's about building friendships and bringing stories and performances into the heart of the community – into cafes, pubs, schools, and open-air spaces – as well as in a traditional theatre setting. People are starving for live, local performances and bringing theatre out into familiar settings in the local community can breathe new life into stories, nurture connection and attract a wider more diverse audience."



Writer's Corner From Imagination to Inspiration

This month, I caught up with Steffi Fennelly, mother of two, occupational therapist, avid reader and now – children's author. Here she tells us how her new book came about, and the process involved in transforming her ideas into a published work – The World is in Our Hands.

Steffi, congratulations on your beautiful children's book, just published this month. Can you tell me a little about what the book is about and what prompted you to write this book?

Thank you! David Attenborough narrates a series called Our Planet on Netflix, a documentary on the impact climate change has on walruses. I honestly cried for days after I watched it. I've been writing since primary school, it's my escape and I really wanted to get something published sooner rather than later. I felt writing for young children would create a consciousness in them from a young age around the importance of protecting our planet. 'The World is in Our Hands' follows five friends on an Arctic adventure where they meet a family of walruses and learn about climate change. It's written, illustrated, published and printed in Ireland!




Sounds great. Tell me about the process you had to go through?

It didn't come easy – that's the first thing to say. If you want to publish something, be mentally prepared for the time it will take. It took me a year to establish that self-publishing was the way to go. I luckily got to speak with someone who had self-published and they helped confirm that it was the best fit for me! It was hard to find the time and energy



as I worked full-time as an occupational therapist in an acute hospital, but I was really motivated and made the time. Once my first baby was 16 weeks old, I contacted Ronan from Murray & McCarthy Publishing (Clonakilty) to get the ball rolling, and he kindly took me under his wing. My book was written in a word document, and he helped to transform it into what it is today. He challenged me throughout the process. We spent 18 months having weekly calls – we both cried and laughed along the way, but it was all worth it in the end. I absolutely love my book.



Was it hard to find an illustrator?

It was really hard. Luckily, Ronan had worked with another author, Mary Moran and she had a brilliant illustrator, Anastasia who agreed to take on my project. She was incredible in how she was able to take exactly what I had written and transform it into the most stunning hand-painted illustrations with

her own little twist too i.e. William the walrus having a top hat!

What was the hardest thing about writing the book?

I think my skill set is writing and not the finer details. That's where Ronan would jump in and point out valid observations. I really wanted to put pins in my eyes some days. I guess I just wanted the finished product but the whole process has taught me patience.

How does it feel to be a published author?

It's still very surreal. People keep congratulating me and I just tell them anyone can do it – but I realise that I don't know many people who have published work and yes, it is a big deal.

What advice would you give others who want to be a children's author?

I think you have to ask yourself 'why?'. If the why is to make a quick buck, then maybe you'll get lucky, but you must be devoted to it and be willing to give up your free time. For me, I wanted to devote countless hours to it because I believed in what I was doing. You have to be 'all in' to get through when things aren't going your way.

It's an ideal Christmas gift. Where can we buy the book?

Thanks, I like to think so too! It's fun, educational and has a magic element which we all need at times when there is so much negativity in the world. 
